4.1. <u>Comanche Creek Improvements and Little Chico Creek Bike Bridge Funding – Housing and Park</u> <u>Related Grant</u>

The CA State Housing-Related Parks Program (HRP) provides financial incentives to cities and counties with documented housing starts for units affordable to very low or low-income households. HRP provides grants for the creation of new parks or rehabilitation or improvements to existing parks within a project area. Staff proposes a funding request to 1) implement initial improvements (including a bike/pedestrian bridge) to the Comanche Creek Greenway; and 2) complete a bike/pedestrian bridge across Little Chico Creek west of Hwy 99 that will connect Humboldt Avenue and Community Park (20th Street). Citizens from the Friends of Comanche Creek are working with Staff on the application. **Recommendation** *Staff requests that the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) recommends that the City Council adopt a resolution authorizing the grant application for the CA State Housing-Related Parks Program.*

4.2. Tree Permit Request: Tree Removal at 839 Rio Chico Way and 656 Cromwell Street

Landowners wish to remove trees at 1) 839 Rio Chico Way – 1 liquidambar because of repeated sidewalk damage due to roots and 2) 656 Cromwell – 2 Sycamores because of repeated limb breakage and damage to sidewalk due to root growth. The removals and replanting will be completed at the applicants cost. **Recommendation:** Approval of permits; and exploration of a Programmatic Permit.

1. REGULAR COMMISSION MEETING

1.1. Call to Order

Chair Emmerich called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.

2.1. Approval of Special Meeting Minutes of 10/23/13 and Regular Meeting Minutes of 10/28/13.

2.2. Permit for Run/Bike Chico Kidney Biatholon on March 22, 2014

The Chico Kidney Biathlon organization requested a permit to host a foot and bike ride in Lower and Middle Park on Saturday, March 22, 2014. The BPPC considered the permit because of request for use of non-intensive use areas in Middle Park.

2.3. Permit for Bidwell Presbyterian Vacation Bible Experience, July 23 – 27, 2014

Bidwell Presbyterian Church requested a permit to hold a vacation bible experience at Children's Playground during the week of June 23 – 27, 2014 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Children's Playground is not designated as an exclusive use reservation area per 12R.10 of the Chico Municipal Code and Commission approval is therefore required.

4. REGULAR AGENDA

4.1. Tree Permit Request: Removals Tree Permit Application: Removals and Pruning on Various Trees on Park Avenue (Stott Advertising).

Commissioner Moravec recused himself from the discussion as he is employed by Stott. Parks and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff briefly described the permit applications and summarized the staff recommendation. Stott Advertising submitted 5 permits to remove or prune a series of 17 trees along Park Avenue in order to allow for better visibility of 6 existing billboards. Under Chico Municipal Code (CMC Section 14.40.120 Permits – Required) -- no trees or shrubs shall be planted in or removed from any planting area in the city unless the BPPC or the City Council authorizes and the director issues a permit; or such planting or removal is required by order of the BPPC or the City Council. The CMC also provides for

- 1. The director to impose additional reasonable conditions, such as the replanting of a tree or shrub in place of that removed. (CMC 14.40.150 Permit Conditions upon issuance).
- 2. That the cost of removal of trees that are not dead or dying or pose a dangerous condition upon public property, the removal shall be deemed to be for the convenience of the property owner (CMC 14.40.170) and the cost shall be at the property owner's expense. (CMC 14.40.180).

According to Jake Morley, Stott Advertising, the company is willing to pay for the pruning, removal, and planting of new trees. Mr. Morley noted that the applicant feels strongly about the removal of the Pear Tree (1044 Park Ave).

Staff with input from the Tree Committee last spring developed a draft protocol for tree removals and replanting. Utilizing this draft protocol, staff reviewed the applicant's goals, tree health, nearby infrastructure, and the tree's aesthetic contribution to Park Avenue. Staff supported the removal and replacement of 9 trees, and rejected the removal of 7 others.

From the Public:

Woody Elliott asked whether costs included the plantings and labor and caring for the establishment of the new trees and whether the City would be responsible for paying this amount or the applicant. Parks and Natural Resources Manager stated that once the plants are in the ground that the City becomes responsible but that the applicant will pay for the removal and replanting of more suitable trees.

Hakeem Saleh questioned why such an issue is before the Commission and why they would spend so much time discussing it. Chair Emmerich stated that this type of discussion is part of the public input process and required under City Code.

Bill Mash stated that it is due diligence to have the discussion and that he hopes that the need for visibility does not become a precedence for taking out trees.

Chair Emmerich asked that the BPPC consider each permit separately.

4.2. Tree Permit Request: Tree Removal on at 1212 Downing Street and 668 Cromwell Street

Parks and Natural Resource Manager Efseaff introduced the issues at both properties. Landowners wish to remove a) 4 Yarwood sycamore trees at 1212 Downing Avenue and b) 1 Yarwood sycamore tree at 668 Cromwell Street because of repeated damage and potential hazards. The removals and replanting will be completed at the applicants' expense. Staff also requested BPPC exploration of a programmatic approach to help expedite requests for undesirable trees. Resource Manager stated that as part of the Urban Forest Management Planning that there would be a list of certain trees such as the Yarwood, Ailanthus, Privet and Hackberry that would not be used in the future as street trees.

From the Public:

Petie Padden, applicant from Cromwell Drive, stated that there is sidewalk damage due to the City planting the wrong type of tree but they would pay the expense of removing the sycamore tree.

Woody Elliott stated that an adaptive resource management approach enables the City to review past practices and make changes. He asked whether the sidewalk repair is the applicant's responsibility. Staff stated that sidewalks are the landowners responsibility according to Chico municipal code.

Parks and Natural Resources Manager Efseaff described a programmatic approach to the tree permit process. Such an approach would allow for a more streamlined process for applicants to remove undesirable species. BPPC commissioners indicated support for the idea that the details could be considered at the Tree Committee.

6.1. Natural Resource Committee Report

Parks and Natural Resources Manager Efseaff gave a brief overview of the Natural Resources Committee Meeting of 11/14/13 conducted at Caper Acres. The meeting provided a tour of the playground and a review of some of the problem areas that are in need of renovation. Consultant Greg Melton shared ideas from previous public input. Commissioner Ober asked whether the Commission would be involved in publicizing the campaign for fundraising and input. Staff welcomes Commission input and participation in the campaign.

6.2. Park and Natural Resources Manager's Report - Dan Efseaff, Park and Natural Resource Manager.

Parks and Natural Resources Manager gave a brief background on the transition from ServPro to the Sheriff's Alternative Custody program at cleaning Caper Acres. The participants in the program are doing well in Caper Acres and have been doing some vegetation management in areas near the playground.

Staff was able to close down all of the service requests for transient encampments. Through the Rangers' efforts and Sheriff's Alternative Work Program as well volunteer groups, such as Friends of Bidwell Park and Comanche Creek volunteers, there has been a month-long trash and encampment cleanup focused at Comanche Creek, Little Chico Creek, Lindo Channel and Bidwell Park. Over 150 cubic yards of trash has been removed.

CA Conservation Corps have been helping on the new accessible trail and will help with the Monkey Face reroute soon. There were over 350 volunteers out for Make a Difference Day in Bidwell Park and Comanche Creek.

Commissioner Emmerich asked about staff monitoring of how the sit and lie ordinance for the downtown area may cause more impacts to the City's greenways and parks.

Staff recommends the following conditions:

- 1. Continued adherence to all park rules.
- 2. Maintain participants at 500 and below the participant cap of similar events (500).
- 3. Set-up vehicles shall be restricted to one vehicle in closed areas and must travel on established gravel and paved roads and comply with all laws.
- 4. The applicant must provide sufficient monitoring to keep racers on the established route as well as direct traffic where the route crosses the road.
- 5. Per 2012 evaluation: Signage "should be designed to be more visible and located in several places.") Signage must also be in place in order to ensure racers follow the established routes and also to notify other park users of the event.
- 6. In the event that the Middle Park trails are closed due to wet or unsafe conditions, the race course will need to be altered accordingly and approved by the Park Division (the applicant has agreed to move the route to paved paths and roads in the case of a wet weather closure of the trails).
- 7. The applicant will need to do a final inspection of the race courses at the conclusion of the event and remove all signs and course markings as well as pick up any associated trash.

SECTION 3 CONDITIONS FOR PARK USE

	You Are Responsible for Knowing the Park Rules. Please Observe the Following:
Alcohol	Alcohol is not permitted in any City Park or Playground.
BBQ's	Portable BBQ's may only be used next to existing BBQ's in Lower Bidwell Park and Five Mile Recreation Areas.
Bicycles	Must observe all California vehicular codes including one-way streets. Riders are expected to be courteous and yield to equestrian and pedestrian traffic. Helmets must be worn at all times in Upper Park, except when on pavement. Riders must stay on designated trails. Bicycle riding is not allowed in Caper Acres or on the Sycamore pool deck.
Bounce Houses	Bounce houses and other similar play equipment are only permitted with a reservation and upon approval by the Park Division. The operators of this equipment must provide proof of insurance. Bounce houses are not allowed in Caper Acres.
Campfires	No campfires allowed.
Camping	No overnight camping allowed. Bidwell Park is a "day use park" only.
Clean up	Permittee is required to completely clean up area at the conclusion of event. Additional garbage bags may be obtained from the General Services Department at time of reservation. (12R.04.180 CMC)
Damages	Any damage to City property as a result of this event will be repaired at permittee's expense.
Dogs	Dogs may be off leash from 5:30 AM until 8:30 AM in Lower Park All other times dogs must be on a leash. Along the north side of Upper Park Road, dogs may be "off leash" anytime. While "off leash," dogs must remain under control via master's voice. Dogs are not allowed in Caper Acres, One-Mile or Five-Mile swimming areas, or designated swimming holes in Upper Park.
Electrical	All power extension cords, sound amplification equipment, and staging to be supplied by permittee. Permittee shall provide "tripping" prevention devices over power cords crossing any pathway.

Glass	No glass beverage containers allowed in any City Park or Playground.
Horses	Horses must stay on designated trails. Horses are not allowed in One-Mile or Five-Mile Recreation Areas. Horses must cross the creek at approved crossings. Safe and courteous riding is the Park standard.
Noise	No loud or unusual noises are allowed, including: radios and headsets that can be heard over 50' away. Music/Amplified Sound at One-Mile Recreation Area, please, face all speakers away from Woodland Ave.
Park Closures	Lower Park is closed from 12:00 am (midnight) until 5:00 am every day, unless directly and actively proceeding to a destination outside of the park. Upper Park is closed between the hours of 11:00 pm and 60 minutes before sunrise every day, unless posted otherwise.
Signs/Defacing	Defacing of trees, benches, tables, any park fixtures, open ground, or paved roads/paths with markings, staples, tacks, o signs is prohibited. No pinatas, or accessories shall be affixed to trees. Only barricades, cones, or self standing devices may be used for these purposes.
Smoking	Smoking is not permitted in any City Park or Playground.
Swimming	While in the 1-Mile swim area compliance with lifeguards is required for public safety. Pool is open and lifeguards are on duty from Memorial Day through Labor Day.
Vegetation	No taking, cutting or injury of any vegetation in the Park is allowed.
Vehicle Traffic	 While gates are closed, limited use of vehicles to set up for event is permitted. Vehicles must be in compliance with the one-way designation of the roadway, must yield to all other activities (walking, jogging, bicycling, and horseback riding), must travel with flashers on and may not exceed ten (10) miles per hour. Permittee shall provide adequate signs and supervision to avoid conflicts between vehicles, bicycles, equestrians, and general public.



Report In Brief

The California State Housing-Related Parks Program (HRP) provides financial incentives to cities and counties with documented housing starts for units affordable to very low or low-income households. HRP provides grants for the creation of new parks or rehabilitation or improvements to existing parks within a project area. Staff proposes a funding request to 1) implement initial improvements (including a bike/pedestrian bridge) to the Comanche Creek Greenway; and 2) complete a bike/pedestrian bridge across Little Chico Creek west of Hwy 99 that will connect Humboldt Avenue and Community Park (20th Street). Citizens from the Friends of Comanche Creek are working with Staff on the application.

Recommendation

Staff requests that the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) recommends that the City Council adopt a resolution authorizing the grant application for the CA State Housing-Related Parks Program.

Fiscal Impact

The State's HRP Program uses a formula to award funds; all cities and counties who meet the eligibility requirements will be funded. No match from the City is required. At this time, the City of Chico may be eligible for a total award around \$742,750. After submission, HCD determines if the City qualifies for an additional bonus under the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) based on the number of eligible extremely low, very low, and low-income bedrooms. The City may qualify for an additional funds potentially increasing the funding to approximately \$1,034,975.

The funding would allow for the basic infrastructure to open the Comanche Creek Greenway, but additional funds would be needed for operation and safety (estimated at about \$17,000 annually) of the site. However, the Friends of Comanche Creek are actively seeking donations from area businesses to cover the Park Division's maintenance costs of the opening for the first three years. The bicycle/pedestrian bridge at Little Chico Creek will have nominal initial maintenance costs.

Background

The City of Chico owns approximately 20 acres along Comanche Creek between the Midway and the Union Pacific Railroad line. The land is undeveloped with restricted public access. The City intends to improve the site and create a greenway for the surrounding neighborhood, employment centers, and the greater Chico community to enjoy. The City took steps toward this goal by approving the Comanche Creek Vegetation Management Plan (2008), Comanche Creek Greenway Management Plan (January 31, 2012), and the Comanche Creek Greenway Improvement Project Plan (2012). The bike/pedestrian bridge over Comanche Creek supports connectivity goals (between neighborhoods and business areas) of the City's General Plan 2030.

Comanche Creek area is also within the Southwest Chico Neighborhood Improvement Plan (approved in 2008). The Southwest Neighborhood Creeks, Parks & Open Space Action Group worked with City staff for two years, which work consisted of meetings, site visits, and multiple workshops, to develop the Comanche Creek Greenway Improvement and Management Plans. This group's members represent diverse stakeholders including neighborhood residents, business and landowners, bicyclists, employees, and environmentalists. The project implementation plan includes construction of vehicle parking areas and kiosks, trail improvements, removal of invasive plants, a bicycle/pedestrian bridge, benches and picnic tables, Class I bicycle path, and ADA accessible entrance.

Since 2010, volunteers from Friends of Comanche Creek Greenway, Southwest Barber Neighborhood Association and from the Park Division Volunteer Program have contributed over a 1,000 hours of labor in weed management, trash removal, and oak regeneration at the site to prepare the greenway for public access. The Friends of Comanche Creek Greenway have had in-kind donations of over \$2,000, including 4-40 yd. bins. They are also assisting staff with preparing the HRP application and will continue to provide volunteer hours throughout its implementation (Attachment A).

The proposed bike and pedestrian bridge at Humboldt Ave. just west of Hwy 99 and stretching over Little Chico Creek will connect bike paths coming from Community Park on 20th Street (from the south) to bike paths north of the creek. The bike path runs the on the easternly portion of the large Chapmantown neighborhood and will be instrumental in increasing connectivity between Chapmantown and the Community Park, and to the downtown area and Bidwell Park. Elementary and secondary students will be able to use safe bike paths to reach several elementary schools (Chapman, Little Chico Creek, Parkview and Sierra View) and Marsh Jr. High School.

Discussion

The State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is funding a total of \$25 million in the 2013 Program Year for the Housing-Related Parks Program (HRP). The HRP Program is an innovative program designed to reward cities and counties that approve housing for lower-income households and comply with State Housing Element Law. The HRP provides financial incentives to cities and counties with documented housing starts for units affordable to very low or low-income households. HRP provides grants for the creation of new parks or rehabilitation or improvements to existing parks within a project area.

The grant provides funds for parks and recreation projects that benefit the community and add to the quality of life. The two proposed park projects do not have to be tied to the housing units used to qualify for the base grant award.

Staff proposes a funding request to 1) implement initial improvements (including a bike/pedestrian bridge) to the Comanche Creek Greenway; and 2) complete a bike/pedestrian bridge across Little Chico Creek west of Hwy 99 that will connect Humboldt Avenue and Community Park (20th Street). Citizens from the Friends of Comanche Creek are working with Staff on the application.

The BPPC adopted the "Improvement Plan" in January 2012 (City of Chico, 2012).

The funding request may be summarized as follows:

- Comanche Creek implement Phase I improvement plan (basic improvements) and construct bike and pedestrian bridge that to cross the creek. Phase II, the creation of Class I paved bicycle paths throughout the site (and along the railroad right of way) is not part of the proposed grant application. Phase I of the Comanche Creek improvements is estimated at \$700,000.
- 2. Little Chico Creek construct a bike/pedestrian bridge and connections over Little Chico Creek west of Hwy 99, which will connect the City's bike paths from Humboldt Avenue (Greenway) and Community Park (20th Street), contributing to a more functional bike route system. The grant funding will enable the City to fulfill the goals of the 2030 General Plan, City of Chico Bike Plan and Comanche Creek Greenway Improvement Project (2012). Costs are estimated around \$525,000 of which the HRP grant would provide \$350,000. Other grants or Fund 305 (Bicycle Path Fund) will provide the additional funding.

The projects will be scalable to allow for funds to pay for a portion of the projects or add to them (i.e. add the paved bike path) if costs come under budget.

Environmental Review

For the Comanche Creek project, the environmental document is complete, yet permits will still need to be acquired for the bike/pedestrian bridge that spans Comanche Creek. The environmental document as well as the required permits have been completed for the Little Chico Creek project.

To Bidwell Park and Playground Commissioners,

In 2008, soon after the acceptance of the Southwest Chico Neighborhood Improvement Plan, the Parks and Greenways Action Committee began meeting regularly, and the concept of the Comanche Creek Greenway as a public passive park was developed. Early in 2011, volunteers began meeting regularly on site to identify trail sites, bike paths, areas in need of improvements and amenities, and sites of public interest. Working with city staff and volunteers, Management and Improvement Plans were drafted. Monthly volunteer workdays were coordinated, in partnership with the city, to clear invasive species and establish access points to the creek. In 2011, the Steering Committee of the Southwest Chico Neighborhood Improvement Plan voted to allocate funding to the opening of the Comanche Creek Greenway. (This money was lost with the abolition of California's Redevelopment Agencies.)

In 2012, the Comanche Creek Greenway Management Plan, and the Comanche Creek Greenway Improvement Project were approved by the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission. Monthly volunteer workdays, coordinated by the Friends of Comanche Creek Greenway, continued and expanded in scope to include clean-up of the creek and vacated encampments, with outreach to the Southwest Chico Neighborhood network, and to all community members by way of the Bidwell Park and Chico Greenways Volunteer Calendar. The workdays have become bi-monthly, and have engaged the participation of many community groups, including numerous Chico State and Butte College fraternities and sororities, Community Action Volunteers in Action, Butte Environmental Council, the Barber Neighborhood Association, the California Conservation Corps and the Sherriff's Work Alternative Program.

In addition to coordinating the many hours of labor that have been invested in this project, we have received numerous in-kind donations from numerous sources, including Recology, Supervisor Steve Lambert's office, Costco, Starbuck's, Scott Wineland, Jim Dempsy, and Moore Fencing.

We realize that the city is not in a position at this time to fund the improvements specified in the CCG Project. We have identified an appropriate funding source (the Housing-Related Parks Program) and request your support of our grant application, which is due by January 22, 2014.

Dear Parks and Playground Commissioners:

The purpose of this communication is to provide a summary of the work done thus far by Friends of Comanche Creek Greenway (FCCG) in raising funds to implement the Comanche Creek Management Plan and the Comanche Creek Greenway Improvement Project which was approved by the Parks and Playground Commission and the Chico City Council in January 2012. This letter is in reference to the grant application for improvements and development of the Greenway that FCCG proposes to apply for in partnership with this Commission and the City Council.

After the City of Chico adopted the Management and Improvement Plans, the Redevelopment Agency money that was allocated for implementation and development was lost when the State of California dissolved the Agency. Since early 2011, FCCG has been making improvements through bimonthly volunteer workdays, clearing invasive vegetation from large sections of the greenway that were once covered with thick growth of Himalayan blackberry, yellow star thistle, puncture vine, and Johnson grass. For the last few months we have also been removing debris from evacuated encampments. In addition, we recently funded the chemical treatment of a large stand of ailanthus in preparation for removal.

In July, we obtained nonprofit status through the North Valley Community Foundation and began fund raising during the Annie B's campaign. We have appealed to the residents of the Southwest Chico Neighborhood planning area and have begun outreach to the Meyers Street and Hegan Lane business owners whose properties adjoin the greenway. Our plan is to develop a sponsorship program to raise the maintenance and enforcement budget estimates noted in the Management plan, \$15,000 to \$25,000 annually.

In the short time that we've been working on this effort we have begun to work with representatives of several area businesses. Each has expressed an interest in working with FCCG to build a sponsorship program for maintenance of the Greenway by their business neighbors and colleagues, if the City demonstrates a commitment to open the greenway and implement what they approved in 2012.


We hope we can count on your support by approving our proposal to apply for a Housing-Related Parks Program Grant.

Description of request	Submitted a permit to remove 1-20" diameter liquidambar tree growing with in the City ROW.
Reason for Request	The reason for wanting to remove the tree is because of the invasive roots that have raised the sidewalk. The tree roots have damaged the sidewalk and curb creating a major trip hazard.
	Mike is willing to pay a contractor to remove the liquidambar tree, replace the broken sidewalk, and replace with a new tree that is better suited for the planter size at no cost to the City of Chico. Citizens are required to maintain and repair sidewalk fronting a public street pursuant to CMC 14.20.030.
Staff Observations and Recommendations	The current conditions of the sidewalk do not meet ADA standards.
	It would require major root pruning in order to replace the sidewalk to City code. This would result in the cutting of most of the anchoring roots causing the tree to become unstable. I feel that we should consider approving this permit as long as the property owner is willing to pay a contractor to replace the sidewalk and remove the problem tree and replace it with a tree better suited for the planter size at no cost to the City of Chico.



Description of request	Submitted a permit to remove 2 -22" diameter sycamore tree growing with in the City ROW.	
Reason for Request	The reasons for removing the trees are based on multiple broken limbs that occur throughout the 6 month growing period that are a public hazard to anyone parking along the street or walking down the sidewalk. Also the invasive root system is lifting the sidewalk, driveway, and creating an environment that is not compliant for ADA standards. The trees and roots are simply too large for the planter space. This has been an ongoing public safety concern with the entire neighborhood especially with the underground utilities. Mary Rooney is willing to pay a contractor to remove the 2 sycamore trees and replace them with 2 new trees that are better suited for the planter size at no cost to the City of Chico. Citizens are required to maintain and repair sidewalk fronting a public street pursuant to CMC 14.20.030.	
Staff Observations and Recommendations	These trees are high maintenance and have a reputation of having an invasive root system. I feel that we should consider approving this permit as long as the property owner is willing to pay a contractor to remove the problem sycamore trees and replace with trees better suited for the planter size at no cost to the City of Chico.	







This sycamore in the F:2 position was planted on top of the sewer lateral that runs from the street to the house. The S in the curb stands for "sewer".



This sycamore tree in the F:1 position has underground utilities a few feet away of the main trunk. They run underground in the dirt area to the gray box labeled PG&E. The utilities in this area consist of phone, cable, gas, and electicity.

NARRATIVE

1. Updates

- a. <u>Bidwell Park Municipal Golf Course Alcohol Exemption</u> The City Council will review the BPPC recommendation to allow the golf course to move forward with a proposal to serve alcohol at the December 17, 2013 meeting.
- b. <u>Tree Permit Appeal</u> At last month's BPPC meeting, the Commission approved the removal of 9 trees (applicant had requested 16 and the pruning of 6 trees and monitoring of 2 (applicant had requested 1). Subsequent to the decision, the applicant filed an appeal to the Council contesting the BPPC decision to retain, prune, and monitor; rather than remove a pear tree (1944 Park Avenue). The item will likely be heard at the January 20th, 2014 City Council meeting.

2. Administrative and Visitor Services

a. <u>Run for Food</u> – The event hosted an estimated 5000 registered participants (last year's event raised \$96,000 for the Jesus Center). The event is notable for its size and also as the Ranger evaluation notes, "...This event and the organizers are a model for events of any size in the park." The course changed this year to avoid the north One Mile parking area and Vallombrosa Way, which worked fine. Volunteers were ample, friendly and easily recognizable in their neon safety vests. Butte County Search and Rescue volunteered to help with the event again this year and had multiple personnel along the race route to assist with any incidents. One child was separated from his parent for about 20 minutes but was reunited with his mother at one of the volunteer stations. The only other incident involved all the portable toilets lacking toilet paper. The situation was remedied quickly as the Jesus Center brought toilet paper in to stock all the portable restrooms. The area was left clean and no damage was observed. Ambulance personnel were staged on Sycamore Way for the event."

3. Planning/Monitoring

a. <u>Caper Acres</u> – The Natural Resource Committee, Melton Associates, and Staff hosted a public tour of Caper Acres to examine the facilities and receive input on any improvements.

4. Maintenance Program

Staff continues daily cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including: grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths, coupled with daily cleaning and re-supplying of all park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean up and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

- a. <u>Lower Park -</u> Park staff in tandem with Park Rangers have increased efforts to daily removal and patrolling of known camps in Lower Bidwell Park along with the opening up of sight lines via brush removal and tree elevations have brought us some success in displacing the transient population from Lower Bidwell Park. Staff has started work on the re-vegetation site at North One Mile pedestrian bridge the site will host acorns from various valley oaks, native grasses and plants. The ACS group from the Butte county sheriff's department started this month at Caper Acres with their biweekly visits to clean restrooms and maintain the grounds.
- b. <u>Middle Park -</u> Staff has started the fall turf program both at One Mile and Five Mile, by aerating the lawns and will be followed by a lite application of compost to feed the soil.
- c. <u>Upper Park -</u> Staff in conjunction with the California Conservation Corps have completed the ADA section of the Middle Trail Grant, which connects parking lot E to the Observatory parking lot. Staff is now working on securing Monkey Face trail reroute to be followed by the re-claiming of the damaged areas on the face of the butte.

d. <u>Upcoming Projects</u> - Grading of all parking lots, Planting of middle park burn areas, next phase of Monkey face rehabilitation, plant out native plant sites.

5. Ranger and Lifeguard Programs

- a. <u>Schedule change</u> Seasonal Ranger Eric Willadsen is off staff for the months of Dec. Jan. and Feb. The remaining 2 rangers are doing everything possible to provide the maximum amount of coverage in the parks and greenways.
- b. <u>New Ranger Representative</u> the Park Ranger's Association of California recruited Sr. Ranger Shane Romain as a board member director representing Central/Northern California, Region 3.
- c. <u>Recovery</u> Ranger Lisa Barge assisted Search and Rescue personnel in Upper Park over the weekend of 11/23 and facilitated communications between agencies and provide direction. Sadly, the person was found, deceased. At this time the death is being categorized as a suicide.
- d. <u>Clean Up Efforts</u> With the rainy season just around the corner, the Park Division focused efforts on cleaning up homeless encampments and trash from throughout the City's greenways and creeks. The total amount of debris removed by Park Rangers, Maintenance and SWAP from Big Chico Creek, Little Chico Creek, Comanche Creek and Lindo Channel from mid-October to early November was equal to 150 yards or 13 tons! An additional 40 yards of debris has been removed, mostly from Lower Park, Annie's Glenn and Lost Park. Several bikes have been recovered from the illegal encampments. After checking serial #s, rangers have found at least 10 that have returned as stolen. Volunteers have also been instrumental in cleaning up camps and removing trash from the watershed. Volunteers removed about 43 bags of trash and recycling weighing close to 645 lbs.
- e. Significant Incidents See table 5.

6. Natural Resource Management

a. <u>Pile Burns</u> – As part of continuing fuels reduction efforts, Parks will work with CALFire (Salt Creek) Crews to burn piles in Middle Park. The burn was delayed until we get substantial rain.

7. Outreach and Education

- a. News Releases for November -- Caper Acres Tour Focus of Park's Natural Resources Meeting.
- b. <u>55+ Club Presentation</u> Park Services Coordinator discussed Park issues, volunteering and donations to Bidwell Park at the Lakeside Pavilion as part of CARD's 55+ Club monthly meeting.

8. Street Trees and Landscapes

a. Monthly Highlights

On November 12th Aaron Holt was hired back to the department as an hourly Senior Tree Maintenance Worker. He has been responding to emergency down limbs and hangers as well as smaller removals and traffic safety pruning. With Aaron working on a daily basis it has improved response time for emergency calls. Since Aaron has been back the emergency contractor Petersen Tree Care has not been used during the month of November.

b. Projects Completed:

- 1. 29 Service Request- a detailed list is attached.
- 2. Down Limbs and Hangers- 38 hours (42 locations).
- 3. Safety Meetings- 1 hour.
- 4. Prep Time and DOT Inspections- 12 hours.
- 5. GIS Tree Inventory- 95 hours.
- 6. Equipment Maintenance- 6 hours.
- 7. Grates and Cages- 2 hours (1-repair).
- 8. Traffic Safety Pruning- 38 hours (90 trees).
- 9. School Zone Pruning- 1 hour (2 trees).
- 10. Priority Removals- 17 hours (12 dead or dying trees removed).
- 11. Emergency Tree Work- Petersen Tree Care 0 hours.

c. Tree Call Outs:

1. There were no call outs for the month of November.

d. Tree Permits:

1. 14- Pruning/Removal Permits were approved for the month of November.

9. Volunteer and Donor Program

- a. <u>Sycamore Restoration Site</u> Park volunteers many from the Community Action Volunteers in Education Program helped plant native plants in the Sycamore Restoration site on Saturday, November 16. The plantings were placed in the area north east of the Council Ring and sandbar willow was planted into the bank to help stabilize it.
- b. <u>One Mile Recreation Area</u>– Soroptimists International of Chico planted deergrass, and gum plant in the large circular planting toward the western parking lot where a large oak tree had been years ago.
- c. <u>Sierra View Elementary School</u>– Over 30 4th grade students from two classes (Pam Waldsmith's and Kim Wilson's) helped remove vinca and plant native plants in their adopted picnic site #27. Students also participated in a third education station featuring the enviroscape model that show the issues of city runoff into the watershed.
- d. <u>Kids and Creeks</u> -- Hosted several workdays at Verbena Fields. The work days including learning stations, weed removal and identification and learning about watershed health.
- e. <u>Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities</u>
 - i. <u>CAVE</u> The Park Division will start recruiting for the Spring 2014 Community Action Volunteers in Education program in January.
