5.1. <u>CONSIDERATION OF APPEAL OF A DENIED TREE REMOVAL PERMIT – 176 E. SACRAMENTO</u>

Mr. Sullivan (Applicant) is requesting a permit to remove a Little Leaf Linden tree in front of his residence at 176 E Sacramento Ave. Mr. Sullivan cites the unsuitability of the tree, the small seed balls, and aphids as reasons for removal.

Recommendation: The Committee recommends that the BPPC accept the Committee's report and approve amending CMC Section 14.40.300 to require branches to be trimmed to provide 7.5' clearance over sidewalks and 14.5 feet over the roadway.

5.3. REPORT ON THE 4/18/19 NATURAL RESOURCE COMMITTEE MEETING

At the 3/26/18 BPPC meeting, Staff provided an update on the operations and mitigation and monitoring of the Peregrine Point Disc Golf/Trailhead Area located on the southside of Upper Bidwell Park on Highway 32. At the request of a member of the public, Staff agreed to forward further discussion of the status of the mitigation and monitoring program to the Natural Resource Committee (NRC).

Recommendation: The Committee recommended that the BPPC approve Staff working with ORAI to complete the following:



SACRAMENTO AVENUE

REPORT IN BRIEF:

The applicant Mr. Richard Sullivan is requesting to have a Little Leaf Linden tree removed in front of his residence at 176 E Sacramento Ave. Mr. Sullivan cites the unsuitability of the tree, the small seed balls, and aphids as reasons for removal.

Recommendation: The Urban Forest Manager (UFM) requests BPPC approval to uphold denial of the tree removal permit.

Meeting Date: 4/30/18

Background:

Pursuant to Chico Municipal Code (CMC) 14.40.120 of Chapter 14.40 Street Trees, no tree located in the City right-ofway or public planting area shall be removed without a permit or permission of the City and only in those cases whereby the tree is dead, dying, diseased or hazardous.

A neighbor does not have the right to insist that an adjoining tree owner take responsibility for the natural growth and resulting debris of a tree so long as the tree is reasonably maintained.

In 2009, Mr. Sullivan submitted a permit to remove the same tree. In addition to complaints of tree debris, Mr. Sullivan stated that he wanted to install a driveway to mitigate the parking issues on E Sacramento Ave. City Engineering staff at the time had concerns regarding the feasibility of a driveway installation, as well as the possibility of providing an ADA parking space for the Mr. Sullivan. No structural issues were of concern at that time. See attachment A for documents relating to the first permit application.

The permit was denied by the UFM at the time. The denial was appealed to the BPPC on 9/28/09 and the denial decision was upheld by the Commission. In the most recent permit application, Mr. Sullivan has not mentioned the intention to install a driveway as a reason for wanting to remove the tree.

Discussion:

September 8th, 2017, Mr. Richard Sullivan contacted the UFM to discuss removal of the Little Leaf Linden. The UFM attempted to resolve the complaints of tree debris through means other than removal. Unfortunately, no viable or permitted remedies to treat aphids or seed production were found.

Mr. Sullivan submitted a California Public Records Act (PRA) request on Feb 13, 2018 to the City Clerk's office requesting details of all trees removed in the City right-of-way within a two-block radius of 176 E Sacramento Ave. Staff researched this request and submitted to the City clerk on Feb 21, 2018 that there were 31 trees removed in this area. Answers to Mr. Sullivan's subsequent questions were also answered by email Feb 28, 2018. See attachment B.

Mr. Sullivan submitted a second PRA request on March 6, 2018 requesting identification of all public trees removed in the City right-of-way over a ten-year period. Staff researched this request and submitted details of 1,249 trees removed over the last ten tears. The second PRA response is 57 pages and has not been included in this report. Copies will be available for inspection at the April 30, 2018 BPPC meeting.

Horticultural literature cites Little Leaf Lindens can attain heights of 80 -130 feet, but typically only 40'-50' in the urban environment. Some historical Linden trees in Europe are up to 700 years old. The age of this tree is probably of similar age to the houses in E Sacramento Avenue, c. 1915/16, putting the tree at over 100 years old.

The tree was listed in City records as being of "excellent" health. In 2017 vigor classification was downgraded a category to "good" due to the slight root decay and restricted growing space. Vigor is somewhat of a subjective assessment and the downgrade does not suggest any actual reduction of vigor over the last nine years.

The tree requested to be removed was measured in April 2018. It is 91' high and 41" DBH. It is noted that in 2009 the tree was measured at 80' high and 38.5" DBH. From these measurements, it can be concluded that the tree has grown on average 12" per year. This tree is still growing, showing good health and no indication of starting to decline. The passage of nine years has shown that assessment to be accurate. It is anticipated that the useful life and environmental benefits afforded to the community from this tree will be ongoing for many more years. See attachment C for emails from residents voicing objection to the proposed removal.

- Feb 21, 2018 City Clerk responds to Mr. Sullivan with PRA response.
- Feb 21, 2018 Mr. Sullivan responds with questions regarding the response to PRA request.
- Feb 28, 2018 UFM responds to guestions and sends denial of permit.
- March 6, 2018 Mr. Sullivan submits second PRA request: All City trees removed in last ten years.
- March 15, 2015 City Clerk responds to Mr. Sullivan with PRA response.

Commissioners:

My wife and I have been residents of Chico for 41 years, 37 of which we have lived at our current address on East Sacramento Avenue. It is a nice neighborhood and in a great location and we enjoy living here very much. However, there is just one problem. The problem is a tree, located right in front of the house. Now, I love trees as much as Joyce Kilmer did, but this is a tree that even Joyce wouldn't have loved. This one is nothing short of a private nuisance to us.

From mid-April through May it sheds a yellow, powdery pollen that must be removed from your windshield every day. It is tracked into your car and through your house on the soles of your shoes.

Then starting in mid-May to the present time it drops little hard balls approximately a quarter of an inch in diameter. By the thousands. They cover the sidewalk and street and must be swept up daily so someone doesn't roll on them and fall and get injured. It is like walking on ball-bearings. These, too, are carried into your car and house on your shoes.

During June and July a fine mist of sap rains down from the tree covering your car, the sidewalk, and your stairs and the sticky mess is tracked into the house. It gets so thick on the car windows that you cannot roll them down. Car, sidewalk, and stairs must be hosed off daily.


Then, of course, through October and November the leaves must be raked up daily. All of this just gives you a description of the tree.

Now for the main reason for having it removed. I would like to have a driveway constructed across the park strip and sidewalk from the street so I can gain access to my property. All surrounding streets have residential parking by permit only. However, residents on this block do not have that privilege. High school and college students and anyone who wants to park and walk downtown find this block fair game. Compounding the parking problem is the fact that there is only one driveway on this side of the street, meaning that everyone else also has to park on the street.

I love trees as much as anyone else, but I feel if you weigh the welfare of a tree against the welfare of human beings, the human beings should be favored. When this tree is taken down a new one (different variety, please) can be planted approximately eight feet away in the park strip. Thank you.

RECOMMENDATION:

The General Services Director recommends that the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) uphold staff's recommendation to deny the removal of the tree (Little Leaf Linden) located at 176 E. Sacramento Avenue.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Section 14.40.120 of Chapter 14.40-Street Trees of the Chico Municipal Code (CMC), no tree located in the City's right-of-way or public planting area shall be removed without a permit or permission by the City and only if the tree is dead, dying, diseased, or hazardous.

On 8/26/09, staff received a tree removal permit application from Mr. Dick Sullivan to remove a "Little Leaf Linden" (Tilia cordata) tree located at 176 East Sacramento Avenue. Photos of this tree and property are depicted below. The applicant is requesting permission to remove the tree to allow for the construction of a driveway along the side of the property and also states various complaints about the tree. Staff has denied the permit due to the excellent condition of the tree, and because the tree is not hazardous and has environmental and aesthetic, value to the community.

Article V. of CMC Chapter 14.40 also provides a process for an applicant that has been denied a permit by the General Services Director to appeal the decision to the BPPC and the applicant has requested an appeal hearing. A copy of Mr. Sullivan's letter and permit application (Exhibit "A"), the General Service's Director's response (Exhibit "B"), and a copy of CMC Chapter 14.40, Article V. (Exhibit"C") are attached for the Commission's information.

DISCUSSION:

Little Leaf Linden trees are a very long lived species. This particular tree is in excellent vigor. It is 38,5" diameter and approximately 80 feet tall. In fact, this tree would be specifically protected under the new tree protection ordinance that is currently awaiting Council consideration.

Structurally, there is some decay at the buttress roots on the sidewalk side of the tree. The tree has two trunks, with some included bark at the attachment between the stems. This can be a weak attachment, although there are no signs of the tree splitting at this point. There is some sidewalk lifting at the tree and the curb has been removed along the street side to accommodate the tree's growth. Neither of these defects pose a hazard, or are significant enough to warrant removal of the tree at this time.

In addition, it is staff's understanding that Mr. Sullivan's permit to construct the driveway has not yet been approved by the City's Building and Development Services Department and that its Engineering staff has voiced concerns regarding the feasibility of the installation. As an alternative, the Engineering Division has suggested that an ADA accessible parking space be designated in front of the Sullivan's property to accommodate their needs.


In response to Mr. Sullivan's statement that this tree was marked for removal last May, our records indicate that Mr. Sullivan requested by phone that this tree be removed in June 2008 because it was a nuisance. In September 2008, staff inspected the tree and determined that it did not need to be removed. Mr. Sullivan was notified of the determination. However, the request was inadvertently left on the tree removal list and marked in error with a green dot. This error was discovered when reviewing the final tree removal list for submittal to the contractor.



RECOMMENDATION:

The General Services Director recommends that the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) not reconsider its 9/28/09 decision to deny the removal of the tree (Little Leaf Linden) located at 176 E. Sacramento Avenue.

BACKGROUND:

Commissioner Watts has requested (Exhibit A) that the Commission reconsider action taken at its 9/26/09 meeting to deny a tree removal permit at 176 E. Sacramento Avenue.

The Commission conducts business under approval of the City Council as delineated in AP&P 10-10 (Exhibit B). Regarding reconsideration, the City Council's policy is:

Reconsideration of an Agenda Item – The Council will neither rehear nor reconsider an issue within one year after a decision has been made unless a member of the prevailing side requests reconsideration within the time frame. If the Council votes to reconsider the matter, or will be scheduled for consideration at a subsequent meeting on the Regular Agenda. In case of a tie vote, any member of the Council may request reconsideration of an agenda item.

Commissioner Watts did vote on the prevailing side to deny the tree removal permit and therefore can request reconsideration. Should the Commission vote to reconsider, the matter will be placed on a subsequent agenda for review and consideration.

DISCUSSION:

At the 9/26/09 Commission meeting and following rejection of the appeal, the Commission requested an update on the issue at a subsequent meeting. Brian Mickelson, Sr. Civil Engineer (Traffic) has provided the following information regarding the topic.

In regards to Mr. Sullivan, there are several complexities to the situation. Preferential Parking Districts were created in the 1980's in the Mansion Park and Veterans Hall area to prevent Chico High School and Chico State students from parking in the residential areas and limiting parking available for residents. Therefore, by definition they are exclusionary districts limiting the amount of parking within their limits. As such, they create a situation where it migrates vehicles into another area which causes an even greater impact as the overall parking availability is limited.

The way this system was set up, there are only three full time passes allotted to each residence and two service passes for home maintenance, deliveries, etc. The problem with this is it assumes all structures within the area function as single family dwelling units. This is not always the case. When businesses or college housing rentals operate out of these former single family dwelling units, they have more employees, clients or residents (vehicles) than they have passes for, resulting in those not having passes parking in nearby residential areas and leaving the preferential districts under utilized.

Mr. Sullivan lives directly at the border of one of these districts, adjacent to two formerly single family dwellings that have several business operating out of them employing approximately 20-30 employees, but only have 10 passes (6 permanent passes and 4 service passes). This causes these employees and clients to park on East Sacramento Avenue in front of Mr. Sullivan's home and leaves the preferential parking area virtually empty. This as well as other issues such as enforcement, tracking of the permits, collection of fees and other issues have plagued the system since

its inception. However because expanding the boundaries only displaces the issue into another area and once again decreases the available parking supply for the City, the boundaries have remained unchanged since it was started.

Through the Chico Avenues Neighborhood Association neighborhood improvement process, there has been discussion of revamping the system to address these issues and to make the system work better for all. The work has not been formally started on this part of the plan but should be in the works in the near future. Until such time that this has started, it is feared that any piecemeal modification to the existing boundaries/system might complicate the issue further. This system needs to be looked at holistically so that we do not exacerbate an already difficult system.

Hello Mr. Sullivan,

Thank you for your questions. My apologies for the delayed response. I am happy to provide the answers below:

The use of the word 'lines" refers to the presence of utility lines. That information is added to the notes to inform the removal contractor that live wires might be present.

The terms "dying" and "declining" have specific meaning in urban tree assessments.

Below is the complete scale that is used to assess a trees vigor. Vigor can be defined as an assessment of overall tree health. Determination of vigor is based on consideration of color of foliage, crown proportion and appearance, retention of leaves/needles, appearance of apical growth, length between growth whorls, and presence of cavities and fungal growth along with the assessing arborists professional judgment. The code is assigned based on the following classes:

Excellent – Tree exhibits high level of vigor and no barriers (soil, light, etc.) to continued vigor. No decay or broken branches are observed.

Good - Tree exhibits high level of vigor and some minor barriers (soil, light, etc.) to continued vigor. No decay or broken branches are observed.

Fair – Tree appears generally healthy. Barriers (soil, light, etc.) affect the trees vigor. Tree's crown may be smaller proportionally than in healthier trees. Decay and/ or broken branches, if observed, are not likely to have negative impacts in the short term.

Poor – Tree appears notably unhealthy, as determined by reduced crown, presence of decay and/or broken branches and/or significant barriers to future growth. Observed problems have high likelihood of being rectified through management of said tree and trees surrounding it.

Critical – Tree appears notably unhealthy, as determined by reduced crown, presence of decay and/or broken branches and/or significant barriers to future growth. Observed problems have low likelihood of being rectified through management of said tree and trees surrounding it.

Dying - Tree is unhealthy. Minimal live crown is present; portions of bark may be missing and/or substantial levels of broken stems and branches. Tree may exhibit advanced decay. No further investment in restoring the tree to a higher vigor is deemed worthwhile.

Dead- No live material is observed in the tree

One of the trees, as you note, contained term "declining". This is word used interchangeably with the word "dying" and has the same meaning in this context.

I have also attached the permit application that you applied for. Unfortunately I cannot approve your permit to remove the tree located at 176 E Sacramento Ave. For your information, this tree is classified as being of "excellent" vigor. Upon reassessment I would reclassify it as "good" according to the criteria above due to the restricted room for tree roots. This does not however satisfy the criteria needed for tree removal. Please note that the sidewalk issues near 176 E Sacramento are most likely due to the adjacent sycamore tree - I have created a service request for sidewalk repair. Repair methods can include a number of options including grinding the sidewalk, replacing concrete and/or root pruning.



REPORT IN BRIEF:

At its meeting on 04/12/18, the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission's (BPPC) Tree Committee discussed the following topics.

- 1. City of Chico Urban Forest Revitalization Program Grant Proposal.
- 2. Summary of ongoing discussions regarding revision to Chico Municipal Code 14.40, 16.66 and 16.68.
- 3. Consideration Of 12-Month Workflow Priorities of Public Works Tree Division.
- 4. Arbor Day Foundation Tree City USA Growth Award.

Recommendation: The Committee recommends that the BPPC accept the Committee's report and approve amending CMC Section 14.40.300 to require branches to be trimmed to provide 7.5' clearance over sidewalks and 14.5 feet over the roadway.

SUBJECT 1. City of Chico Urban Forest Revitalization Program Grant Proposal

BACKGROUND:

Public Works Operations and Maintenance Tree Division submitted a concept proposal on 2/28/18 for the CAL FIRE Urban and Community Forestry California Climate Investments (CCI) Grant Program to update the City's tree inventory and to prepare an Urban Forest Management Plan. By letter dated 4/9/18, Cal Fire notified the Staff that the concept proposal has been accepted. A copy of the letter is attached as Attachment A.

Staff will now work to draw up a full proposal, which will include a Resolution by City Council approving the grant application. Submission deadline for the full proposal is 3:00 PDT on Wednesday, May 30, 2018.

Fiscal impact:

Staff is submitting a proposal to receive approximately \$425,000 in funding. The local match funding component comprises of in-kind volunteer time, as well as existing Staff payroll and existing developer mitigation funds.

Recommendation: None currently. Informational only item.

SUBJECT 2. Ongoing discussions regarding revisions to CMC Sections 14.40, 16.66 and 16.68

BACKGROUND

At its 6/26/17 meeting, the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) provided Staff with various Chico Municipal Code (CMC) sections that needed revising. At the 8/10/17 meeting, the Tree Committee discussed revisions to CMC Chapters 14.40, 16.66 and 16.68. Furthermore, at the 10/12/17 meeting, the Tree Committee discussed additional

revisions on Heritage Trees CMC Chapter 16.68, as well as permit fees and homeowner pruning of City right-of-way trees. At its 1/22/18 meeting, Tree Committee held additional discussions of revisions to CMC 16.68 Heritage Tree Program.

DISCUSSION

The CMC sections that the BPPC considered to be important and in need of revision are listed, not in order of priority, in the Table 1 below. At the 4/12/18 Tree Committee, staff provided a brief update on the proposed revisions as numbered in Table 1 below.

Item 1 -Director Definition

CMC 14.40.055

"Director" shall mean the director of the public works department.

It was proposed to make the following amendments to the Director definition in 14.40.055 to read "director of the public works **Operations and Maintenance** department.

14.40.120 Permit - Required.

No trees or shrubs shall be planted in or removed from any planting area in the City unless:

- A. A written permit therefore is authorized by the commission or the City Council and is issued by the director **or designee**; or
- B. Such planting or removal is required by order of the Commission or the city Council.

The director <u>or designee</u> shall bring all applications for permits to the attention of the Commission and shall issue such written permit when and as directed by the Commission or the City Council. The planting of a tree or shrub in conformity to the street tree plan as adopted and amended by the Commission shall be deemed to be authorized by the Commission and no further authorization for the granting of a permit shall be necessary.

<u>Item 2 - 14.40.150 Permit - Conditions upon issuance.</u>

All regulations adopted by the Commission pursuant to this chapter are conditions upon the issuance of any permit, unless specifically waived by the Commission, or the Council. The director may impose upon the granting of such permit such additional conditions as the director deems reasonable. Among others, the director may require, as such a condition upon the granting of a removal permit, the replanting of a tree or shrub in place of that removed. The director shall, when removal is being permitted for convenience of owner to make way for construction, require, as a condition, that the removal shall not take place until the work of construction is commenced, unless otherwise authorized by the Commission or the Council.

Recommendation: The Tree Committee meeting, agreed to postpone revisions to this CMC section.

Item 3 - 14.40.300 Branches to be trimmed.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the City to permit branches of trees or shrubs growing or being on private property to extend within ten feet from the ground over any portion of the sidewalk or street. It is common language in CMC to require between seven and eight feet of clearance over a sidewalk and between fourteen and fifteen feet of clearance over the roadway.

Recommendation: Tree Committee recommends that the BPPC approve to change CMC code 14.40.300 to state a required 7.5' clearance over sidewalks and 14.5 feet over the roadway.

<u>Item 4 – Tracking Tree Planting Compliance</u>

Recommendation: The Committee recommended postponing revisions to this section of 14.40. Committee member Reddemann suggested a 12-month deadline.

Item 5 - Street Tree List

Staff reported on ongoing research to update the City of Chico approved street tree planting list.

Recommendation: None at this time.

Item 6 and Item 7 - Streamlining Permitting

Recommendation: Committee member Reddemann suggested a 12-month deadline to finalize work on streamlining the permitting process for developers and residents.

Item 8. Heritage tree applications.

Staff and committee members discussed the voluntary Heritage tree program. It was discussed that the deed recording requirement should be optional for homeowners. Staff intends to launch a survey via SurveyMonkey to help determine what cost is acceptable to potential applicants.

Removal of Permit fees

Staff discussed the idea of introducing a fee for street tree removal permit applications. This fee would cover administrative costs. The City of Chico already levies a fee on tree permits tied to development. A survey of California cities revealed that many cities charge a fee to cover processing costs for such street tree permits. Planting permits should remain free. Of the cities that charged permit fees, costs ranged from \$25 to \$81. Committee discussed the range of possible fee levels that would be appropriate for Chico. The possibility of introducing a fee for appeals was also discussed.

Recommendation: Committee directed that staff come back with an outline of the permit process.

Homeowner Pruning of City Right-of-Way Trees

At the 10/12/17 meeting, the Tree Committee discussed ideas to introduce a program whereby minor incidental pruning on City trees is permissible without the need for a formal permit at all. At the Tree Committee meeting 4/12/18 staff suggested this idea be tabled.

Recommendation: Committee members agreed to table research into allowing pruning without a permit.

SUBJECT 3. Consideration Of 12-Month Workflow Priorities of Public Works Tree Division

At the 4/12/18 Committee meeting staff sought input to determine where to focus work priorities in the interim period until an Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP) can be developed. The Committee discussed the following UFM goals and objectives.

DISCUSSION

Urban Forestry (UF) Goals:

The UFM has compiled a broad list of five goals for the Tree Division, which are summarized as follows:

GROW: The urban forest should be enhanced for social, economic and environmental benefits. Additional tree planting is the main tool to achieve this goal.

PROTECT: Chico's existing trees need to be protected from biological, climatic, and man-made threats that if left unchecked could diminish canopy cover and associated benefits in Chico.

MANAGE: In order to create a cohesive urban forestry program, decision making is best made with up-to-date data and current best industry practices. Strategic planning and optimal use of available resources with collaboration from multiple stakeholders will ensure a robust urban forest for generations to come.

FUND: Urban forestry activities cannot happen without securing long-term funding. Novel approaches and creativity will be required to fill funding shortfalls.

ENGAGE: A successful urban forestry program cannot happen without active participation from multiple stakeholders.

<u> Urban Forestry Objectives:</u>

A dynamic and broad list of 108 objectives was identified. This list was created by a combination of previous work plan priorities, ongoing discussions with community stakeholders, and Staff's own experiences of Chico's urban forest over the last twelve months. This list can be used to shape the future UFMP. It can also be used to focus on short-term priorities.

The Committee reviewed the list of goals and objectives. Committee member Haar suggested goals that focus on increasing the shade canopy be an ongoing focus. Committee also stated that early formative pruning be a priority. In the short-term work priorities should focus on the Cal Fire grant funding application. Committee will support staff in compiling grant materials.

Recommendation: None at this time. Committee will continue discussion on goals and objectives for the Tree Division for Bidwell Park and Playground Commission's consideration.

SUBJECT 4. Arbor Day Foundation Tree City USA Growth Award

BACKGROUND

The Tree City USA Growth Award is awarded by the Arbor Day Foundation to recognize higher levels of tree care by participating Tree City USA communities. The Growth Award highlights innovative programs and projects as well as increased commitment of resources for urban forestry. It also provides an opportunity to share new ideas and successes across the country.

DISCUSSION

The City of Chico has been a Tree City USA recipient for thirty-four consecutive years. A Tree City USA recipient can achieve a Tree City USA Growth Award if it qualifies as a Tree City USA for at least the second consecutive year and completes activities in eligible categories totaling 10 or more points. Eligible activities fall into one of four categories, and each activity has an associated point value. The attachment to this report outlines the activities that are eligible to count towards Growth Award status. It is anticipated that a Growth Award will be earned every year over the next ten years. After that time the City will be eligible for the prestigious Sterling Award. This award is given to cities that have earned a growth award for ten years in a row.

Attachment D outlines the four eligible categories for consideration. Ten points must be accrued, which can be derived from any or all categories as listed below:

- Category A: Education and Public Relations
- Category B: Partnerships
- · Category C: Planning and Management
- Category D: Tree Planting and Maintenance

Committee recommended staff focus on Items A2, A3, A4, A5, B10 to attain the necessary ten points to qualify for the Growth Award.

Recommendation: Committee provided input on eligible activities that can be implemented in 2018 to attain a Tree City USA growth award for the City of Chico.

CAL FIRE will carefully evaluate each application according to the posted *Urban and Community Forestry Program California Climate Investments Grant Guidelines*. The following elements will be important in the grant evaluation process:

- a. GHG quantification for projects must follow the Air Resources Board *Urban and Community Forestry Program Quantification Methodology for FY 2017-18* (PDF) found at: https://www.arb.ca.gov/cc/capandtrade/auctionproceeds/quantification.htm. Applicants must provide printouts of both the iTree Planting and ARB calculators with their project application.
- b. Highly competitive projects will include those with substantial levels of collaboration with partners, and demonstrate community support. Such projects will have authentic community engagement as a strong project element. Letters of commitment from partners are a way to demonstrate such collaboration.
- c. Inclusion in the project of strong tree establishment practices, presence of long term urban forest management planning, a history of good urban forest practices by the applying entity, and a commitment to long term maintenance of the project are ways to demonstrate assurance that GHG emission reduction goals will be achieved.

- d. All projects must show proof of what portion of their project can be considered "in" an AB 1550 community. A percentage of how much of the project will be in 1) disadvantaged communities, 2) low income communities, 3) low income communities adjacent to disadvantaged communities, and 4) benefits to low income households must be included. Please see the table in Appendix L of the Grant Guidelines for the definition of what "in" an AB 1550 community is. It should be noted that 75% of CAL FIRE's funds must be considered "in" such communities. This factor, therefore, will greatly affect a project's competitiveness.
- Budgets must only be submitted in the format provided by CAL FIRE, and should be accompanied by an explanation of the expenses as provided on the project application form.
- f. A detailed tree species list as required on the project application form is of the highest importance. Failing to provide a detailed species list, with the expected number of each species to be planted, may result in disqualification.

Please submit one digital copy and one hard copy as instructed at the end of the Project Application. The digital copy must be received by email at CALFIRE.Grants@fire.ca.gov no later than 3:00 PDT on Wednesday, May 30, 2018. The hard copy must be signed, and postmarked no later than Wednesday, May 30, 2018. Failure to submit the Project Application and supporting documents by the due date will result in your proposal being disqualified. You must reference your project tracking number on each document of your application package when submitting the required documents. For the digital copy, use the project tracking number in the file name for each file submitted. For the hard copy, be sure to put the tracking number at the top of the page, even if it must be handwritten.

Due to the high demand for Urban and Community Forestry CCI grants, CAL FIRE will not be able to fund all projects for the applications submitted. Consequently, invitations to submit an application, and acknowledgement of a completed application, do not guarantee that the project will be funded.



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Tree City Growth Awards

Category A: Education and Public Relations

A1. Publications (2 points)





A2. Literature Distribution (2 points)

A new method of public literature distribution (with utility bills, at garden centers, at public events, etc.) was developed and implemented successfully.

A3. Interpretive Program (3 points)

An interpretive program such as a walking tour of outstanding trees for community planting, an arboretum, a heritage tree program (largest, historic, etc.) or similar project was first made available to the public or was significantly improved.

A4. Local Awards Program (3 points)

A recognition program with awards to citizens, commercial enterprises, neighborhood associations, other citizen groups, etc. for such things as best landscaping, tree planting/care projects, etc. was initiated or significantly improved.



A5. Community-Wide Tree Event (4 points)

A special, community-wide tree event such as an Arborfest, Dogwood Festival, Oak Festival, etc. was initiated or significantly improved. (An Arbor Day celebration is a standard requirement to qualify for Tree City USA. A continuing education program for forestry managers and tree board members was initiated or significantly improved. Examples include participation in tree-related workshops, conferences, correspondence courses, or other structured educational programs for those involved with managing community forests. A11. Tree-Care Workshops (4 points)

A workshop on some aspect of tree care was provided for the first time for homeowners, businesses and other members of the public. 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Tree City Growth Awards

Category B: Partnerships

B1. New Project or Organization (4 points)

A new, significant tree project was accomplished by the city in partnership with a civic organization, youth group, or other corporate or volunteer entity. Or assistance was given in creating a new volunteer organization that contributes to the community forestry program.



B2. Utility Partnership (5 points)

A cooperative program between the city and a utility was initiated or significantly improved, resulting in additional tree planting, planting appropriate species, improved pruning and other tree care, or utility designation as a Tree Line USA. (Please enclose documentation of significant community involvement.)

B3. Green Industry Partnership (5 points)

A cooperative project between the city and businesses such as private nurseries or tree services resulting in improved planting stock, better tree care, improved landscaping methods, the recycling of wood materials, etc. was initiated or significantly improved.

B4. Cooperative Purchasing/Contracting (6 points)

A program was initiated or significantly improved for the community to cooperatively work with another community. (For example, to share a forester, to jointly contract for tree-care, computer or other professional services, to purchase expensive equipment such as a tree spade, or to pool tree orders.)



B5. External Funding (6 points)

The city applied for and received significant, nongovernmental funding (corporations, foundations, civic organizations, individual contributions, etc.) for community forestry. (Please indicate amount, source and use of funds with documentation.)

B6. Tree Planting on Private Property (4 points)

The city initiated or significantly improved a cost-sharing or other incentive program, an unusual publicity campaign, etc. to bring about more tree planting on private property. There should be ATTACH D-1

Formalized coordination with city engineering was initiated or significantly improved to insure proper urban forestry review of street and utility plans, sidewalk construction, and similar practices that impact the health of the city's trees.

B10. Citizen Training Program (6 points)

A program to train and schedule citizen volunteers to provide basic maintenance suited to volunteers was initiated or significantly improved.

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Tree City Growth Awards

Category C: Planning and Management

C1. Tree-Maintenance Budget (9 points)

A budget line in the city budget specifically for tree maintenance (as opposed to planting or removals) was initiated or significantly increased. (Please indicate budget allocation for the current and previous year with documentation.)



C2. Municipal Funding (8 points)

Expanded or innovative municipal funding was developed to be used specifically to increase the planting and care of community trees. Examples include special tax districts, curb tax, bond issues, license fees, gas tax, utility surcharge, etc.

C3. Sidewalk/Curb Policy (5 points)

Policies were adopted or significantly improved which call for placement, construction, replacement and repair of sidewalks and curbs in a manner that will minimize tree damage. (Please enclose a copy of the policies as documentation.)

C4. Tree Inventory and Analysis (7 points)

A basic inventory of street and/or park trees was conducted for the first time or updated, and an analysis was performed indicating what conclusions are to be drawn from the inventory: species mix, planting and care needs, etc. (Please enclose copy of the inventory, or a sample from one neighborhood, and the analysis as documentation.)



C5. Computerized Tree-Management System (9 points)

The tree management system was first computerized and is site specific, <u>i.e.</u> individual trees identified with specific locations, and includes a work-reporting method with the work data on individual trees updated on a regular basis, preferably at least weekly.

C6. Management Plan (7 points)

A long-range, community-wide tree planting and management master plan using inventory data and covering at least the next 3–5 year period was first adopted or significantly improved. (Please enclose copy of plan as documentation.)

A licensing program was initiated or significantly improved for all tree-care companies or individuals operating in the community. (Please enclose explanatory literature as documentation.)

C8. Improved Ordinance (6 points)

A new or revised and significantly improved ordinance related to trees was adopted. The ordinance(s) must lead to the improved management and/or protection of trees and tree habitat and might include such measures as protecting historic or specimen trees, protecting trees and tree habitat during construction, conserving woodlands, ending tree topping, requiring new developments to preserve green spaces or plant trees, requiring parking lot landscaping, etc. (Please enclose copy of ordinance as documentation.)

C9. Standards and Specifications (6 points)

A standards and specifications document was adopted, or updated and significantly improved, as a separate document which complements the community's tree ordinance. Provisions might include such things as acceptable street trees to plant, standards for planting in downtown areas and along residential streets, and tree-maintenance guidelines. The standards would be updated and kept current by the city forester, tree board, or equivalent authority. (Please enclose copy with documentation.)

C10. Wildlife Habitat (3 points)

Wildlife habitat was developed or protected, including such practices as setting aside "no mowing" zones, planting trees and shrubs for wildlife purposes, protecting riparian zones, adding water impoundments for wildlife, providing nest boxes, etc.

C11. Park, Open Space (5 points)

Forested open space was acquired or a park developed with major tree planting. To use this criterion, it is necessary to demonstrate that the forestry staff or tree board was instrumental in the project. The land in question must be available for public use. Land covered by a scenic or other easement may also be included here.

C12. Emergency Plan (4 points)

A tree-care emergency plan was developed or significantly improved. The plan could outline who will provide what services after a severe storm, mutual aid available between communities or jurisdictions, and how to work effectively with the news media.

C13. Professional Tree Manager (10 points)

A full-time city forester or equivalent was hired for the first time. (Please indicate name, title, education/degree and starting date.)

Seek and receive accreditation for the municipal forestry department such as that provided by the Society of Municipal Arborists.



Category D: Tree Planting and Maintenance

D1. Special Tree Planting Project (4 points)



D2. Public Utility Tree Care (5 points)

The maintenance of publicly owned utility lines was significantly improved to reduce adverse impacts on trees. An example would be training in the use of state-of-the-art techniques that avoid topping trees, or qualifying as a Tree Line USA Utility.

D3. Recycling (6 points)

A biomass recycling program was successfully implemented or significantly improved. This may include street tree leaves, lawn wastes, tree removals, Christmas trees, etc.

D4. Street Tree Planting (7 points)

The city formally established or significantly improved its street-tree-planting program.



D5. Street Tree Pruning (8 points)

A formal pruning system was established or improved for the city's street trees. This criterion requires significant improvement through the initiation of regularly scheduled visits to all street trees depending on the requirements of the species, or the reduction of time between visits if needed.

D6. Hazard Tree Program (5 points)

A hazard tree assessment and action program was established or significantly improved, including employee training and a systematic method that includes periodic tree inspections and prompt follow-up when needed.

herbicides, weed cutters, and lawnmowers was successfully implemented.

D8. Integrated Pest Management (5 points)

Systems and methods for insect and disease control that are environmentally sensitive were put into place or significantly improved.

D9. Plans for Donations (3 points)

Plans were developed or significantly improved for projects such as vest-pocket parks, arboretum improvements, memorial tree groves, woodland acquisitions, etc. to be available in case of unexpected cash donations or similar opportunities.

D10. Contract Growing (5 points)

A contract with a nursery was initiated or significantly improved to provide specific varieties or species of street and park trees for future years (to enable planning and to assure having the right trees for the right sites).

D11. Tree Preservation (6 points)

A special project or program was initiated to preserve or relocate trees on development or construction sites.

SUBJECT: REPORT ON THE 4/18/18 NATURAL RESOURCE COMMITTEE MEETING

REPORT IN BRIEF:

At the 3/26/18 BPPC meeting, Staff provided an update on the operations and mitigation and monitoring of the Peregrine Point Disc Golf/Trailhead Area located on the southside of Upper Bidwell Park on Highway 32. At the request of a member of the public, Staff agreed to forward further discussion of the status of the mitigation and monitoring program to the Natural Resource Committee (NRC).

Recommendation: The Committee recommended that the BPPC approve Staff working with ORAI to complete the following:

Meeting Date: 4/30/18

- 1. Conducting the annual botanical studies and analysis to be paid by the City.
- Installing mulch on the tee pads, baskets, and to delineate trails where needed by July 2018.
- 3. Installing snake rail fencing and interpretive signage by July 2018.
- 4. Installing alternative tree protection measures by July 2018.
- 5. Installing at least three alternative pins/baskets on those holes that most impact Blue Oaks by September 2018.
- 6. Installing Tee Pad Signs on the three priority holes by September 2018.

BACKGROUND:

As part of the update of the Bidwell Park Master Management Plan (BPMMP) the Peregrine Point Disc Golf/Trailhead Area Concept Plan was developed for the pre-existing disc golf course and trails located on the site. The proposed Concept Plan included a disc golf beginner short course, a more advanced long course, restrooms, a developed parking lot, and shaded and unshaded picnic areas. Peregrine Point also serves as trailheads to many Upper Bidwell Park trails, and is a popular destination for hikers, mountain bikers, and nature enthusiasts. During the environmental review process for the BPMMP, a Master Mitigation and Monitoring Program (MMMP) was also developed for the full Disc Golf/Trailhead Concept Plan.

In 2009, the BPPC and Chico City Council directed Staff to work with Outside Recreation Advocate, Inc. (ORAI) to establish an agreement for the closure and relocation of the disc golf short course (9-holes), construction of improvements to the long course (18 holes), and the installation of mitigation measures, and ongoing operation and monitoring for the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course area.

Over several meetings, the BPPC received reports regarding the status of ORAI's compliance with its Operating Agreement, and the status of implementation of the remaining approximately 20 MMMP measures. In the report, Staff reviewed the ORAI's Operating Agreement and determined that ORAI has fulfilled its obligations under the Agreement. However, it was noted that the following mitigation and monitoring measures were needed:

- a. Better tree protection measures from flying discs.
- b. Installation of mulch around the tees, targets and trees to reduce erosion, replenish the thin soils, and reduce compaction around trees.

- c. Better delineation and decommissioning of trails to reduce trampling and erosion.
- d. Installation of alternative target/pole locations.
- e. Installation of tees signs and other signage.

Staff also recognized the lapse in the botanical monitoring of the Butte County Checkerbloom, Bidwell Knotweed and wildflower fields, and the Blue Oaks in 2016 and 2017. Because the cost of the studies is steadily increasing, and there are other users (e.g. bikers, hikers, nature enthusiasts) impacting the area, Staff proposed that the City take responsibility for conducting the botanical studies to ensure compliance with the MMMP. Staff also indicated that there may be a need to modify the mitigation and monitoring plan and frequency of the studies using the Adaptive Management Approach.

DISCUSSION:

At its 4/18/18 meeting, the NRC discussed the outstanding mitigation measures and Staff's proposal that the City pay for the botanical studies to ensure compliance with the MMMP. A member of the public questioned why the City was allowing ORAI to not comply with its Agreement. Staff informed the Committee that the Agreement requires that ORAI pay for the annual botanical monitoring every other year, yet the group has paid for the studies every year since 2011, paying approximately \$10,000 more than was required.

The Committee also discussed the outstanding mitigation measures and recommended the following plan of action:

- 1. <u>Botanical Studies</u> Retaining a consultant to perform botanical studies of the Butte Checkerbloom, Bidwell Knotweed and the Blue Oaks, and to review the previous studies and make recommendations regarding future monitoring. The botanical studies will be paid by the City.
- 2. <u>Tree Protection</u> Installation of new screens and/or installing plastic mesh fencing wraps around trees to reduce the impact of disc damages.
- 3. <u>Mulch</u> Mulch has been delivered on site. The mulch will be applied to the tee pads, using straw waddles to help keep it in place where needed, and on appropriate targets. Chips will also be used to help delineate trails.
- 4. <u>Snake Rail Fencing</u> additional snake rail fencing will be installed to designate "out of bounds" areas for all users, and where Knotweed (Group KG 3) and other wildflowers are predominated located between holes 2 and 17 to reduce trampling of this sensitive area. Also, interpretive signage is to be installed alerting the public of the need to stay out and protect the sensitive species.
- 5. <u>Trail realignment and delineation</u> installation of more snake rail fencing, and wood chips to reduce the multiple trails that exist between Holes 3 and 4 into one main trail, and in other areas where needed.
- 6. <u>Alternate Pin Installation</u> Installing alternative pins/baskets on most of the targets/holes to allow a "resting period" for the Oaks to recover. This work will require the use of a "jack hammer" due to the thin soils and bedrock onsite.
- 7. <u>Tee Signage</u> ORAI has purchased signs showing a map to guide users from the tees to the targets to reduce rogue trails and trampling of sensitive areas. The signs will also remind users of the proper use and rules of the course. These signs will be installed with the alternate pin installations.

NARRATIVE

1. Updates

a. <u>Caper Acres Celebration: 5/12/18</u> – City Parks, Sunrise and Noon Rotary Clubs, and CSUC are planning a grand event on Saturday, May 12, 2018 to celebrate the wonderful and generous work provided by all of the students, faculty, volunteers, groups, sponsors, and donors who contributed to the construction of the new swing area, bridge/entrance, and the decomposed granite pathways in Caper Acres and made the project possible!!. Games and activities will start at 9 am, with a formal ribbon cutting and gate opening at 9:30 a.m.

2. Maintenance Program

Staff continues daily cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including: grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths, coupled with daily cleaning and re-supplying of all open park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean up and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

- a. <u>Lower Park</u>: Staff installed two new trash cans in the Annie's Glenn section of the Park as per citizen requests. We have had a couple more trees come down this month in the One Mile area. Staff has cleared the new trees and is working on getting the old down trees cleared out of the reservation area and beyond.
- b. <u>Middle Park:</u> Staff has completed two more of the six major parking lots with 48 cubic yards of new material on each to bring them back up to where they should be.
- c. <u>Upper Park</u>: Staff cleared two downed trees from the Annie Bidwell trail.
- d. <u>Greenway Parks</u>: Weekly cleaning and garbage removal. Bollard replacement at entrances(which is an ongoing item), and high mow of all wild land areas as time allows.
- e. <u>Upcoming projects:</u> Distribute chip mulch at Peregrine Point Disc Golf as conditions permit. Installation of Trail markers and signs for Middle and Upper Park (in progress). Grade and surface parking lots (in progress). Repairs to Upper Park road at sites 27, 38 and 39. Mow road and trails in Lower and Middle Park, Mow wild land areas in lower park and satellite areas, Elevate and side trim park drives, Sycamore pool prep for season,

3. Ranger and Lifeguard Programs

- a. <u>Lifeguard Program</u> CARD is in the final stages of hiring guards for the summer season. In-service training at Sycamore pool will commence the week of May 21st. The official start of the pool season will be Saturday, May 26th. Lifeguard hours will be from 12-7 daily except for Thursday which is pool cleaning day.
- b. <u>Rangers</u> continue to work diligently noticing illegal encampments and providing support to partner groups in city greenways and parks. Rangers work with Chico Police to clear all camps before cleanup operations can begin. Rangers and Butte County ACS work together daily on camps. More partner groups are joining in, making the effort a 7-day a week operation.
- c. <u>Events</u> in the park are running at full throttle with most weekend days having multiple events occurring simultaneously. Rangers work closely with organizers to ensure safe and successful events with minimal impact to the park and the public.

- d. <u>Significant Incidents</u> A rash of vehicle burglaries have occurred on park properties in the last two months. These are classified in our reporting as either Penal Code 459 or 484. Hot spots for vehicle break-ins include Chico Canyon Rd/Centennial Trailhead and Peregrine Point parking area. Signs have been placed in both areas alerting the public to not leave anything visible or valuable in their vehicles. Additionally, rangers have encouraged anyone facing this mishap to report the situation thru the police department's online Cop Logic reporting system. Having the report on file allows reported stolen property to be returned if found. In speaking with victims, rangers report that a substantial number of people are not reporting these crimes because they feel nothing will come of it. '
- e. <u>One accident</u> occurred requiring medical transport last month. A recreational jogger fell after tripping on a Middle Park trail. The jogger was watching some horses ahead of him when he fell. He suffered abrasions and an unspecified hip injury.

4. Natural Resource Management

a. <u>Crew leader Trails Training</u> – The City partnered with Chico Velo Trailworks to offer a free training on April 14, 2018 on how to maintain and construct trails to those who were interested in becoming crew leaders to lead volunteer trail sessions in Bidwell Park. The very informative training, which included both classroom and on-site field work, was instructed by the Andrew Pellkofer of Trail Laboratories, Inc.

5. Outreach and Education

- a. <u>Ranger</u> James LeDonne conducted a park interpretive program for residents of the Lodge at the Sierra Sunrise facility in California Park. Highlights included park history and flora and fauna. Our well-worn taxidermy collection brought lots of discussion about the animals of the park as well as a lot of old timer stories. Ranger LeDonne also focused on easy access points to the park for senior visitation. The group showed an interest in visiting the City's newest park, Comanche Creek for a ranger led tour.
- b. <u>Ranger</u> Lisa Barge was able to share career path information for Durham High School students through a Q & A format. What surprised students was the depth of agencies and job duties among the two career paths generally referred to as Interpretive or Law Enforcement.

SUBJECT: Street Trees Division Report

NARRATIVE

Updates

- a. City of Chico Public Works has been invited by Cal-Fire to submit a full proposal for an Urban and Community Forestry Greenhouse Gas Reduction fund grant.
- b. Senior Tree Trimmer field test interviews were held. A conditional offer of employment has been made subject to successful background and medical clearance.
- c. Seasonal aide interviews were held. Two candidates have conditional offers of employment in the Tree Division subject to background and medical clearance.
- d. Letters have been sent to select businesses regarding parking lot shade trees.
- e. April 14th, Tree Division, Parks and Stream Team hosted a Rotarian group of volunteers in Bidwell Park. Over 230 willows were planted in the bioswale along Vallombrosa between Madrone and Crister.
- f. Meetings with representatives from Enloe Medical Center were held to review tree pruning plans on City street trees adjacent to the medical facility. Work is scheduled to commence sometime in May.
- g. UFM has started research on the descendants of Hooker Oak as part of the plans for the updated Heritage Tree Program.
- h. April 21st, Tree Division in partnership with Chico Tree Advocates hosted a free tree giveaway to volunteer participants at the Parks Divisions Earth Day volunteer event at Sycamore field.
- i. April 27th, Tree Division hosted an Arbor Day celebration with CSU Institute for Sustainable Development. Five Tupelo trees were planted. Chair Stoller recited the City of Chico Arbor Day Proclamation.

Planning/Monitoring

- a. Tree Permits The UFM approved fifteen permits in February. Three removal permits were denied.
- b. Damage Reports UFM completed two damage report for Risk Management.

Planning and Building development

- a. UFM reviewed four development plans. Tree issues encountered included alternative tree species choices and shade calculations queries.
- b. Two accident reports to Risk were completed.

Miscellaneous

- a. UFM continued discussions with landscape architects working on the Bruce Road widening project and to revise the tree palette.
- b. UFM worked with Code enforcement regarding unauthorized and inappropriate plantings in the public right-of-way.

Maintenance

- The tree contractor removed hangers adjacent to Citrus Elementary School.
- b. Aphid control spraying was completed. Individual trees were also treated for Elm leaf beetle infestations.
- c. Large oak safety removals were completed along Vallombrosa.
- d. Removal of Priority 1 large dead, dying and diseased trees is ongoing.

Outreach and Education

- a UFM held meetings with BEC and Butte County Master gardeners to start planning citizen tree planting classes for the Fall and Spring season.
- b. UFM assisted BEC with a California Re-leaf grant submission to plant trees in the City right-of-way. Plans include extensive citizen outreach and education. This will complement the Cities Green House Gas Reduction Fund grant, if successful.

Street Trees

- a. The Street Tree Supervisors monthly summary data tables for February are included below in this report.
- b. The 2018 priority tree removal list is ongoing.

Upcoming Issues/Miscellaneous

- a. The City will submit the full Cal-Fire grant proposal by the end of May 2018.
- b. Analysis of viable tree planting sites in the City right-of-way is ongoing. Interns from CSU have analyzed over 4000 identified tree planting locations. This research will be used to optimize future tree planting efforts. Analysis of old tree removal stump sites have also been identified in the field to analyze future planting viability.
- c. Preparations are being made to commence tree pruning along main designated trails in Bidwell Park. It will likely be five years before all trees can be pruned due to funding.
