Conditions

Staff recommends the following additional conditions:

- Motorized vehicles, except for the fish delivery vehicle, are restricted to designated roadways and parking areas.
- Meet with the Rangers to implement auxiliary parking. It is imperative going forward to discuss parking alternatives with Rangers.
- Applicant will review the event with rangers (including the route for the fish delivery vehicle (approved by Director).
- Applicant to consider stocking Horseshoe Lake with *less* fish so the issue of dead fish post event does not become problematic for the maintenance department.
- The permittee should continue to promote and use a shuttle system to bring people in from satellite parking areas to
 minimize impacts to roads and parking lots near Horseshoe Lake. Monitors shall organize parking and maximize
 available parking spaces. It is suggested that monitors communicate via radios with staff to avoid confusion and relay
 up to date info on parking statuses to those directing cars into the park.
- Applicant shall provide a minimum of five (5) portable toilets with a minimum of two (2) ADA toilets.
- Signs shall not be affixed to trees in any fashion. Sponsor signs and advertisements must comply with all park rules.
- Styrofoam bait containers and lead sinkers are prohibited.
- Applicant shall clean shoreline and accessible vegetation of Horseshoe Lake four times (4) during the two weeks following the event, including the fishing line waste containers.
- Recommend, at applicant's expense, presence of EMS on site.

Glass

No glass containers allowed in any City Park or Playground.

Horses

Horses must stay on designated trails. Horses are not allowed in One-Mile or Five-Mile Recreation Areas. Horses must cross the creek at approved crossings. Safe and courteous riding is the Park standard.

Noise

No loud or unusual noises are allowed, including: radios and headsets that can be heard over 50' away. Music/Amplified Sound at One-Mile Recreation Area, please, face all speakers away from Woodland Ave.

Park Closures

Lower Park is closed from 12:00 am (midnight) until 5:00 am every day, unless directly and actively proceeding to a destination outside of the park. Upper Park is closed at 9:00pm, October – March and 11:00pm, April - September unless posted otherwise.

Signs/Defacing

Defacing of trees, benches, tables, any park fixtures, open ground, or paved roads/paths with markings, staples, tacks, or signs is prohibited. No pinatas, or accessories shall be affixed to trees. Only barricades, cones, or self standing devices may be used for these purposes.

Smoking

Smoking is not permitted in any City Park or Playground.

Swimming

While in the 1-Mile swim area compliance with lifeguards is required for public safety. Pool is open and lifeguards are on duty from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

Vegetation

No taking, cutting or injury of any vegetation in the Park is allowed.

Vehicle Traffic

SUBJECT: UPDATE ON THE PEREGRINE POINT DISC GOLF COURSE MITIGATION & MONITORING

REPORT IN BRIEF:

The Bidwell Park & Playground Commission (BPPC) will consider the 2019 biological monitoring reports prepared by the City's consultant, the 2019 annual report from the Outside Recreation Advocacy Inc, (ORAI), and an update on the mitigation measures for the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course (PPDG). The BPPC will also begin its five-year review of the PPDG Operating Agreement with ORAI.

Recommendation: The Park & Natural Resources Manager recommends the BPPC direct its Natural Resource Committee to review and make recommendations regarding the Consultant's monitoring recommendations, and whether to extend the ORAI Agreement for another five years.

FISCAL IMPACT:

In 2019, the City spent \$21,821, for biological monitoring, split rail fencing, waddles, and other materials due in part to the Stoney Fire damages. ORAI contributed approximately \$2,604 in materials and 806 hours in volunteer labor (a value of approximately \$21,500 @ \$25/hr.) toward the disc golf course maintenance and mitigation (see ORAI Annual Report in Exhibit A).

BACKGROUND:

During the environmental review process for the update of the Bidwell Park Master Management Plan (BPMMP), the City Council adopted a Master Mitigation and Monitoring Program (MMMP) for the Plan and three proposed Park Improvement Projects – Cedar Grove Concept Plan, Trails Plan, and the Horseshoe Lake Concept Plan. A separate MMMP was approved for the PPDG. These MMMPs were locally approved and are not required by any Federal or State regulatory agency. The PPDG MMMP stipulates mitigation measures to occur prior to and during construction of the PPDG, and ongoing monitoring of Butte County Checkerbloom, Bidwell Knotweed/Wildflowers, and Blue Oaks.

In 2010, an Agreement between the City and ORAI was executed for the closure and relocation of the existing 9-Hole disc golf short course, redesign and construction of the long course (18 holes), installation of mitigation measures, and ongoing maintenance and monitoring. The short course was closed and not relocated. The 18-hole course was redesigned and constructed by ORAI and other volunteers in 2011, which met most of the mitigation requirements with only ongoing maintenance, signage, and botanical monitoring remaining. The ORAI Agreement provides an initial term of 5-years terms, with two 5-year extensions allowed after review and approval by the City.

Staff provided updates to the BPPC on 3/26/18 and 4/29/19 regarding ORAI's compliance with their Agreement (ORAI compliance and mitigation status summaries attached as Exhibit B). The BPPC approved Staff playing a larger role in managing the PPDG and directed working with ORAI to complete the following outstanding items by the end of the second 5-year extension period in June 2020.

- 1. Conduct a biological study for 2018 and 2019, which would be paid by the City.
- 2. Re-installation of mulch after the Stoney Fire on all tees and targets.
- 3. Installation of the new tree protection measures to include wrapping the trees with plastic garden fencing.
- 4. Alternative basket/target placement for the three priority holes, and all the other holes as funding allows.
- 5. Trail decommissioning, delineation, and identification, using native grass waddles or other methods.
- 6. Installation of barriers (e.g. split rail fencing) of sensitive the Bidwell's Knotweed areas
- 7. Installation of informative tee signs and other interpretive signage.

DISCUSSION:

A. Biological Monitoring:

The City's consultant performed the 2019 biological study of the Checkerbloom, Knotweed, and Blue Oaks at PPDG, which is attached as Exhibit C. In the report, the Consultant provides the following observations and recommendations:

1. Blue Oaks:

- While disc golf activities do result in bark damage, the is no evidence that the overall health of the trees is being significantly impacted by these activities as the average health status of the priority oak trees and the reference oak trees were the same or nearly the same.
- Deducted that since there is no correlation between the tree health status and the amount of disc damage, the continued annual monitoring does not appear to be useful or necessary.
- Recommends continuing to wrap potentially impacted Oak trees with plastic fencing, but not tightly and to use stakes or fence posts to provide space between the wrap and tree trunks.
- Recommends occasional monitoring (i.e. every 5 to 10 years) of just the overall health and not the of the
 priority and reference oak trees by a Certified Arborist.

2. Butte County Checkerbloom (Special Status List 1)

- A few more locations were observed in 2019, but the general distribution of the Butte County Checkerbloom (BCC)) within the course remained consistent as in past surveys.
- The majority of the BCC areas showed no evidence of human disturbance, except for trails through two groups (CG4 and CG3). Brush and straw waddles were placed on the trail to direct traffic away from these groups in 2019. It was noted that one plant was partially covered by a waddle.
- There is evidence that a number of racemes are being browsed by wildlife.
- Recommends that the intensive monitoring be reduced to every 3-5 years, and/or be simplified to detecting
 evidence of disc golf related disturbance within the BCC areas rather than conducting individual plant and
 stem counts.

3. Bidwell Knotweed (Special Status List 4)

- Bidwell's knotweed distribution across the course site has remained relatively consistent and variability most likely attributed to response to natural environmental conditions.
- Only a few small portions of the occurrences have showed evidence of human disturbance (please see maps in the reports in Exhibit C).
- It was noted that the human related impacts are not solely due to disc golf use, and the likely larger percentage of the damage appears to be from the trails used by hikers and mountain bikers.
- Recommends that the intensive monitoring be conducted every 3-5 years, or simplified by documenting human disturbance or bare ground in the for mapped patches of Bidwell's knotweed to track the effectiveness of management responses (i.e. increasing signage and making trails more defined etc.)

4. Other Observations/Recommendations

- If monitoring of Oak Tres is to continue, that the priority trees be re-tagged.
- The areas surveyed for Bidwell's Knotweed prior to 2018 appear to be different and includes areas outside of the disc golf course.
- Recommends specific survey areas be identified and a data sheet be developed for more consistent and applicable data collection in the future.
- Better define and delineate paths between tee pads and the alternate baskets to deter off-trail trampling.
- More signage, including signage indicating the presence of special-status plant species in specific areas
- More fencing around sensitive areas

B. ORAI Agreement/Mitigation Measures:

1. Completed by ORAI/City Staff in 2019

- All the priority designated trees have been wrapped with the plastic garden fencing.
- The basket at Hole 18 that was damaged by Stoney Fire bulldozers have been replaced.
- Alternate basket locations where identified and reviewed by the Consultant for environmental concerns. A
 copy of the Consultant's report for the alternate locations is attached as Exhibit D. ORAI installed pin sleeves
 on 15 holes, three are awaiting final review from the Consultant.
- Tee signs posts have been installed for all 18 Holes.
- Split rail was installed between Holes 2 and 14 to establish an out of-bound area to protect the Knotweed and wildflower area.
- Split rail fencing between Hole 3 and 4 is complete, to keep golfers, hikers, and bikers on trail and to reduce erosion.

The following is the annual report for the Peregrine Point Disc golf course for the year 2019.

Background: The operating agreement signed by Outside Recreation Advocacy Inc requires an annual report on Peregrine Point is made to the City of Chico. This report covers all happenings and businesses to do with the course within the time frame of January 1^{st,} 2019 to Decemb er 31^{st,} 2019.

Usage: Overall usage of Peregrine Point continues to rise. On weekends, It is now not uncommon to have to wait to tee off as the course is full. Disc Golf Course Review lists Peregrine Point as the 9th ranked course in CA out of 330 courses. We receive visitors from all over the states. Non-disc golf use of the area continues to increase. Again, more bike rider and hikers are using the Peregrine Point trailhead for some out and back hikes, or as ingress/egress onto the larger trail system.

Course Maintenance: ORAI hosted 20 workdays in 2019 along with our weekly clean up and play of the course. Maintenance as always, included: Mulch spreading, unwanted trail abatement, litter removal, tee pad maintenance, cleaning graffiti, and repairing/replacing mitigation measures.

Course Improvements: Continuing from last year.

- With a goal of 3 alternate holes, 15 holes currently have alternate positions. 2 are awaiting final approval and 1 is being revised due to installation difficulties
- We completed the installation of 18 tee signs stands
- Split rail Knotweed OB area on hole 2 and 14 is complete
- Split rail fencing trail realignment on hole 3 is complete
- Completion of the tree wrap project prior to alternate trees being added

Finances: \$2,604 went towards insurance, operating costs, and materials. Our income was generated by fundraising events and donations from the public and local businesses. We contributed 806 volunteer hours valued at \$20,150.

ITEM 5.1 - EXHIBIT A

Proposed Activities for 2020: With the feedback from the tree report and observations from 2019 we are putting efforts into completing the tee signs as quickly as possible.

- Complete installation of tee signs/signage (Currently in Progress)
- Additional tree wrap installation on new trees, and upgrading existing wraps (Starting in March and will continue as additional material is acquired)
- Add alternate pins to last 3 holes and additional alternates as approved (March-May as approvals are completed)
- Annual mulch spreading (Waiting on City to deploy to work areas)
- Designate primary trails on the lower holes and abate rogue trails (On-Going)
- Work with the Parks department to deploy further split rail projects, and continue the use of wattles in trail work (Dependent on Parks for guidance)
- Start groundwork on replacing benches lost in the Stoney Fire (Low priority, September?)
- More investigation into a loop trail for casual hikers as proposed by Woody Elliot. We have completed some preliminary route ideas, but are far from a complete track (On-Going)
- Open a discussion on improving the parking area

Observations: Peregrine Point is continuing to grow in popularity. Parking is starting to become a bit impacted on weekends.

Conclusion: 2019 was a busy year. The weather was cooperative and we decided to take drilling into our own hands. We completed as much of the alternate pins as we could until we needed further approvals. We put time and effort into completing new split rail installations. This included knotweed and checkerbloom mitigation, and even working with the parks dept. on the South Rim Trail realignment. We are again looking at improvements to tree mitigation methods. We are now putting efforts into getting the signage completed and will be starting on updating tree wrap on existing trees, and installing on the new ones listed by Gallaway. 2020 is already shaping up to be a busy year.

The City and ORAI entered into an Agreement for the construction, maintenance, and monitoring of the Disk Golf site on June 18, 2010. The following table summarizes the sections from the Agreement and ORAI's compliance as of December 2019.

As requested, Gallaway Enterprises conducted oak tree and rare plant monitoring in 2019 within the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course (Course) per the City of Chico's May 2011 *Monitoring Plan for the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course* (Monitoring Plan). The 2019 monitoring surveys were conducted in the aftermath of a fire that had burned through the Course in the fall of 2018.

The monitoring conducted in 2019 is the seventh year of Butte County checkerbloom (*Sidalcea robusta*) monitoring, the eight year of Bidwell's knotweed (*Polygonum bidwelliae*) monitoring and the seventh year of oak tree monitoring conducted within the Course.

This letter report will present the results of the 2019 monitoring and summarize the results of the past monitoring efforts conducted within the Course to date.

Methods

Oak Tree Monitoring Survey

34 priority oak trees and 34 reference oak trees (**Figure 1** and **Attachment 1**) were surveyed by Gallaway Enterprises senior botanist and certified arborist, Elena Gregg and assisted by biologists Laurens Kuypers and Samantha Morford on August 26, September 26 and October 10, 2019. Pursuant to the 2011 Monitoring Plan, the following data was collected for each oak tree surveyed:

- Species
- Diameter at breast height (DBH) in inches
- Height class (A= <1m, B= 1-2m, C= 3-4m, D= >5m)
- Health status (H= Healthy, U= Unhealthy, S= Sick, D= Dead)
- Crown class (O= Open, E= Emergent, D= Dominant, C= Codominant, I= Intermediate, S= Suppressed)

- Number of impact marks on the bark/trunk
- Percent trunk damaged
- Percent dead canopy
- Number of broken branches

Rare Plant Monitoring Surveys

Field surveys were conducted by Mrs. Gregg on May 29 and June 4, 10 and 18, 2019. Botanical surveys were conducted to determine the extent of the known populations of Butte County checkerbloom (*Sidalcea robusta*) and Bidwell's knotweed (*Polygonum bidwelliae*) within the course. The botanical surveys were conducted by walking the entire area where past monitoring surveys were conducted (**Figure 2 and 3**), closely inspecting potential habitat, recording phonological data, noting any evidence of disturbance and taking a general inventory of associate species as required by the Monitoring Plan. The number of Butte County checkerbloom stalks observed was also recorded; however, due to the density of Bidwell's knotweed on the site, only area data was recorded for Bidwell's knotweed. The botanical survey was conducted during the blooming period for Butte County checkerbloom and Bidwell's knotweed.


Results

Oak Trees

The results of the oak tree surveys are summarized in the tables provided as **Attachment 1**. Based on the results of this data, it is evident that the oak trees within the fairways are frequently hit by discs. An average of 32 impact scars were observed on the bark of the priority oak trees versus only an average of 8 impact scars on the reference oak trees. However, when averaging all of the other individual attributes monitored, it appears that the priority oak trees and the reference oak trees showed similar results. The average health status, the average percent dead branches in the canopy and the average number of broken branches observed in the priority oak trees and the reference oak trees were the same or nearly the same. This indicates that normal effects of age and environmental conditions are playing a large role in the health of the trees on the course. Further, the recent fire that burned through the Course in 2018 has caused an overall decrease in health to both the priority and reference trees. One reference tree (R06-003) was removed due to the severe fire related injuries it sustained. During the 2019 monitoring a new standing dead reference tree (R17-003) was also observed that had been killed due to the fire.


Butte County Checkerbloom

A few new locations of Butte County checkerbloom were observed during the 2019 survey (**Figure 2**), but the general distribution of Butte County checkerbloom within the Course was consistent with the past surveys. Some of the Butte County checkerbloom occurrence locations within the Course were burned over in the 2018 fire. However, the fire did not appear to result in any significant impacts to the





populations. There were a large number of possible seedlings of Butte County checkerbloom observed in the areas of known occurrences (see **Attachment 2** for a picture of the seedlings). Due to the fact that the identification of these seedlings could not be verified as Butte County checkerbloom plants and many of these small seedlings were obscured by thick grasses, these plants were not included in the survey data. The summary of the past and current survey data is provided below. This difference in the number of occurrences and number of racemes counted in 2018 and 2019 in comparison with previous years could have been due to differing surveyor methodologies.

The majority of the Butte County checkerbloom occurrences were in areas where there is little human traffic and so the majority of the locations showed no evidence of human disturbance. The two exceptions were within the checkerbloom groups CG4 and CG3 (Figure 2). A trail cuts through the CG4 occurrence but in 2019 a pile of brush was placed in the trail adjacent to a few of the checkerbloom occurrences to deter the use of the trail. A trail also cuts though the CG3 occurrences and one of the individual plants is located to the side of this trail. In 2019 straw wattles were placed along the sides of the trail to direct foot traffic, however, the straw wattle was placed partially over one Butte County checkerbloom plant (see Attachment 2 for a picture of this plant). While there was evidence of very little human disturbance to Butte County checkerbloom plants, there was evidence of a number of racemes being browsed by wildlife.

Bidwell's Knotweed

The general distribution of Bidwell's knotweed within the course was consistent with the past surveys (Figure 3). A total of 1.5 acres of Bidwell's knotweed were observed within the course during the 2019 survey. A summary of the past and current survey data is provided below. Based on this summary, the acreage of Bidwell's knotweed within the course dropped off significantly between 2011 and 2012. It is unknown if this decrease was from human impacts, environmental conditions (i.e. drought), or from differences in survey mapping methodologies. However, due to the lack of evidence of widespread human impacts to the areas where Bidwell's knotweed occurs within the Course, human impacts are likely not the reason behind the decrease. Based on the 2018 and 2019 survey data though, there appears to have been a rebound in the population size.


Evidence of human related impacts to patches of Bidwell's knotweed occurred in four general areas. These four areas included: 1) to the northeast of tee pad 3; 2) between the fairways of holes 5 and 12; 3) to the northeast of basket 10, and 4) around tee pad 8 (**Figure 4**). The source of disturbance is from a maintenance access road and trails cutting through populations. These trails are used by bicyclists, disc golf patrons and hikers. Evidence of bicycle tire track disturbance was observed in a few locations. None of the patches of Bidwell's knotweed that showed evidence of disturbance occurred within disc golf fairways. To prevent any future impacts due to use of the one maintenance access road, in 2019 a wooden slit rail fence was installed around the Bidwell's knotweed patch previously disturbed by the road.

Recommendations

Overall, it is our recommendation that paths between tee pads and baskets be more defined and obvious to deter off-trail trampling of plants. Due to the nature of disc golf, this will not prevent all off-trial use since individuals will need to retrieve discs, but it will lessen damage from travel between tee pads. More signage is also recommended, including more signage indicating the presence of special-status plant species in specific areas where damage appears to be the heaviest. The fencing off of sensitive areas should also be considered.

Oak Tree Monitoring

The past 7 years of monitoring have demonstrated that while the disc golf activities do result in bark damage to the trees within the fairways, there is no evidence that the overall health of the trees is being significantly impacted by the disc golf activities. The data shows no correlation between disc golf activities and the overall health of the trees present since both the priority and reference trees show the same health trends over time. A graph showing the different health categories (healthy, unhealthy, sick and dead) assessed during the 2012, 2018 and 2019 monitoring years and the percentage of reference and priority trees within each health category (Attachment 3) demonstrates that the vast majority of both priority and reference trees were identified as unhealthy consistently since 2012. Also, over the course of the 7 years of monitoring, there has been no statistical difference between the priority and reference trees when assessing the percentage of dead tree canopy present. The only difference found between the priority and reference trees is the amount of disc impacts and subsequent percent bark damage on the trees. The priority trees have a much greater number of disc impacts than the reference trees. Even so, however, the monitoring does not show any correlation between a decline in tree health and disc golf activities/disc impacts. This is likely due to the fact that the vast majority of impacts to the trees from discs hitting the trunks are not significant enough impacts to damage the tree's cambium, or

live tissues. Only a few disc impacts observed on the tree trunks actually broke into the bark and even those deeper impacts did not break far enough into the bark to damage the tree's cambium.

Since the current methods of monitoring the oak trees within the Course have not identified any correlation between the health status of an oak tree and the amount of disc impacts on a tree, the continued annual monitoring of oak trees within the Course does not appear to be useful or necessary. Occasional monitoring (i.e. every 5 to 10 years) of just the health of the priority and reference oak trees by a Certified Arborist would provide sufficient data to track the potential effects of the disc golf activities without the burden of annual monitoring.

Although the disc impacts have not been demonstrated to directly cause a decrease in the health of the trees within the Course, the continued use of mitigation measures (i.e. deflectors or other protection devices) within the Course is recommended. General observations during the 2018 and 2019 surveys identified that the use of single stakes as deflectors was not effective though, and the majority of the stakes and deflectors were observed to be damaged or completely broken during the 2019 survey. Also, the wrapping of the trees with the plastic mesh was observed to be of limited value when the trees are tightly wrapped. When tightly wrapped the plastic mesh wrapping does not help insulate blows from a disc (see picture of a tree where the mesh had been broken due to a disc impact in **Attachment 2**). To better insulate the trees from blows, the wrapping should not be tightly wrapped against the tree bark and stakes could potentially be used to create a gap between the bark and the plastic mesh.

Due to the fire that occurred within the course in 2018, many trees, both priority and reference trees, were injured to varying degrees. Two reference trees were killed by the fire, one of which was removed as a safety precaution. There is a possibility that the injuries sustained during the fire may result in a more rapid decline in the health of the trees within the Course over time. As such, any future monitoring of trees within the Course would have to take this into consideration when determining impacts from disc golf activities.

During the 2019 monitoring effort, it was observed that the vast majority of the monitored trees had lost their tags which made them difficult to identify in the field. As such, it is recommended that if monitoring continues within the Course that the monitored trees be re-tagged, or if new trees are chosen to be monitored that they be assigned new numbers and tagged.

Rare Plant Monitoring

The past monitoring efforts indicate that Butte County checkerbloom occurrences within the course have remained relatively consistent and experience little to no disturbance from the disc golf activities. As such, the need to conduct the intensive annual monitoring of individual Butte County checkerbloom plants within the course is not necessary. It is our recommendation that the intensive monitoring described in the Monitoring Plan be reduced in frequency (i.e. every 3-5 years) and/or simplified to focus on detecting evidence of disc golf related disturbance within the areas where Butte County checkerbloom has been previously identified rather than conducting individual plant and stem counts. Further, due to differences in the past methodologies used to document the Butte County

checkerbloom within the course, if the intensive monitoring described in the Monitoring Plan is continued, it is recommended that specific survey areas be identified and a data sheet be developed to make to data collected more consistent and allow for easier comparisons between survey years.

The past monitoring efforts indicate that the general distribution of Bidwell's knotweed across the course site has remained relatively consistent. The acreage of the patches mapped has varied over the years and there have been observed impacts to the patches due to human activities within the course. However, the human related impacts are not solely due to disc golf use, but a likely larger percentage of the damage appears to be due to the presence of trails used by hikers and mountain bikers. The overall patch size variability can most likely be attributed to the plant's annual response to natural environmental conditions not to human disturbances since only a few small portions of the occurrences have showed evidence of human disturbance. As such, it is our recommendation that the intensive monitoring described in the Monitoring Plan be reduced in frequency (i.e. every 3-5 years) or simplified to focus on detecting evidence of human related disturbance within the patches of Bidwell's knotweed mapped during the past surveys. Surveying for evidence of human related disturbance within the historically mapped occurrences of Bidwell's knotweed can also help to track the effectiveness of management responses (i.e. increasing signage and making trails more defined). A simplified survey could entail mapping disturbance/bare ground. It is also recommended that the survey area for any future monitoring efforts be clarified and specified to improve consistency in the monitoring data. The area surveyed for Bidwell's knotweed appears to be different in many of the past surveys and includes areas outside of the disc golf course, so the survey area should be limited to just areas known to be utilized by disc golf patrons.










Graph comparing the average percent of trunk damage on priority trees vs. reference trees in 2018 (the red line) and in 2019 (the blue line)

Per your request, Gallaway Enterprises conducted an assessment of the location of alternative hole/basket locations with the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course (Course) to determine potential impacts to sensitive natural resources known to occur within the Course including oak trees and rare plants. The results of the assessment are discussed below.

Methods

Gallaway Enterprises conducted two field surveys with City of Chico (City) staff and Outdoor Recreation Advocacy, Inc. (ORAI) volunteers to locate potential alternative basket locations within the Course during the summer of 2019. The locations of all potential alternative basket locations were recorded using a Trimble Global Positioning System (GPS) unit. After identifying the location of the alternative baskets, an additional field visit was conducted on October 10, 2019 by Gallaway Enterprises Certified Arborist Elena Gregg and assisted by biologist Laurens Kuypers to assess the potential impacts to oak trees based on the alignment of the fairways associated with the proposed new alternative basket locations. The assessment was conducted by walking the route/fairway from each tee pad to the location of the alternative basket and mapping all oak trees within and immediately adjacent to the fairway that had the potential to be frequently struck by discs (Attachment A).

The potential impacts of the alternative basket locations on the known populations of rare plants present within the Course including Butte County checkerbloom (*Sidalcea robusta*) and Bidwell's knotweed (*Polygonum bidwelliae*) was assessed by overlaying the mapped extent of both rare plant populations with the locations of the alternative baskets (**Attachment B**).

Results

Oak Trees

Based on the results of the past monitoring efforts within the Course, it is evident that oak trees within the fairways are impacted by discs. By creating alternative fairways, new oak trees will now be within the impact zone of discs. The locations of the oak trees that are likely to receive the most direct impacts from discs are depicted in **Attachment A**. However, the past monitoring data does not show that direct disc impacts on trees have a significant negative impact on the overall health of the trees. Therefore, the alternative basket locations are expected to have a less than significant effect on the oak trees.

Butte County Checkerbloom

None of the alternative basket locations occur within close proximity to Butte County checkerbloom populations within the Course. Butte County checkerbloom will not be impacted by the use of any of the alternative basket locations.

Bidwell's Knotweed

The current proposed alternative basket locations as depicted in **Attachment B** have been specifically chosen to avoid direct impacts to known populations of Bidwell's knotweed. The fairways associated with alternative hole # 5 and alternative hole # 8 (**Attachment B**) do occur in close proximity to a few known patches of Bidwell's knotweed. It is not expected, though, for alternative hole # 8 to impact patches of Bidwell's knotweed since the alternative hole is far enough away from the known populations. Alternative hole # 5 however is relatively close to a known patch of Bidwell's knotweed, therefore, there is a potential for minimal impacts to this population due to disc golf patrons collecting rogue discs.

Recommendations

Based on over 6 years of monitoring data within the Course, there has not been shown to be a direct correlation between the amount of disc impacts and the health of the oak trees present. As such the indication is that disc impacts have a less than significant or minimal impact on the health of oak trees. Therefore, the use of alternative baskets within the Course is expected to not have a significant impact on oaks. However, since direct impacts from discs will likely occur to the oak trees depicted in **Attachment A** within the new fairways, a variety of different mitigation measures (i.e. deflectors or other protection devices) could be installed on these trees to minimize the scaring from disc impacts. A number of oak trees within the Course already have tree mitigation measures installed (see **Attachment A**). If additional mitigation measures are installed we recommend recording the location of the tree location and the type of mitigation measure installed to keep track of the measures used and installed. By tracking the locations of the measures, maintenance and success of the measures can more easily be managed and assessed.

In order to minimize impacts to Bidwell's knotweed in close proximity to the fairways, it is our recommendation that paths between tee pads and baskets be well defined and obvious to deter off-trail trampling of plants. Due to the nature of disc golf, this will not prevent all off-trial use since individuals will need to retrieve discs, but it will lessen damage from travel between tee pads and minimize impacts to Bidwell's knotweed to a less than significant level. More signage is also recommended, including more signage indicating the presence of special-status plant species in fairways or specific areas where potential damage may occur. Monitoring of off-trail damage is also recommended to determine where additional signage or fencing may be necessary.



Oak Tree Impact Assessment Map





2.1. CONSIDERATION OF TEICHERT PONDS PEACE PARK PROPOSAL

At its 5/20/19 BPPC meeting, the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) received a status update on the activities that have taken place at Teichert Ponds and considered a proposal from Mr. Dick Cory to designate Teichert Ponds as a "Peace Park". The BPPC forwarded discussion of Mr. Cory's proposal to the Policy Advisory Committee (PAC).

Mr. Cory provided a summary of his proposal to rename Teichert Ponds to a "Peace Park" to try to regenerate interest and obtain possible funding to make improvements to the ponds as outlined in the 2008 Teichert Ponds Restoration Habitat Development Plan. REPORT IN BRIEF:

At its 5/20/19 BPPC meeting, the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC) received a status update on the activities that have taken place at Teichert Ponds and considered a proposal from Mr. Dick Cory to designate Teichert Ponds as a "Peace Park". The BPPC forwarded discussion of Mr. Cory's proposal to the Policy Advisory Committee (PAC).

Recommendation: The Committee is requested to provide direction to the BPPC whether to approve Mr. Cory's proposal to designate Teichert Ponds as a Peace Park.

BACKGROUND:

Teichert Ponds is an approximate 40-acre parcel bordered by Little Chico Creek, the Heritage Oaks subdivision, Kohls' parking lot, and Highway 99. The ponds were formed from mining gravel to construct Highway 99 in the early 1960s where the excavation ruptured the aquifer filling the cavities with water from Little Chico Creek. The City took ownership of the property in 1999 and uses it for storm water retention from the neighboring housing developments and the Chico Mall.

A Teichert Ponds Habitat Management Plan was developed and approved by the City Council in 2008, which contains a proposed robust concept to dredge and separate the ponds and long-term maintenance plan. Due to funding constraints, a "scaled down" concept plan was developed (Attachment A) and the following activities have taken place over the last decade to implement this revised plan:

- 1. Through funding from the Teichert Ponds Restoration Foundation (Foundation), a Kiosk was installed, and a brochure was produced with interpretive information regarding the abundant flora and fauna that can be found at the ponds.
- 2. Thousands of hours from the Foundation members and other volunteers have been spent removing invasive vegetation and debris generated by illegal encampments. The Butte Environmental Council also adopted the area in 2018 and provided Alliance for Work Force Development crews to help.
- 3. The cyclone fence and barbed wire surrounding the ponds have been removed, making the area more inviting to the public.
- 4. The all-weather trail design identified in the Habitat Plan to separate the freshwater and stormwater ponds has been attempted with little success. However, a seasonal walking loop trail that traverses completely around the ponds was installed last summer.
- 5. Redbuds were planted where the Himalayan Blackberry was removed by volunteers on the south side near Kohls.

DISCUSSION:

In his proposal (attached at Attachment B), Mr. Cory is requesting the BPPC to consider dedicating Teichert Ponds as a "Peace Park", which would provide a staging area for Veteran's and other organizations to gather, celebrate, and hold memorial ceremonies. He is also requesting adding benches, picnic tables, and additional signage to highlight points of interest and wildlife, and to reach out to local schools for field trips.



TEICHERT PEACE PONDS PROPOSAL

Brief History

1960-65-40-acre site mined for gravel to build 99N freeway across Chico.

1965-1970- ponds form in excavation abandoned by Teichert Construction Company out of Woodland. Wildlife migrates in cohabitates and evolves, as heavy rains and three springs fill pond # 1 rapidly.

1970-79 -property in private ownership, changing ownership frequently with little development.

1979-80 -City of Chico builds storm drain concrete entrance to ponds. Original plans were for a separate channel from the ponds to run parallel to freeway emptying into Little Chico Creek. Instead, polluted (nitrates, phosphates, and trash) water enters ponds not only from the housing developments next door (Heritage Oaks) but those being built along Bruce Road and the Chico Mall. This influx of polluted water has and continues to affect life in the ponds. Stagnation and eutrophication in the summer, flooding in the winter. The ponds do serve as water detention with seasonal variation of precipitation added to household and commercial inflow. Optimal pond water levels need to be regulated as designed by the plans made in 2006 -08.

1990-Teichert Ponds Educators Consortium advocates group founded to encourage develop the educational and recreational aspects of this environmental oasis. Through education, this organization helped educate the public to the value of the ponds and encouraged the city to take over the ownership from private developers. After all, the city was using the ponds for detention with no payment to the private parties.

ITEMENTE NATE AND B

1998-City takes ownership of the ponds using redevelopment funds and May Dedication ceremony was well attended by representatives from most stakeholders and Teichert Ponds Educators Consortium soon dissolved for their work had been done. or so we thought.

2006-2008-Redevelopment funds from the state are used to first study the composition of the ponds and the design an engineered improvement. These completed plans were adopted by the city and permits granted. The \$2.6 million cost has not been budgeted with ensuing city financial problems. Meanwhile, the ponds and the plans largely remain unattended.

2010-Teichert Ponds Restoration Foundation formed from a group of interested members from the original educator's group. This time the goal was to continue public education as to the potential of the ponds, to garner funds to implement what mini improvements that could be made without negating the master plan as accepted in 2008. This group was successful in collecting over \$10,000 to improve the ponds by building an informational kiosk, trail improvement, invasive plant removal. and continued educational efforts before disbanding in 2017. Funds of around \$3,000 remain deposited in an account with North Valley Community Foundation are now in the management of the Chico Parks and Playgrounds Commission. These funds have been earmarked for use only for improvement of the Teichert Ponds, specifically kiosk sign replacement and trail improvement between ponds.

2018-City of Chico has been able to do considerable evasive plant removal and trail improvement by use of a federal grant providing income to unemployed for doing this community work. This in turn has reduced the homeless occupancy. Hopefully these funds will continue.

ITEMENTS ATTEMENTED B

TEICHERT PEACE PONDS PROPOSAL

Need

Minimal progress towards the restoration of the Teichert Ponds has been made since plans were completed, approved, and permits granted in 2010. Since the city has not allocated funds to do the project, minimprovements have been dependent on volunteer's contribution s of money and work. A dedicated funding source is need.

- 1. The theme (park?)-PEACE PONDS PARK has universal appeal.
- The park will be dedicated to those who served and presently serve our country to preserve and attain peace.
- The theme also represents the desire to make the preserve an area of repose and reflection.

2. REGULAR AGENDA

2.1. UPDATE ON DEVELOPMENT OF A REVISED "TAKE A HIKE" BROCHURE

The City has partnered with Explore Butte County, CARD, and the Chico Chamber of Commerce to revise the existing "Take a Hike" brochure highlighting trails in Upper Bidwell Park. The Committee will review a draft of a revised and redesigned "Explore Bidwell Park" brochure. (*Report – Linda Herman P&NRM*).

P&NRM Herman provided an overview of the revised brochure, stating that this version of the brochure is intended to be for Bidwell Park visitors and part of the Explore Butte County tourism goals. She continued informed the Committee that other maps/brochures, such as one specific to mountain biking or hiking, t can be generated from the same base mapping source in the future. Committee member Haar suggested that the words "Lower" and Upper" be larger on the titles of each page. Committee member Smith Peters requested that some of the wording and letter kerning be adjusted throughout to appropriately fill in the white spaces, and that the spelling of the Guardian Trail be reviewed and corrected.

Public Comment: Woody Elliott and Michael Stauffer commented on this item.

Recommendation: The Committee was requested to provide comments on the redesigned brochure. to the P&NRM, which will be incorporated after the BPPC's review.

2.2. <u>DISCUSSION OF OPTIONS TO REDUCE DAMAGE TO CITY PARKS AND GREENWAYS</u>

At its 9/30/19 meeting, the Bidwell Park & Playground Commission approved Commissioner Haar's request to discuss the environmental degradation in Bidwell Park and other City parks and greenways from trash, disorderly conduct, and vandalism. The BPPC also approved discussing fencing at the Humboldt Avenue (Windchime) Park. (Verbal Report – Aaron Haar).

Committee member Haar provided a verbal report on his concerns regarding the amount of trash that is entering the local waterways, citing sections of the Clean Water Act that could possibly be used as a resource and the need to support local volunteer efforts. Haar also discussed the fencing of Humboldt Park and other areas as a possible solution.

The P&NRM provided information on the City's Stormwater Trash Master Plan and updated the Committee on the City's and many local volunteer group's efforts to clean up the creeks and parks that occur weekly and sometimes daily. Committee member Grist questioned the need and feasibility of fencing off areas. Commissioner Smith-Peters stated that she believes these problems are complex may be beyond what the BPPC can address or solve.

DISCUSSION:

Years ago, the City and the Chico Chamber of Commerce, with assistance from the Chico Visitor's Bureau and Gregg Payne, developed a small pocket guide to the trails in Upper Bidwell Park brochure. The brochure, a copy of which is attached. includes a map of the Upper Park trails with estimated distances, a description of each trail, and basic park rules. When supplies were running low, the Chamber received a \$5,000 Zone Marketing grant from the Explore Butte County to print more guides and reached out to the City and CARD to discuss any needed revisions.

In those discussions, it was decided to completely revamp the brochure to include a map of Lower Bidwell Park and more information that would be helpful for visitors and locals to "Explore Bidwell Park". It was also decided to use a larger format that can be printed" on both sides by a company called "Z-CARD" and folded to pocket size with two cardstock covers.





NARRATIVE

1. Updates

- a. <u>Trails Plan</u>– The City's consultant, Trails Lab, needs more time to prepare the summary report of the inventory of the trails in Upper Bidwell Park. This summary will be presented to the Commission at its March 30, 2020 meeting.
- b. <u>Park Reservation Fees</u> At its 2/11/20 meeting, the City Council approved the Commission's recommendations regarding revising the policies and fees for private and public reservations in City parks. A confirming ordinance and resolution will be forwarded to the Council for approval in April, with the fees to become effective on 7/1/20.
- c. <u>Vegetative Fuels Management Plan</u> Surveys for environmental review have begun and a public scoping meeting for the draft plan will be scheduled toward the end of March 2020.
- d. <u>Upper Park Road</u>– On 3/3/20, the City Council will consider the Internal Affair Committee's recommendations regarding access and a potential parking fee for Upper Park Road.

2. Maintenance Program

Staff provides on a need and time basis the cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths, coupled with the weekend cleaning and re-supplying of all open park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean ups, and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

- a. <u>Lower Park</u>: Caper Acres upgrade to the Crooked House bridge with a third rope to prevent falls. Staff installed two new city bike racks at the entrance of Caper Acres. Staff preformed several memorial bench repairs in the One Mile area (new wood, steel and paint as needed). Staff moved and rebuilt Picnic Site 1 away from the creek. The site has a new pad, table, trashcan and has been landscaped with native plants to help save the eroding bank.
- b. <u>Middle Park</u>: Staff has started to upgrade the lighting at Five Mile with LED in the pole lights and will follow up with more on and in the building lights. Staff has worked on changing out worn out plugs and removing dead circuits that go nowhere. Staff touched up the entrances to lots B, C, D and E in Middle Park.
- c. <u>Upper Park</u>: Routine maintenance. Clearing of downed trees from several trails. Touching up Lot E entrance.
- d. Green way Parks: Routine maintenance.
- e. <u>Upcoming projects:</u> Install new bear-proof trash cans at Bear Hole, Day camp and Yahi trail head. Repair Guardian trail bed under the peregrine cliffs, installation of the par course equipment in Lower Park. Rebuilding and moving several picnic sites away from the creek in Lower Park.
- f. <u>Departmental support:</u> Park staff built and painted two steel enclosures to house the portable toilets at the Transit Center and Depot Park.

3. Ranger and Lifeguard Programs

- a. <u>Non-Sworn Ranger</u> Ranger Ben Parker has completed training and is now uniformed and in the field. His schedule is Tuesday Saturday, 8 AM to 4:30 PM at this time.
- b. <u>Significant Incidents</u> Rangers and park staff have reported a significant increase in syringe litter in the parks and greenways. Staff has been in close communication with Chico Police Department and the North Valley Harm Reduction Coalition to address the problem.

4. Natural Resource Management

a. <u>California Conservation Corps (CCC)</u>— To date, approximately 4,000 hours of work on targeted fuels reduction areas around the horse arena, Centennial Ave from 5 Mile to Manzanita, walnut orchard at the Peterson Memorial Dr. entrance, and the area between Vallombrosa and Petersen Memorial Dr. from Madrone to Crister Avenues has been performed. The work will continue in Lower Park until the 8,000 hours of grant funded work are exhausted. Currently work is happening at the World of Trees in the Cedar Grove area of Lower Bidwell Park. The next work area is planned for the wooded area behind Caper Acres, informally known as Sherwood Forest.

5. Outreach and Education

a. Staff has been in contact with teachers at Little Chico Creek Elementary and are in process of scheduling educational tours at Teichert Ponds.

6. Volunteer and Donor Program

- a. <u>2019 volunteer hours</u> 20,392 is the total number of volunteer hours in 2019. According to Independent Sector, the 2019 rate per volunteer hour is valued at \$25.43. Based on the total number of hours multiplied by the 2019 volunteer rate, \$518,569.00 worth of in-kind labor was donated to Chico's parks and greenways last year!
- b. Community Action Volunteers in Education (CAVE) CSU, Chico CAVE adopt a park student volunteers will resume contributing to the health of Chico's Parks and Greenways on Saturdays starting on February 22nd and will continue throughout the spring semester.
- c. <u>Vita Course Donation</u> Chico Sports Club (CSC) has expressed a desire to contribute to the rehabilitation of the Vita Course in Lower Bidwell Park. Park staff met with representatives from the CSC, toured the course, and started discussion of what needs to be done.

d. Upcoming Volunteer Opportunities

- i. Spring Volunteer Orientation— April 2nd from 6:00 to 8:00 PM at the Public Works offices at 901 Fir Street, the Parks Division will host the annual spring volunteer orientation. The orientation is a great way to learn more about the Park Division's Partners, Ambassadors, Leaders and Stewards (PALS) Volunteer Program and how to get involved. For more information email parkinfo@chicoca.gov
- ii. Cats in the Community— On March 31, for Cesar Chavez Day, the Parks Division will host students from CSU, Chico, that are participating in the Cats in the Community Day of Service event. The participants will give back to the community in a collective effort to cleanup parks and greenways, downtown, campus neighborhoods, and community gardens.


Figure 3 New Caper Acres info panel

SUBJECT: Street Trees Division Report

NARRATIVE

1. Updates

- a) Arbor Day Foundation Growth Award has been awarded to the City of Chico for the second consecutive year. The Tree City USA designation has been awarded for the 36th consecutive year.
- b) New employees for the F/T Maintenance Aide and Maintenance aide hourly position started in January. Interviews have started for the Senior Maintenance Worker position. Tree Division has also recruited a seasonal position and two temporary positions for the spring tree planting campaign.
- c) The Citywide tree inventory with Davey Resource Group (DRG) continues.
- d) Calls for branch drop continued to decline in January. Of 30 calls for tree service received, 5 were for cracked, hanging or downed limbs.

2. Planning/Monitoring

a) Damage Reports – There were no damage reports in January.

3. Planning and Building Development

a) UFM reviewed many plan reviews in the new Trakit permitting system. Comments included Tree Protection Zone enforcement and of oak trees, preservation species choice and submission of correct inventory data during plan review for Tree Preservation.

4. Miscellaneous

- a) Tree Committee met 2/13/20. This meeting will be continued to march. A report will be provided at the march 3/30/20 BPPC meeting.
- b) City of Chico was awarded the Arbor Day Foundation Growth Award for the second consecutive year. Applicants are required to score at least 10 points to be eligible. City of Chico scored 37 points. Award categories are listed below:
 - Interpretive Program (3 points)
 City Heritage tree program was significantly improved by reducing application fee to zero.
 - Community-Wide Tree Event (4 points)
 A special, community-wide tree event was initiated. City of Chico and Chico Tree Advocates applied for and received a California ReLeaf grant to enable enhanced celebration of Arbor Day with Chico Unified School District.

- A7. Youth Education (4 points)
 - The City initiated or significantly improved a formal, community-wide tree-education program for youth (such as the creation of a Nature Explore™ Classroom, "Project Learning Tree," "Arbor Day National Poster Contest," etc.). August 2019, City staff recommended to the BPPC approval of an application for outdoor classroom education in Bidwell park. The request was approved. BPPC recognizes and encourages children to get outside and explore local nature.
- A13. Publicity Event (3 points)
 - An activity specifically designed to gain publicity for the community forestry program was initiated or significantly improved. Public Works Operations and Maintenance hosted several events in 2019 for local school children. Activities included forestry equipment demonstrations.
- A10. Continuing Education for Forestry Managers and Tree Board Members (6 points)
 A continuing education program for forestry managers and tree board members was initiated or significantly improved.
- B7. Engineering/Forestry Coordination (6 points)
 The City of Chico Building Division and other staff including the Urban Forest Manager, Senior Building Inspectors and City fire personnel work with the Planning department together and review all new plans.
- C3. Sidewalk/Curb Policy (5 points)
 Policies were adopted or significantly improved which call for placement, construction, replacement and repair of sidewalks and curbs in a manner that will minimize tree damage.
- A8. Continuing Education for Tree Workers (6 points)
 A training/continuing education program for the City's tree workers, both employees and contractors, was significantly improved
- c) Davey Resource Group tree inventory specialists continued surveying all trees located in the City right-of-way. Surveyors have surveyed 14423 sites as of 1/31/20. This figure includes 284 stumps and 2276 vacant planting sites. Chapman/Mulberry neighborhoods were also surveyed in January. 462 sites were surveyed in Chapman and 265 sites were surveyed in Mulberry. This means that after Annexation 7/1/20 Tree Division will take on additional management of 727 sites.

5. Maintenance

- a) The East avenue corridor was pruned for vehicle passage. Many compliments have been received.
- b) The current tree watering list is being reviewed to create bandwidth for watering of new trees that do not have irrigation provided by the adjacent resident.

6. Outreach and Training

- a) UFM attended social media outreach training.
- b) New staff received on-boarding and safety related training.

7. Street Tree Supervisor Report

a) The Street Tree Supervisors monthly summary data tables for January is included below:






Figure 1. Private tree down over bike path. Public Works call-out after hours to re-open the path.
