5. BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Eric Chisler is promoting picking fruit from public trees for the good of the public and asked BPPC to bring more fruit and nut trees into the City's planting plans. The idea was supported by Julie Butler, Leslie W. Corsbre, Meagan Fischer, andMark Stemen and asked if it could be put on an agenda. Max Key is from "Grub" and picks several pounds of fruit from City trees every week. He would be glad to work with others to help the City have more food.

Commissioner Herrera asked if Commission was interested in agendizing this issue. Commissioner Emmerich would like it to be part of a larger discussion on food planting. She suggested having an informational meeting to get a feel from the public about interest on this item.

Park and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff said this cannot be discussed too much tonight. A member of the BPPC can ask for an item to be put on an agenda by written request. An email will do. It would be considered at the next meeting and then could become a formal agenda item. This particular item might

fit as a part of the work plan. Commissioner Mikles thinks it should not have to wait two months before discussion. Commissioner Brentwood would like it to be on the next agenda.

Commissioner Herrera asked for input about the potential removal of the planter at 5th and Main.

6. REPORTS

6.1. Tree Committee – Jim Mikles, Chair

Commissioner Mikles said this Committee met last week to produce a draft document regarding tree memorials in the Park. It is to be presented to the Policy Committee for further consideration. Committee agreed the concept of memorial trees is a good one, but putting specific plaques on individual trees would be difficult. It was suggested a person could contribute to overall tree care at \$25 and up and receive a card recognizing their help for the urban forest of Chico.

6.2 Policy Advisory Committee – Rich Ober, Chair

Chair Ober said this Committee knew recommendations regarding memorial trees would be coming from the Tree Committee so they continued their conversation on how memorial policies would work with Master Management Plan and other programs. Contributions to the Park could be honored in a number of ways. Tom Barrett would like to see the endowment fund started up again.

6.3 Urban Forest Manager's Report - Denice Britton

The Department is focusing on service requests in the downtown area and will move toward planned pruning. Plaques have been installed for Heritage Trees. Cal Trans has started the project to add lanes to the freeway over Lower Park. The first thing was removal of trees from the middle of the lanes and it has gone well. Tonight they will start working east of the freeway on their easement right-of-way and later will do the west side also.

Commissioner Herrera said BPPC did not talk about this project enough to learn if the community really wanted it. He asked about how park projects like this would be handled in the future. He would like to read minutes of BPPC meetings in which it was discussed and wonders if this decision is right for today. Urban Forest Manager Britton said the process takes so long that, when the work begins, the public often does not remember that a discussion was held. Park and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff said the City does not have much information on it as it is a CalTrans project and they have a website for the public.

East 5th Avenue landscaping is completed. The damaged airport landscape has been repaired, including broken irrigation lines. October 22 is the first tree planting workshop. Urban Forest Manager Britton is talking with interested persons about the proposed gleaning project

Commissioner Moravac asked about follow up to maintain landscaping required on new buildings. Financial institutions do not want to put more money into some properties left vacant.

6.4 Park and Natural Resources Manager's Report – Dan Efseaff

The new Field Supervisor for Park Maintenance in Jiml Logsdon. The crew is down two workers. The water quality testing contract has been updated and bids will open shortly.

The connecting trail at the Petersen Drive gate has been rerouted to avoid possible damage from falling tree limbs. A new portable restroom will be added to that area.

A report due to City Council on disc golf 6 pins at Hooker Oak was delayed to the October 4 agenda. There are questions about development and environmental inspection costs. Staff monitored gate closings for after hour access to Upper Park as requested by Chico Rod and Gun Club. Now we are waiting for interested stakeholders to provide additional information and suggestions for future BPPC consideration and action.

There are 57 culverts along Upper Park Road. Replacement costs would be great so staff is looking to reduce that number. Interns are evaluating, mapping, and photographing the culverts

to provide data on prioritizing maintenance and on road redesign as part of Friends of Bidwell Park intern program.

There will be a Ranger-led bike tour for Park Talk on Oct 29.

Management Analyst Smith-Peters showed photos of volunteers at work in the Park, including Love Chico teams out yesterday. Make-a-Difference Day is coming up on October 22. Chico High horticultural program continues to grow. Rangers will be working on educating the public on pet etiquette in the Park. New signs are up for Middle and Upper Park. Park Concessionaire at One Mile has not been in touch with the Park Division regarding the signage question so no action has been taken.

Chair Ober would like to ask the Head Lifeguard for a report on affects of the changes made in their office this year from the new concession stand being open. Park and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff will make that part of his year end report.

Jessica Erdahl, Senior Park Ranger, reported that bike warnings are lower this month and bike violations are mostly for not riding one way in Lower Park. Animal control issues are down and are mostly about the off-leash law.

7. ADJOURNMENT

Commissioners questioned meeting on October 31 (Halloween) and asked to consider other dates. Management Analyst Smith-Peters will check availability and do a press release if there is a change. Commissioners asked that the next meeting be held in October if at all possible.

Call to Order

Chair Ober called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. He explained the meeting date was changed from October 31 to October 26 to avoid Halloween events.

2. MEETING AGENDA

2.1 City Clerk Presentation of Board and Commission Overview

City Clerk Debbie Presson explained the procedures for guiding Commissioners and the public through commission meetings. The Brown Act is a California law that sets our guidelines in order to insure the public has a clear idea what will be discussed at each meeting. At a Special Meetings such as this, "Business from the Floor" cannot be on the agenda and there is no way to add an item. The City has several other established procedures for guidance as well. No action can be taken on an item brought up under "Business from the Floor" or mentioned in a staff report presented as information only. Upon a written request, an item can be put on the agenda for discussion and consideration. Upon Commissioners' agreement, it can than be put on the next agenda as an action item.

From the public:

Jeff Glasz thinks the policy seems odd and is disappointed his question cannot be dealt with tonight.

Dale Hutchings thinks the policy takes too long to get an item on an agenda. Urban Forest Manager Britton said staff deals with simple and emergency issues as soon as possible, but policy issues that may change the City Code take longer and should be more deliberative.

2.2 <u>Consideration of Commissioner Herrera's Request to Agendize the Discussion on Public Fruit Trees</u>

Commissioner Herrera would like to have a full discussion on developing fruit trees on public lands. He has written an email to the BPPC with that request.

BPPC Commission Minutes 1 October 2011

Urban Forester Britton said this issue falls under the Urban Forest Plan. Commissioner Herrera is asking about a much broader issue than would be covered for street trees. Staff suggests sending it to the Tree Committee for discussion.

From the public:

Dale Hutchings said the budget is so constrained that current trees are not cared for now. More trees would not be cared for so there needs to be more consideration.

Leslie Corsbie wants to promote fruit and nut trees. She and many friends are working on a plan to make then an asset and not a liability. Permaculture designers would offer a plan to have a sustainable city.

Max Kee has been picking grapefruit on private land and delivers juice to the owners. He prunes their trees and wants to educate people. He would be happy to help with any complaints and use the droppings for compost to feed chickens.

Urban Forest Manager Britton said she regularly gets requests to remove fruit trees because of the fruit drop. Natural Resources Manager Efseaff said that staff can often address issues that may come up during business from the floor as part of manager's reports at a following meeting.

2.3 <u>International Mountain Bicycling Association's (IMBA) Subaru Trail Care Crew</u> Request for a Trail Workday.

Subaru has sponsored a \$2,500 grant to bring a crew to Bidwell Park for an educational trail workshop on November 12. There would be a mandatory class at Sierra Nevada Big Room in the morning and work in the Park during the afternoon to apply what has been learned. No financial obligation is requested from the City.

From the public:

Renee Johnson said her goal is to bring in a third party to provide clear ideas for trail care in Bidwell Park. She wants to be a harmonizer and bring together City staff and bike riders for designing sustainable multi-use trails. She works in partnership with Chico Velo.

2.4 Review and Consideration of the Wet Weather Management Plan

Park and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff reviewed and discussed data collected in 2010-2011 in preparation for a revised "Adaptive Wet Weather Management Plan" to be presented to BPPC at a future meeting. Measureable information was tracked and evaluated to determine closure of trails in Upper Park or the Disc Golf area and procedures outlined. Staff will continue to evaluate and monitor designated site conditions, but there will be times when a judgment call has to be made based on observation. Staff will prepare a follow-up report with recommendations.

From the public:

Woody Elliott wants a pragmatic approach to get out the word that trails are appropriately closed. Have a specific trail to walk to make judgments. Make closure more effective with more signs and chain barriers. Have CalTrans put in gates.

Renee Johnson agrees with having more signage and better explanation of the decisions made. More information could be put on social networking sites like Twitter or Facebook.

SUBJECT: Consideration of a Permit for the Frost or Fog 5k and ¼ Marathon

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Commission approve the permit use application on the condition that the applicant adheres to conditions of use as presented on the permit.

Background

Under the Sun Events requests a permit to host a race in Middle and Upper Park on Saturday January 14, 2012. Applicant has held this event for the past 8 years and anticipates approximately 500 people. This application requires BPPC consideration as the group is requesting the use of non-intensive use areas in Middle and Upper Park.

Discussion

Past permits require adherence to park rules and the applicant must also provide sufficient monitoring to keep racers on the established route as well as direct traffic where the route is on the road. The park roads will not be closed to other uses. Monitors will need to be in place to restrict vehicle traffic, while allowing participants through. Adequate signage must also be in place in order to ensure racers follow the established routes and also to notify other park users of the event. Much of the route is along paths, trails or the road that can accommodate use during wetter conditions. The applicant will need to do a final inspection of the race courses at the conclusion of the event and remove all signs as well as pick up any associated garbage. In the event that the Middle and Upper Park paths, trails or road are closed due to unsafe or wet conditions, the race course will need to be altered accordingly.

The applicant request to start set-up for the event at 6:00 am and will be required to pay an additional early set-up fee if staff assistance is required before 7:00 am. The additional fee will be \$31, the Park Ranger hourly rate set forth in the Park Division fee schedule, 80.020.

Running/walking is a permissible use under the Bidwell Park Master Management Plan (BPMMP). The plan also notes that Middle and Upper Park are protected areas for primarily non-intensive recreational uses (O.Middle-1; O. Upper-2; O. Upper-4). The use of Middle and Upper Park paths, trails and road for the race is considered an intensive use and requires BPPC approval.

SECTION 3 CONDITIONS FOR PARK USE

You Are Responsible for Knowing the Park Rules. Please Observe the Following:

Alcohol Alcohol is not permitted in any City Park or Playground.

BBQ's Portable BBQ's may only be used next to existing BBQ's in Lower Bidwell Park and Five Mile Recreation Areas.

Must observe all California vehicular codes including one-way streets. Riders are expected to be courteous and yield to equestrian and pedestrian traffic. Helmets must be worn at all times in Upper Park, except when on pavement. Riders must stay on designated trails. Bicycle riding is not allowed in Caper Acres or on the pool deck. Bicycles

Bounce Houses

Bounce houses and other similar play equipment, such as dunk tanks or water slides, are only permitted with a reservation and upon approval by the Park Division. The operators of this equipment must provide proof of insurance. Bounce houses are not allowed at Wildwood Park or Caper Acres.

Campfires No campfires allowed.

No overnight camping allowed. Bidwell Park is a "day use park" only. Camping

Permittee is required to completely clean up area at the conclusion of event. Additional garbage bags may be obtained Clean up

from the General Services Department at time of reservation. (12R.04.180 CMC)

Any damage to City property as a result of this event will be repaired at permittee's expense. Damages

Dogs

Dogs may be off leash from 5:30 AM until 8:30 AM in Lower Park -- All other times dogs must be on a leash. Along the north side of Upper Park Road, dogs may be "off leash" anytime. While "off leash," dogs must remain under control via master's voice. Dogs are not allowed in Caper Acres, One-Mile or Five-Mile swimming areas, or designated

swimming holes in Upper Park.

Electrical All power extension cords, sound amplification equipment, and staging to be supplied by permittee. Permittee shall

provide "tripping" prevention devices over power cords crossing any pathway.

Fishing

Check California Fish and Game Regulations, http://www.dfg.ca.gov/regulations/, Freshwater Sport Fishing, Alphabetical List of Waters with Special Fishing Regulations, (20) Big Chico Creek. Horseshoe Lake: age 14 and over, catch and release; under 14: catch and keep.

Upper Park gate at parking are E is closed on Sundays and Mondays and during seasonal wet periods. Gates can be closed for approved special events. **Gate Closures**

Glass No glass beverage containers allowed in any City Park or Playground.

Horses Horses must stay on designated trails. Horses are not allowed in One-Mile or Five-Mile Recreation Areas. Horses

must cross the creek at approved crossings. Safe and courteous riding is the Park standard.

No loud or unusual noises are allowed, including: radios and headsets that can be heard over 50' away. Noise

Music/Amplified Sound at One-Mile Recreation Area, please, face all speakers away from Woodland Ave.

Lower Park is closed from 12:00 am (midnight) until 5:00 am every day, unless directly and actively proceeding to a Park Closures

destination outside of the park. Upper Park is closed between the hours of 11:00 pm and 60 minutes before sunrise

every day, unless posted otherwise.

Defacing of trees, benches, tables, any park fixtures, open ground, or paved roads/paths with markings, staples, tacks, or Signs/Defacing signs is prohibited. No pinatas, or accessories shall be affixed to trees. Only barricades, cones, or self standing devices

may be used for these purposes.

No smoking in Upper Park from May 1st - November 1. st No smoking in City Plaza or Caper Acres any time. Smoking

While in the 1-Mile swim area compliance with lifeguards is required for public safety. Pool is open and lifeguards are Swimming

on duty from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

No taking, cutting or injury of any vegetation in the Park is allowed. Vegetation

While gates are closed, limited use of vehicles to set up for event is permitted. Comments: Well organized event. Clean up was great, no trash left over and signs picked up on trail/road. Saw three to four vendors. One issue that arose is that they had an EMS agency on call at the event, SideTrax Emergency Medical Services. SideTrax had a Polaris Ranger ATV that was used to transport injured athletes. This is fine except that they were driving over the bridge at five mile. No damage done to area by vehicle.

Recommendations: Notify the event coordinator prior to the event that they should alert park staff that they will have an EMS agency at the event to coordinate responses and provide appropriate routes to drive on. Only issue with event is that runners did not safely cross the road going out and coming back during the race. Runners were on both sides of the road because some runners were crossing before the designated crossing area. Recommend that additional course monitors be placed along the designated route to keep people in order.

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Commission approve the permit use application on the condition that applicant adheres to conditions of the permit.

Background

Applicant requests a permit to host an educational faire at Cedar Grove on May 5th, 2012. This will be the 33rd year the Butte Environmental Council has held this event and they anticipate approximately 3,000 participants. This application requires BPPC consideration as the group is requesting to set-up for the event on May 4th, 2012, therefore requesting the use of the reserved area for multiple days and for more than 10-hours.

Discussion

The Butte Environmental Council requests use of the Cedar Grove meadow on Saturday, May 5th, 2012 for their annual Endangered Species Faire. They will reserve the meadow on Friday, May 4th at 12:00 p.m. for setup and on May 5th from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for the event. Additionally, they have requested to stage a staff person at the reservation area overnight for security purposes.

Two years ago staff implemented a new set-up method for faire booths that restricted vehicles from driving across the meadow. This method decreased damage to the meadow area, reduced safety issues and improved vehicle flow. Staff recommends this procedure continue to be utilized. Additionally, event coordinators should investigate additional parking options, as the parking capacity at the event site is limited. Possible options include use of the Nature Center and Park View Elementary parking lots. Coordination with the appropriate organizations should occur prior to the event and appropriate signs and parking monitors utilized during the event.

SUBJECT: Bidwell Park Flyers South Rim Paragliding Launch Proposal

Recommendation

Staff recommends conditional approval of paragliding at the South Rim launch sites for one year subject to the following restrictions: 1) allowed on a seasonal basis (January-May and October-November); 2) launching from the designated alternative launch site during the Peregrine falcon nesting season (February/March to June/July); 3) prohibited during the nesting season, if an active nest is documented at the site; 4) the Bidwell Park Fliers shall proceed with additional educational signage about Peregrine falcons to be approved by the Park Division; and 5) subject to an annual review submitted with annual report of paragliding in the Park.

Background

In 2008, Park staff received a request from Jon Stallman, a representative from the local Bidwell Park Fliers, to allow paragliding in Bidwell Park. At that time, the Chico Municipal Code (CMC) prohibited such activity. Mr. Stallman provided a detailed paragliding proposal and the BPPC approved the proposal in April 2008. The City Council adopted a Negative Declaration in June 2009 and approved amending the CMC to allow paragliding to occur at designated launching and landing sites in the Park. Staff worked with the paragliding community to develop a set of rules and guidelines for paragliding.

The Bidwell Park Fliers are proposing to designate two additional launch sites (a primary and alternate, approximately 800 feet west, to be used during certain seasonal time periods), located on the south side of Big Chico Creek at Peregrine Point. According to the attached proposal, there will be no need to make any alterations or improvements and launches will take place from "existing trail areas."

The Bidwell Park Fliers propose allowing the South Rim based launches on a "seasonal" basis:

- January to May (use alternative site February to May) and
- Possibly October to November.

Current launches from the North Rim are conducted during the Spring through Fall months due to the prevailing southern winds whereas a launch on the South Rim will allow paragliders to fly on northern winds. According to the proposal, "South Rim locations will only allow for flight on North winds, post-frontal, 5-10 mph wind speed, and a wind direction around 310 degrees....When conditions do provide for adequate flight, they occur within a small window just after a storm (Post-Frontal and winter prevailing, dry conditions)."

In addition to the limited calendar for south rim launching, these launch sites are designated as an "Advanced Rated pilot (P-4), which means fewer pilots are eligible for launching on the south side (in our area there are only 3 pilots with this advanced rating). The South Rim launches will also require foot access, like the northern launches. See attached proposal and maps for the exact the primary and alternate launch locations.

The primary launch is located on an existing trail intersection of the South Rim trail and would be used from May to February whereas the alternate launch site would be used during the Peregrine falcons' nesting season between February and May. The alternate launch site is located at the opposite west end of the trail and cliff line. This alternate launch site would keep pilots away from nesting areas.

The Bidwell Park Fliers currently have a website http://www.flyzephyr.com/bidwell.htm and their website does include a note about protecting wildlife, in particular the Peregrine Falcons that have been observed in the area. Their website states that pilots should avoid the South Rim area during nesting season from February to June. The number of flyers and timing would be a subject for review in a year.

The Bidwell Park Master Management Plan does not address this issue directly, but a number of objectives have bearing on the request:

• 3.5.2.4 Visitor Uses – Goal to continue to provide for a variety of visitor uses including quality recreational opportunities for users of all abilities.

Objectives:

- VU-2 Match existing and desired uses to the area in the park most suitable to a particular use.
- VU-3 Periodically evaluate desired uses by seeking feedback from user groups and community.
- 3.5.3.2 Biological Resources Goal: to conserve, protect, and optimize natural resource functions and values in the Park and maximize their integration with natural resources in surrounding areas.

Natural Communities

Objectives:

O.NC-2 Prohibit and/or limit the development of new facilities that will increase use intensity in sensitive environments, and require mitigation of potential negative effects on resources.

Terrestrial Wildlife

Objectives:

- O.TW-1 Protect sensitive (or special-status) wildlife.
- O.TW-2 To the extent possible, provide opportunities for nesting, foraging and hunting, and other essential wildlife activities for those species found within the Park.
- O.TW-3 Maintain Bidwell Park as a wildlife corridor between the Valley floor and surrounding foothills.
- O.TW-4 Minimize disruption of wildlife activity patterns.

Project Summary:

Bidwell park Fliers is proposing to designate an official launch location on the South Rim of the park for the express purpose of seasonally flying paragliders. The location will require no improvements or alterations. Launches are from existing trail areas. There are two sites, a primary and an alternate specified during seasonal requirements. While flight is allowed in the airspace above the park as understood by the FAA and launching from the North Rim is permissible by park authority. The South Rim is absent of a designated launch location. This proposal will provide the guidelines of intermittent, seasonal flying on the South Rim of Bidwell Park.

History:

Bidwell Park has been used for soaring foot launch-able flight historically dating back to 1976. In 2008 the North Rim was opened to paragliding flight with hike and fly designated launches. Three launches in total are designated on the North Rim. Last year, 8 pilots visited the area totaling just over 100 flights. There has been positive feed back by the public and no negative feedback reported. The launch sites are used from Spring to Fall with South winds. The winter provides little opportunity for flight from the North Rim as the winds are prevailing north. A botanical and CEQA study were performed with a resulting negative declaration (no to little impact). Our usage of the designated launch locations, after two years, has shown very little to no impact (pilots have removed invasive star thistle each season.) At the time of determining the launching locations on the North Rim, Bidwell Park Fliers felt that the South Rim and the deliberations surrounding the disc golf course were to be resolved prior to establishing a designated location for foot launched flight.

Estimated Calendar usage:

The South Rim of Bidwell Park will be accessed by foot launched pilots on an intermittent and seasonal basis (January to May and possibly October to November). The dynamics allowing for foot launched flight are completely dependent on weather conditions that are conducive for particular launch locations. The weather, including and not limited to, wind speed, wind direction, and vertical temperature profile must align adequately to the launch location to provide for flight. Therefore the South Rim locations will only allow for flight on North winds, post-frontal, 5-10 mph wind speed, and a wind direction around 310 degrees- indeed a rare alignment. When conditions do provide for adequate flight, they occur within a small window just after a storm (Post-Frontal and winter prevailing, dry conditions). The calendar months that provide these conditions are from January to May and again from October to November. All other months the area will not be accessed do to our intimacy with metrological conditions and Mother nature.

Estimated Volume of Usage:

The number of pilots accessing this site will be less in volume and frequency than that compared to the North Rim. The site is designated as an Advanced Rated pilot (P-4), which reduces the number of people and increases the required skill level. Locally, there are three avid pilots that would access the site.

Each of those pilots may fly at this site approximately 5-10 times in one calendar year. In total, we estimate that the area may see 20-30 flights total in one calendar year on the South Rim. Each flight lasts in duration between five minutes and four hours and averages one hour per flight

Skill Designation:

The South Rim location will be designated as a United States Hang Gliding and Paragliding (USHPA) insured site requiring an advanced paragliding rating (P-4). An Intermediate Pilot rating of (P-3) will require a sponsoring P-4 pilot. A Tandem rated pilot with a T-3, T-2, or experienced T-1 rating is adequate at this location. Each pilot must be a current member of USHPA, a registered pilot with the City of Chico with a signed waiver on file, and a member of Bidwell Park Fliers. These criteria are similar to the criteria for the North Rim.

Launch Designations and Alternate Locations:

There are two launch locations proposed, one primary launch and one secondary launch. Each launch is located at the only two locations adequate for flight on the South Rim.

Map:

Primary Site: The primary location for launching is:

Latitude: 39° 46.7468' N

Longitude: 121° 44.2292′ W

Altitude: 1,225 ft

The location is on existing trail intersections and is frequently accessed by hikers, disc golfers, and mountain bikers. The primary site will only be used from May to February.

Alternate Site: The Alternate location for launching is:

Latitude: 39° 46.6420' N

Longitude: 121° 44.4321′ W

Altitude: 1,095 ft

The location is to be used during the Peregrine Nesting season between February and May. The secondary launch site is located at the opposite west end of the trail and cliff line. See map

Limitations (Seasonal operations):

Wet weather guidelines:

Pilots will respect the wet weather rules for the area according to park rules. Inherently, pilots do not fly during wet weather and should the ground be saturated to the extent of pooling water and softened soils, we do not like to subject our equipment to potential moisture and soiling. We fly in clear skies with light, north winds with dry conditions.

Wild life:


The Bidwell Park Fliers recognize the nesting season of the locally residing Peregrine Falcon. While the Falcon is not an endangered species and is no longer classified as having challenged nesting conditions, we do see the need to protect wild life and mitigate potential disruption where possible. Historically, our usage of the air space has not impacted bird patterns (reference studies available). In fact, we often fly in harmony with Raptors, Falcons, Hawks, Eagles, and Vultures. Studies have shown that the nesting Peregrines are affected by movement on the ground below them. The falcons do not seem to be impacted by movement above their nesting location. To accommodate our usage of the area and the nesting and behavior requirements of the Peregrine Falcon at the primary launch site, we have proposed restricting the usage of the primary site during the non-nesting times of the Falcon. Therefore, the secondary site is located as far away as possible from the primary site allowing for us to avoid contact with the nesting peregrine falcons.


Additionally, our flight patterns are limited to the west end of the cliff line. We do not typically extend our flight to the east of the cliff line at the location of the nesting peregrine falcons. Repeated flight logged, GPS data shows that our lifting air locations are to the west end of the area quite some distance from the location of the nesting falcons.

Bidwell Park fliers would like to contribute a donation, from the Foundation for Free Flight, to the city of Chico to establish environmental education signage. We are proposing a donation of \$5000.00 to develop signage explaining the Geology, Geography, Habitat, and history of the area including notation of the nesting peregrines and precautionary guidelines for visiting the area.


Summary:

The proposal for use of this area is bound to specific times of year, two locations allowing for sensitivity of bird habitat, adherence to wet weather rules, and no development or improvements required or desired. There are no legal changes required to the park policies, insurance, or guidelines for Paragliding in Bidwell Park. We are requesting approval of two designated launch locations that will get extremely low usage relative to other multi-use areas and activities in the park.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Policy Advisory Committee review and consider a new Memorial Tree Donation policy for Commission consideration. Staff anticipates several meetings before the item comes back to the BPPC for review and adoption.

BACKGROUND

In June 2004, the BPPC approved a formal Policy for Memorial/Dedication/Recognition Opportunities within Bidwell Park (referred to as the "donation policy"). It was included in the 2008 Bidwell Park Master Management Plan (BPMMP) as Appendix M (see Attachment A). According to the BPMMP, Appendix M City of Chico Bench Policy M-1 (a), the goals and objectives of the program are as follows:

- 1) To strike a balance between meeting the needs of all park users while also protecting the park environment and eco-systems;
- 2) To raise funds dedicated to the maintenance of existing facilities and to build and maintain new facilities;
- 3) To provide opportunities to individuals, groups and/or organizations desirous of donating funds to the park for memorials/dedications/recognitions.

On September 14, the Tree Committee met and developed the guidelines provided below for a program they believe will provide a mechanism for donations and memorials without undue burden on staff.

REPORT IN BRIEF

At its 09/14/11 meeting, the Tree Advisory Committee reviewed and discussed items concerning a new donation policy for Memorial trees or donations to the urban forestry program. Staff suggested a policy that allows for donations to the forest as a whole, rather than a specific tree, to avoid a large number of plaques, etc. Since there is no policy within the BPMMP for street tree donations, staff researched other programs and has included the information in attachments.

The Tree Advisory Committee recommends the following donation program:

- 1) Provide a Commemorative and/or Memorial program that involves a donation in a person's honor. This donation would be a minimum of \$25. The donating party would receive a thank you letter and the person being honored would receive a card telling them of the donation to the City's Urban Forest. This program is based on the one in place at the Arbor Day Foundation, where a donation "plants a tree in the National Forest".
- 2) Adopt a Street Tree Program, which would offer a chance to adopt a specific tree or a tree in general, for a minimum donation of \$325. This is the amount that was determined to be necessary to plant a tree and get it through its first 3 years of establishment. It is the same amount as that required for mitigation trees, although that amount is update annually per the cost of living increase. Staff suggests that if specific trees are to be available for adoption, that they be larger, established trees, rather than newly planted ones. The main reason for this is that homeowners are being encouraged to plant and care for their own new trees and we don't want citizens to get the impression that they need to pay to have a new tree planted, or that they can pay the money to us to have it planted and watered.
- 3) A third item that surfaced was one of having a Commemorative Plaque (tree or wall or path) or other way to display plaques recognizing people who give donations to the Park and/or Urban Forest. Since there is a need throughout the Parks Division as well as Street trees, the Tree Committee felt this was better left as a Policy Advisory discussion.

SUBJECT: Review of Fruit Tree Policy

RECOMMENDATION:

A Summary Report is provided of the Tree Committee's November 9 Meeting. No action is requested at this time.

BACKGROUND

In September of 2011, the BPPC received comments from the public regarding opportunities to plant more fruit and nut trees in the City Right of Ways or on public lands. It was placed on the agenda for the October, 2011 BPPC meeting, where the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission referred the matter to the Tree Committee.

Specifically Mark Herrera suggested that the Committee Review:

- 1. Public planting of fruit (street) trees
- 2. Stewardship of trees planting fruit trees on public property
- 3. Converting some of the Public Plantings budget to fruit tree planting and production

REPORT IN BRIEF

- 1. The Tree Committee reviewed the Street Tree policy in regard to this matter, which is that citizens are allowed to glean fruit from City street trees as long as they do so safely and courteously in regard to the adjoining property owners and the users of the right of way; and that the trees are not injured in the process. The City does not have the resources to pick fruit from these trees, as was done many years ago, so people who pick City fruit are providing a service to the community. As such, the Tree Committee came to two conclusions:
 - a. The City should not change the current policy of not planting fruit trees along City Streets.
- b. If an organization wishes to formally glean from public street trees, they should approach the City to develop an agreement that essentially provides the group with an encroachment permit for that process, while the group would provide the City with a hold harmless agreement and Certificate of Insurance naming the City as Additionally Insured.
- 2. In discussion of the request to plant fruit trees on property within the City of Chico, Mark Herrera brought up that the planting of fruit trees on parcels owned by the City appeared to be consistent with the General Plan. Staff stated that the BPMMP, Natural Resources Mgt. Plan (Appendix C), specifically identifies invasive plants and trees as harmful to native vegetation within Bidwell Park, and has developed Invasive Plant Management Objectives (4.2) to reduce populations of such plants, several of which are fruit trees. Currently olives, plums, figs and persimmons are spreading in areas of the park. Staff suggests that this policy not be changed, and that planting of new fruit trees in or adjacent to greenways should be avoided due to their aggressive nature.

In reviewing the final General Plan it appears to be consistent in that the plan encourages the use of city-owned property for land uses other than municipal operations (Action E.D. -1.4.3 – City Owned Sites) and it encourages partnerships with non-profit organizations (Action E.D. 1.2.5 - Strategic Partnerships). In general, the Tree Committee supports the idea and concept of Community Orchards in conjunction with Community Gardens – or even in some City Parks, as long as there is a community group or non-profit that is willing to enter into an agreement with the City to plant and maintain the fruit trees for fruit production and so that they do become a nuisance to the site or the surrounding community. The Committee stated that should such an agreement be entered into it should be with the stipulation that if the organization cannot or does not maintain the trees, then the group would be responsible for their removal. Staff discussed the concerns of the Agricultural Commissioner in regard to remnant orchards within sub-divisions and the possibility of their harboring known pests of commercial orchards. The committee agreed that the development and care of an orchard was a long term commitment that required good planning and dedicated volunteers.

a. The Committee recommended that the Commission only approve such a plan when and if the BPPC is approached with a well thought out and viable plan that the BPPC could readily endorse. At this time, such a plan has not been proposed.
3. Provide funding for fruit tree plantings from current funding for landscapes. Staff recommended that the first two items be resolved before this third item is taken up, and that should funding be required the issue can go back to the Tree Committee and perhaps go before the Finance Committee.

1. Call to order

Chair Brentwood called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

Attendees: Commissioners present: Brentwood, Emmerich and Moravec; Staff present: Dan Efseaff, Parks and Natural Resources Manager, and Lise Smith-Peters, Management Analyst; Public present: Bob Jones, Renee Johnson, Juanita Sumner, and Andy Bruckman.

2. REGULAR AGENDA

2.1 Consideration of the International mountain bicycling association's (IMBA) subaru trail care crew request for a trail workday

Renee Johnson, a local mountain bike rider and trail enthusiast, presented a proposal for the Park Division to host a trail work day on November 12 with IMBA's Subaru Trail crew. The day will begin with a mandatory training for volunteers conducted by Park staff and IMBA Trail crew leaders and then in the afternoon, volunteers will work on a trail. Staff seeks a Natural Resource Committee recommendation for the full Bidwell Park and Playground Commission and will be taken up at the BPPC Special Meeting on October 26, 2011.

2.2 Update on the Middle Trail Rehabilitation Grant

Parks and Natural Resource Manager Dan Efseaff provided an overview of the progress made on the Middle Trail improvement project. He also described the next project segments to be worked on in the fall and asked for public input. He showed some of the improvements made via a powerpoint slides. The project will rehabilitate 6,040 linear feet of the Middle Trail with sustainable design features and restore erosion damaged areas. Workdates have been scheduled for the Park crew and CCCs for November and a week in early December. No action was required.

2.3 Consideration of a Re-Route of the Trail Leading up to the Monkey Face Overlook in Upper Park The Bidwell Park Master Management Plan's Trail Plan lists as a priority the re-route of trails in "known problem areas" including Monkey Face. Issues of erosion and safety are paramount and according to the MMP, should be considered a high priority. This is a project listed on the BPPC's current Work Plan. Manager Efseaff showed an aerial map via powerpoint of the current conditions of Monkey Face and described the erosion issues and unofficial trails made there. The planning and design for a re-route for Monkey Face will take place in the next few months. This will include receiving public input, field review and feedback on attributes and issues of the trails leading to this overlook. Some precautionary, such as the laying down of straw in heavily damaged areas, will help alleviate some erosion issues during the heavy rain season. Staff recommends consideration and conceptual approval of a re-route trail plan for Monkey Face.

Commissioner Herrera asked why there was not more notice given about the Sycamore Pool closing during the hydraulic oil spill by Caltrans' subcontractor Viking Construction. Staff stated that there were signs in place at the pool indicating that the pool was closed and Park Watch was at the pool to advise the public too. Staff reported that email notice did go out to the BPPC and Council at the time that park staff was brought in on the spill.

Commissioner Herrera also asked why the issue about removing the planter located at 3rd and Main Streets was not coming before the BPPC. Staff reported that the issue involved more than the BPPC and so was being addressed by the City as a whole.

SUBJECT: October 2011 Urban Forest Manager's Report

Prepared for verbal presentation at the BPPC meeting.

1. Updates

- a. <u>Field Supervisors Report</u> The field supervisor's report is attached. Their main focus was on trees in the downtown business area, service requests, and clean up of down limbs.
- b. <u>CalTrans</u> Staff met with CalTrans to discuss the removal of 6 walnuts on Highway 32, along Nord Avenue that are seriously declining with extensive decay. CalTrans is not planning to replace the trees at this time, although they would not object to the City replacing them. Staff will develop a plan for the planting of this site in the near future.
- c. <u>Hwy 99</u> Skyway Project -- Staff met with the project coordinators of the project, including Butte College and CalTrans, regarding the final acceptance of the landscape and the planting of the newly built planting strip along the Skyway. This planting strip was intended for use by Butte College, who is under obligation to City of Chico to plant the area as a result of an agreement made with the Austin family prior to the sale of the property. However, part of the site is on CalTrans ROW and they are not prepared to plant and maintain the area. They have, however, cleaned up the site and discussions among the stakeholders continue as to a final resolution.
- d. <u>Tree Pruning Contracts</u> Several small areas of trees are being pruned under agreements with local contractors, and funded through the maintenance districts. More areas will have pruning performed using this funding source in the near future.
- e. <u>Landscapes</u> –Carson Landscape Industries of Sacramento, was the successful low bidder and was awarded the City's Landscape Contract, effective November 1. Their company goal is to create a landscape environment that enhances the community, increases property value, and is reliably appealing to the public. Carson has subcontracted with the local company Sierra Landscape and Maintenance, who will work to get all sites into excellent condition. Lifescapes will terminate their contract with the City as of October 31, 2011.
- f. <u>CMD Contracts</u> Staff is preparing to have trees at several sites that are within Chico Maintenance Districts pruned on contract, rather than by City crews. The Requests for Quote have gone out for trees along California Park Drive, and Bruce Road.
- g. <u>Tree Planting Program</u> –Staff is gearing up to start the fall planting season and to market it aggressively in the next month. The first workshop is October 22.

2. Service Requests and Tree Permits

a. Attached is a list of completed and closed service requests for the month of September: North Valley Tree Service 1263 Glenshire Clean and thin 5 Chinese elms.

North Valley Tree Service – 9 Lindo Park Drive –Memorial Way trees prune limbs over yard and fence.

3. Future Topics

- a. <u>Memorial Tree Donations</u>. Staff met with the Tree Committee on September 14 and will provide a staff report to the Policy Advisory Committee for their next meeting in October.
- b. A new group calling themselves the Chico Gleaning Team has approached staff regarding removing fruit from City Trees. This same group came to the BPPC asking the City to look into ways to promote fruit tree planting in the City. The matter is currently on the agenda for further discussion.

1. Updates

- a. <u>Field Supervisors Report</u> The field supervisor's report is attached. Their main focus was on trees in the downtown business area, service requests, and clean up of down limbs.
- b. <u>CSUC Parking Lot Project</u> Staff met with the Landscape Architects and other City Staff regarding specifications for tree planting within the City ROW, and mitigation requirements for street trees removed for the building of the parking lot.
- c. <u>Labyrinth project</u> This project is essentially complete. They had a ribbon cutting on November 11, 2011. Issues remaining to be resolved include re-seeding of soil left over the lawn area around the labyrinth and planting of new shrubs to buffer traffic noise for labyrinth users.
- d. <u>CMD contracts</u> Staff is preparing to have trees at several additional sites within Chico Maintenance Districts pruned on contract, rather than by City crews. Pruning of trees along California Park Drive and Bruce Road have been completed.
- e. <u>Tree Planting Program</u> Staff provided a second tree planting workshop in which several people attended. To date, we have received 14 permits for a total of 25 trees.

SUBJECT: October Park and Natural Resource Manager's Report

Prepared for verbal presentation at the BPPC meeting.

1. Updates

- a. 9th and Hazel The spiral is complete. The site will need some repairs and adjustments to the drip irrigation system, replacement plantings, small tree protection, additional mulch needed in planting islands, and weeding, but the site is looking pretty good. Volunteers (especially Walter Mahoney) from the Southwest Neighborhood Group, and Kids and Creeks, have completed much of the work with City support and California Conservation Corps.
- <u>b.</u> <u>Park Field Supervisor</u> After a competitive selection process (including an outside panel), the Park Division has selected Jimi Logsdon as the new Parks Field Supervisor. While Staff has done an admiral job keeping up with the workload, we are excited to be able to move forward on several issues that were in a holding pattern.
- <u>C. Occupy Chico Status</u> A small group of demonstrators set up in City Plaza around the second week in October. They were asked to move from the Plaza to an area on the sidewalk. To remain in that area, they will need to receive an encroachment permit. They have been compliant with Park Division requests; although there has been an increase in homeless activities and issues in the area. Members of the group have submitted an incomplete application to use the Plaza and additional information has been requested by staff but not submitted as of 11/21/11.
- <u>d.</u> <u>BPPC Work Plan Adoption</u> The Chico City Council adopted the <u>BPPC's Work Plan 2011-2012</u> at its 9/20/11 meeting (see Attachment).
- e. Change in Middle Trail Project Based on review of the Project's Element 2 (an accessible trail component) and public input, a change in this element's location and scope has been recommended to the funding agency, CA Parks and Recreation Department. The original project would have created a loop from Parking Lot E, across a section of the Middle Trail and back along the east side of the lake. However, the trail grade would require an extensive reroute to make it an accessible grade and would considerably change the character of trails in the area. The proposed routes links Parking Lots C and E with the ADA fishing pier along the south edge of the Lake. The scope change will 1) Make accessible an established trail, linking parking lots C and E (see attached project map) both of which already have accessible facilities; 2) provide better access and linkage to the two primary Middle-Upper Park Trailheads (lots C and E) and 3) will support the Master Management Plan's Area Concept for Horseshoe Lake (Appendix F.). These two primary trail heads will also have interpretive, informational signs installed as Element 1 of this grant project.

2. Planning/Monitoring

- a. <u>Verbena Fields</u> Roger Cole of Stream Minders forwarded a report completed by James Dempsey and Orene Owens (attached) on changes in stream bank vegetation after project work on the Verbena Fields Park site. The report documents significant progress on the establishment of native plants, reduction of non-native plants, and identifies concerns.
- b. CAL-Trans Hwy 99 Construction Site Update Description
- c. <u>Fall Burn</u> Staff is planning for a 10 acre fall burn in Middle Park to prepare for a native grass planting and to reduce woody fuels.
- <u>Mative Grass Planting</u> Staff will be preparing new native grass planting areas in Middle Park. An area just south of Parking Lot A, the southwest corner of the intersection of Upper Park Road and Five Mile Road, and a swath along the roadsides of Wildwood Ave and Upper Park Road (to Parking Lot C). Some of the areas will be burned, but all will be mowed, planted with native grass seed, and treated with an initial herbicide application (to ensure that the seedlings have minimal competition). Established grasses will reduce the costs of maintenance (they respond well to mowing and reduce the need for future herbicide applications), be more fire resistant, and reduce the potential for plant invasion into the park from the road.

3. Outreach and Education

- <u>a.</u> <u>Butte College Natural Resources</u> Rick Wittsell's class Ranger Lisa Barge and Volunteer Coordinator Lise
 Smith-Peters spoke about Bidwell Park and took students on tour of the Sycamore Restoration site.
- <u>b.</u> <u>Butte College Connections</u> Elaine Ellsmore's class Volunteer Coordinator Lise Smith-Peters presented the Park's Volunteer Program and Make a Difference Day.
- c. <u>Park Orientation</u> Ranger Lisa Barge and Volunteer Coordinator Lise Smith-Peters gave brief presentations about Bidwell Park and the Volunteer Program in two CSUC's Recreation and Parks Management classes on 9/19/11.
- d. Park Talk On September 29th and October 16th Rangers led a bike tour through Lower Bidwell Park. They focused on history, natural resources and current management efforts. Additional themed tours will be coming up in the near future.
- <u>e.</u> <u>Park Division Information Booth</u> Park Rangers staffed a park information booth at the annual North Valley Health and Safety Faire on October 11th.
- <u>f.</u> News Releases The following news releases were distributed during the month of October: Park Talk: Ranger Led Bike Tour; Sycamore Pool Opening (after oil spill); Seasonal Park Hour Gate Change; Special BPPC Meeting; Trail Safety and Courtesy; Make a Difference Day in Bidwell Park; Dog Etiquette/Responsible Pet Owners; Wet Weather Trails; and Prescribed Burn in Middle Park.

4. Upcoming Issues/Miscellaneous

 <u>Paragliding</u> – We anticipate a proposal from the Bidwell Park Flyers for launching from the South Rim in the near future.

MAINTENANCE REPORT

1. General Activities

In September Park staff's main focus has been on infrastructure repairs in all areas and vegetation maintenance; clean up of the big oak at the One Mile band stand and additional trash patrols of Lost Park. Staff continues the daily cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including: grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths coupled with the daily cleaning and resupplying of all park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean ups and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

2. Project Updates

a. Lower and Middle Park: Staff has stepped up the frequency of Lost Park trash patrols to three days a week with an average of five to ten gallons on each visit. One Mile area lost another large Valley Oak in September due to a large fracture about sixty feet up. Petersen entrance on the north side of the park now has a portable toilet due to the many requests from the public and the switch out of vendors enabled us to add this much needed unit to the park. Lastly, the Lower and Middle Park signs have been mounted on the Manzanita Street Bridge.

- <u>b.</u> <u>Upper Park:</u> New portable toilets have been installed in Middle and Upper Park at the previous locations, our new vendor is Ben's Toilets.
- <u>C.</u> <u>Upcoming Projects</u>: October's work docket is filled with four weeks of trail grant work, the turf program (over-seeding) at One Mile; spraying invasive plant work sites; phase two of removing the Lindo channel bike jumps and restoration efforts there; barricade removal and realignment of Observatory parking lot; barricade removal and re-plant Upper Park Road from Observatory to end of barricades to the west. Start entrance enhancement at Woodland/Linden and Vallombrosa Avenues at Bryant Avenue.

c. Significant Incidents

On 09-27-11 a hydraulic oil spill associated with the Highway 99 expansion project was reported. Approximately 1 gal of material was released into the creek after an excavator line sprung a leak. Containment devices were placed in the creek, Sycamore pool was closed as a precaution and the material was cleaned up.

On 10-10-11, a group began a protest at City Plaza called Occupy Chico. The activists have set up easy-ups and signs and have been holding discussions and marches. Rangers have contacted the group and advised them of the park rules and camping regulations. They are currently set-up outside of the Plaza boundaries on the sidewalk and have contacted staff regarding the park permit process.

Bobcat and Mt Lion sightings have picked up this past month. Numerous sightings have been on the levee near Five Mile, but have also occurred in Middle and Upper Bidwell Park. Rangers are monitoring the activity, have installed educational signs and are in contact with the local DFG Warden.

In addition to the incidents and citizen complaints about illegal activity at City Plaza and Lost Park, criminal activity at the Bidwell Bowl Amphitheater has increased. Rangers and Police TARGET team have been focusing their patrols in this area. The incidents included warrants, animal control violations, illegal camping, assaults, disruptive behavior, drug and alcohol activity, vandalism, and other suspicious circumstances.

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Introduction

This report documents changes in stream bank vegetation after project work on the Verbena Fields Park site, located between Lindo Channel and East First Avenue near Verbena Avenue in Chico, California. The project aims to increase flood capacity for this constricted section of Lindo Channel and to restore native vegetation, among other goals. Detailed project plans and permitting documents are currently posted at http://www.bigchicocreek.org/nodes/projects/verbena/. The survey area is located down Lindo Channel from the Madrone Avenue bicycle bridge, extending just past the Verbena Fields property, which is a short distance above the Longfellow Avenue bridge. Appendix C contains photographs of the survey locations along the Verbena-Madrone reach of Lindo Channel.

The survey protocol used was the *Greenline Riparian-Wetland Monitoring* method, which was modified to use it with the USFS Stream Conditions Inventory (SCI) protocol. The intent of the protocol is to produce baseline data that can later be used to measure change in the vegetation subsequent to project work. During the survey, dominant plants were documented in transects parallel to the north and south banks, as well as in cross-section transects perpendicular to the channel. Annual grasses, Fremont cottonwood and mule's-fat dominate the vegetation along the Verbena-Madrone reach of Lindo Channel.

Potential sensitive plant species were not within the scope of this survey, nor were they incidentally identified: Ferris' Milk Vetch, Fox Sedge, Pink Creamsacs, Round-leaved Filareee, and Ahart's Paronychia.

The results of the May 27-28 and June 12, 2011 survey are included in Appendix A. Summary data for this survey of the Verbena-Madrone reach are compared in the Discussion to the 1999, 2003, and 2004 surveys of the upstream adjacent Madrone reach.

Materials and Methods

The plant survey was conducted using the modified *Greenline Riparian – Wetland Monitoring* protocol. *Monitoring the Vegetation Resources in Riparian Areas* was consulted for making appropriate survey distinctions with the Greenline protocol. According to the protocol, the greenline is defined as *that specific area where a more or less continuous cover of vegetation is encountered when moving away from the center of an observable channel*. Three components of data are collected: greenline transects, riparian cross section transects, and woody species supplemental data.

The greenline transect is 363 feet total along each bank, so the total north bank plus south bank greenline transect length is 726 feet. On each bank 363 feet was divided into thirds, each of three 121-foot sections encompassing both banks directly opposite of one another. The two most dominant species, loosely representing vegetation type, were recorded for 121 feet along each bank, with each 121-foot segment beginning at one of

the three cross sections. The three cross sections are numbered working upstream: #1 is the lower reach, #2 the middle reach, and #3 the upper reach. Greenline transects were placed upstream from each corresponding cross section.

We tried establishing the same zero point locations as in 2008. We found only the 1-south and 3-south rebar markers placed in the ground at greenline/cross section zero points during the 2008 baseline survey. The other zero points were reestablished according to detailed location descriptions from the 2008 field notes. Upland ends of the cross section transects were private property fences except for the #2 south cross section that ended at the stop sign along westbound East First Avenue at Verbena Avenue.

All transects were established by laying a measuring tape with zero at the intersection of the greenline and cross section transects, and then identifying the two most dominant plants within three feet of each transect line by holding a six-foot rod centered over the line. Woody species data were counted for each plant canopy dripline overlapping the rod survey zone, i.e. plants were only counted if they were considered to be rooted within this area. For each of the survey transects, the community composition was determined and recorded by measuring the total linear feet of each community type with a resolution of one linear foot along the tape.

Stability type ratings for the Greenline composition data were determined using ratings originally established by Roger Cole, Paul Maslin, Robin Fallscheer, and David Dziuk during a previous Big Chico Creek Stream Survey. Stability ratings estimate the ability of a community type to stabilize the bank based on a scale of one to ten, with ten the most stable. For each community type within the Greenline transect, the percent composition was multiplied by stability class and divided by 100, providing a stability index number. Stability index numbers for each community type were then summed to rate stability for the entire Greenline transect. Results may be characterized by a stability rating of (0-2) as very poor, (3-4) poor, (5-6) moderate, (7-8) good, and (9-10) is excellent.

The woody species data were collected from all transects, by tally of individual trees and shrubs. These were classified according to five development classes, accounting for single-stem vs. multiple-stem species: seedling (typically under three feet tall), sapling (3'-10'), mature (<50% dead limbs), and decadent (>50% dead limbs). Vining plants such as Himalayan blackberry (*Rubus armeniaca*) or grape (*Vitis*) were not included in the woody data.

Following the collection of data, vegetation type lengths and woody counts were converted to percentages to evaluate the overall composition of vegetation. Community types were determined by considering the dominant species. A plant species list was also compiled during the survey, based on personal familiarity with the flora as well as collection of specimens for later identification. The community type "barren" designates where cobble, sandbars, or bare soil is exposed and there was no plant cover. The community type "annual grass" includes various non-native grasses and herbs such as ripgut brome (*Bromus diandrus*), Italian ryegrass (*Lolium multiflorum*), wild oat (*Avena fatua*), rose-clover (*Trifolium facatum*), yellow star-thistle (*Centaurea stolititalis*), etc. as

described for the California Annual Grass Series vegetation type in *A Manual of California Vegetation* (1995).

Results

Tables 1 through 3 summarize baseline data collected in 2011 compared to the 2008 baseline data. Complete data for greenline transects is shown in Appendix A, Table A.

Discussion

The "Madrone reach" of Lindo Channel was previously surveyed in May of 1999 for the Big Chico Creek Watershed Existing Conditions Report (2000). The "Madrone reach" is described there as 492 meters downstream of the Madrone Avenue bicycle bridge, which is identical to the Verbena – Madrone reach of this report. Available data for comparison to 2008 was limited to the information in the 2000 watershed report:

It appears that this part of Lindo Channel has grown in with woody species and that fewer plants are now native, which is what might be expected. The increase in woody species from 2008 to 2011 is in part due to the substantial in planting of willows (*Salix* sp.) and mulesfat (*Baccharis salicifolia*) into the south Greenline of the middle reach (2 South) during the Verbena Park project.

Bank stability varies according to vegetation rooting along the bank. Annual grasses provide little erosive stability with their shallow roots, while strong deeply rooted willows, mule's fat, or cottonwood anchor the channel substrate well. Stability ratings for the greenline are listed in Appendix A, Table A. Overall stability rating from the 1999 survey was "poor" at 4.2, compared to 4.5 in 2008, and in 2011, 4.7 --still "poor" but improved, no doubt at least in part by the Verbena Park project work in planting of willows into the middle reach south Greenline. The adjacent reach upstream from the Madrone Avenue bicycle bridge was surveyed in 2003 at 5.8 "moderate" and in 2004, "good" with 6.8, after implementation of a bank stabilization project.

Fortunately, invasive giant reed (*Arundo donax*) and salt cedar (*Tamarix sp.*) were not seen in either 2011 nor 2008 along this reach, as they were in 1999 and further upstream in 2003. Few Himalayan blackberry (*Rubus armeniaca*) are currently present. The few privet (*Ligustrum*) found should –in keeping with the foremost weed control strategy of early intervention-- be removed before they mature to bear seed. Similarly for the seedlings of Chinese tallow tree (*Sapium sebiferum*) which have appeared since the

20087 survey, also needing removal and annual monitoring. A perennial *Euphorbia* is spreading alarmingly from a neighboring residence into the upland north side of the Channel, upstream from Verbena Park – again early intervention could save a great deal of trouble in the future.

Several small Spanish broom (*Spartium junceum*) occur in the main channel, an improvement from 1999 which had a fair number of Spanish broom two to six feet tall spread over the floodplain. Ongoing annual monitoring and removal of broom seedlings will be needed well after the current 2011 ongoing removal effort by a volunteer.

The Verbena Park project included hydroseeding a mix of native species, which is seen in the substantial change in the 2 South Cross-Section from 2008 to 2011. The result of the Verbena Park project is substantial increase in coverage of desirable native perennial grasses (*Elymus glaucus, Muhlenbergia rigens, Nassella pulchra*), native forbs (*Eschscholzia californica, Lupinus bicolor* and *L. microcarpus ssp.densiflorus*), and native trees, with substantial reduction of yellow starthistle (*Centaurea stolstitialis*).

The data contained in this report can serve to evaluate changes in riparian vegetation along the Verbena - Madrone Reach of Lindo Channel with future greenline surveys.



1. Updates

- a. <u>Prescribed Burn in Middle Park</u> On November 2, Chico Fire Department conducted a prescribed burn on a little less than 10 acres in Middle Park (see Attached ICS 202 Form).
- b. <u>Native Grass Planting</u> Staff is preparing for a native grass planting in Middle Park in the area that encompasses the area alongside roadways, and parts of the area burned this fall. The native grass seeding and herbicide application will occur by the end of November. Once established, the grass will make the area more fire resistant, provide wildlife habitat, and help combat invasive weeds.
- c. Park Division and IMBA Trail School and Workday Steve and Morgan Lommele, Subaru/IMBA Trail Care Crew from Boulder, CO were on hand to do a field review on 11/10 with our park staff. On 11/12, they conducted a trail school, providing information on trail design and trail construction in the morning at Sierra Nevada and then worked with 29 volunteers and the park staff on the Middle Trail in Upper Bidwell Park during the afternoon. Chico volunteer Renee Johnson wrote the grant and coordinated the training and work day.
- d. <u>Lost Park Weed Removal Project Continues</u> Friends of Bidwell Park with support from the Park Division volunteer program continues to remove privets from the north side of Lost Park and cleanup weed areas from the southside.
- e. Commanche Creek Vegetation Management Plan and Workday Park staff has met with members of the Southwest Neighborhood Association to discuss progress and plans for Commanche Creek greenway. Neighborhood volunteers will hold a work day there on 11/19/11 at 10 am. Volunteers are working with our Park Volunteer Coordinator to borrow tools and on recruitment.
- f. Middle Grant Trail Work Work will be wrapping up for the fall season. Many visitors have provided positive comments and the trail should be in good shape for the rainy season. The most recent Middle Trail work can be seen just after the creek crossing near Monkey Face. The work is likely to be very muddy, until it has a chance to "season" and compact a bit more, the public should refrain from using the section to prevent damage.

2. Planning/Monitoring

a. <u>Entrance to N. One Mile Restoration Started</u> – Volunteers during Make a Difference Day (10/22/11) removed vinca at the corner of Vallombrosa Avenue and Vallombrosa Way and CSUC Adopt-A-Park volunteers recently planted native plants at the site on 11/11/11.

3. Outreach and Education

- a. <u>Press Releases The following press releases were released in October: Prescribed Burn in Middle Park; Responsible Pet Owner; Seasonal Hour Changes; and Trail Safety and Courtesy.</u>
- b. <u>Sierra View Elementary</u> Volunteer Coordinator Lise Smith worked with 2 SV classes (Pam Waldsmith and Kate Carlisle) on November 1st with Timmarie Hamill of the Stream Team at their adopted site 27.
- c. <u>Dog Campaign</u> The "Be a Responsible Pet Owner" campaign was launched late October and included informational posters, a press release and article in the latest newsletter. Staff noted that since the campaign launched compliance with leash rules and dogs in prohibited areas has increased significantly.

4. Upcoming Issues/Miscellaneous

a. <u>Holiday Celebration at City Plaza</u> – A variety of community events are coming up at City Plaza including the Christmas Tree lighting on December 2, 2011 and the Menorah lighting will take place on December 20, 2011.

- b. <u>Highway 99 Construction</u> Over the next few weeks (11/28-12/9) access along South Park Drive under the highway will shift to accommodate the construction schedule. Pedestrian and bicycle access is still available and will be rerouted onto the paved path between the road and the creek. Future closures and detours are likely as the project proceeds. The project manager (Viking Construction) for the project is John Quiggle: (916) 416-8086.
- c. <u>Bidwell Park Golf Club Restroom</u> The Bidwell Park Golf Club plans to present plans for a replacement restroom on the course to the City and BPPC within the next few months.

MAINTENANCE REPORT

<u>General</u> In October Park staffs main focus has been on catching up all areas with vegetation maintenance, clean up of Lost Park and implementing phase two of the Chico nut bike jumps cleanup. Staff continues the daily cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including: grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths coupled with the daily cleaning and resupplying of all park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean ups and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

1. Project Updates

Notable issues for this month include:

- a. <u>Lower and Middle Park</u>: Staff supported the volunteer effort both at One Mile and Lost Park on Make a Difference Day. Herbicide application to invasive species target areas has been completed with the total undiluted usage of 104 oz of glyphosate, One Mile dam has had its yearly inspection and adjustments and the fish ladder has been stepped down for the winter and spring fish runs. One Mile turf program has been completed with the over seeding and fertilization of the south lawn for this season.
- b. <u>Upper Park:</u> Middle Trail Grant work has started with two weeks of CCC crews working to complete section six and then in November moving to section one to complete the much needed work in that area before the rains stop all work. Upper Park road and parking lot C have had the Telephone pole barricades removed in preparation for native grass plantings along the road and split rail with plantings in parking lot C
- c. <u>Upcoming Projects:</u> November's plans are to Install freeze protection to the west side water fountain at Horse Shoe Lake, thanks to a donation from the Chico running club. Start entrance enhancement at Woodland/Linden and Vallombrosa at Bryant. Burn and re-vegetate about ten acres in Middle park to control the invasive species spread in Bidwell Park.

RANGER REPORT

1. Updates and Announcements

a. <u>Reservation System – Staff</u> is investigating various on-line reservation systems to be utilized for both public and private park use permits. The new process will help customers to simply identify the location, content, availability and

cost of reservations and to make a reservation from any computer at any time using the Internet. The primary objectives of the on-line reservation system are to improve customer service, internal controls and accountability with the goal of decreasing employee time spent on routine recordkeeping associated with the traditional reservation process.

c. Significant Incidents

On 10-10-11, a group began a protest at City Plaza called Occupy Chico. The demonstrators have set up easy-ups and signs and have been holding discussions and marches. Rangers have continued to talk with the group about park rules and camping regulations. They are currently set-up outside of the Plaza boundaries on the sidewalk and have contacted staff regarding the park permit process. Police Officers and Rangers have responded to numerous incidents associated with the occupation including; smoking violations, illegal camping, public intoxication, assaults, disturbances, and disruption of traffic. Additionally, one subject was arrested after Officers responded to an assault report and the suspect resisted arrest.

Bobcat and Mt Lion sightings have picked up this past month. Numerous sightings have been on the levee near Five Mile, but have also occurred in Middle and Upper Bidwell Park. Rangers are monitoring the activity, have installed educational signs and are in contact with the local DFG Warden.

In addition to the incidents and citizen complaints about illegal activity at City Plaza and Lost Park, criminal activity at the Bidwell Bowl Amphitheater has increased. Rangers and Police TARGET team have been focusing their patrols in this area. The incidents included warrants, animal control violations, illegal camping, assaults, disruptive behavior, drug and alcohol activity, vandalism, and other suspicious circumstances.
