## Fireline Safety

- ➤ Initial Attack Operations vs. Extended Incident Operations
- ➤ Initial Attack: very little situational awareness for units assigned to fire/evacuations, dispatch overwhelmed, incident under local command.
- Extended Incidents: Increased situational awareness. Planning section, incident meteorologist provides predicted fire behavior and weather changes.
