SUBJECT: Consideration of a Special Use Permit to Conduct Llama Day Hikes in Upper Bidwell Park

REPORT IN BRIEF:

Steven McFarland of Happy Homestead Llamas LLC. (Applicant) requests a Special Use Permit to conduct guided educational and experiential day hikes with Llamas on the south side of Upper Bidwell Park. The Applicant's request (see application in Attachment A) is to provide approximately 2-4 hour hikes with Llamas on Friday through Sundays from approximately 9 am/10 am to 1 pm/2 pm. The hikes will be open to groups of 2-6 people and limited to only one hike per day. The initial proposed hike route is a 4.5 mile loop on a portion of the Guardian and Annie Bidwell trails. They are also interested in possibly conducting a hike on the north side of Upper Park in the future (see maps in Attachment B). However, the applicant is willing to work with Staff to determine the best route or routes. The applicant has also provided some information on the therapeutic benefits from encountering a Llama (see Attachment C)

Defacing of trees, benches, tables, any park fixtures, open ground, or paved roads/paths with markings, staples, tacks, or Signs/Defacing

signs is prohibited. Only barricades, cones, or self standing devices may be used for these purposes.

Smoking No smoking is allowed in any portion of Bidwell Park.

While gates are closed, limited use of vehicles to set up for special use is permitted. Vehicles must be in compliance with the one-way designation of the roadway, must yield to all other activities (walking, jogging, bicycling, and horseback riding), must travel with flashers on and may not exceed ten (10) miles per hour.

Permittee shall provide adequate signs and supervision to avoid conflicts between vehicles, bicycles, equestrians,







Bicycle Bell Law USA

A bicycle bell is a legal requirement in some US states, such as New York, Georgia, New Jersey, Indiana and South Carolina, but not in other states. It is important to note that some local jurisdictions may require that you have a bell fitted.

Besides that, a bicycle bell is not a legal requirement across much of the USA, yet is is important to always check the laws of the local area you may be riding in.

Bicycle Bell Laws Around the World

Whether you need to legally have a bicycle bell or not can vary across the globe, so it is essential to check the local rules and regulations – and your bicycle itself – before cycling in a new country.

so and give the appropriate a signal. Specific examples of when you can leave a bike lane listed in the Vehicle Code include; making a left turn, passing another bicyclist, avoiding a pedestrian or car in the bike lane, and approaching a place where a right turn is authorized (CVC 21208).

5. Yield To Pedestrians

Pedestrians should always use marked crosswalks when crossing a roadway. But even if they do not, bicyclists must exercise due care for the safety of any pedestrian on a roadway (CVC 21954).

6. Stop At, Not In, The Crosswalk

Crosswalks are for pedestrians, not cars or bicycles (CVC 21455).



7. Ride With Lights And Reflectors At Night

When riding at night, you or your bike must be equipped with a white light that is visible from a distance of 300 feet in front of the bike. The bike

CHICO MUNICIPAL CODE SECTIONS REGARDING BBQS AND BICYCLES

12.18.230 Fires - Restrictions.

- A. Except as herein otherwise provided, it is unlawful to make any fire at any point in any park, greenway, or open space, in the city, except at regularly established places for such purposes. "Regularly Established Places" are defined to be masonry, concrete or metal constructed fireplaces, pits or grills in designated city parks. Only charcoal briquettes from manufactured sources shall be used in Regularly Established Places. The use of portable propane barbecue devices is also allowed in Regularly Established Places only.
- B. Fires at the Campfire Council Ring in Bidwell Park may be authorized by a permit issued by the director, who shall notify the fire department of each permit issued. Such permitted fires shall not be left unattended and must be completely extinguished prior to the permittee's departure.
- C. No fires in BBQs or the Council Ring shall be allowed between 7:00 p.m. and sunrise during the months of October through March, between 9:00 p.m. and sunrise during the months of April through September, during designated Red Flag Fire Warning Days, or other times necessary for public safety.

(Ord. 2556; Ord. 2557)

12.18.090 Bicycles - Reckless operation - Prohibited.

No person shall operate a bicycle within a city park or playground, whether on- or offroad, in a reckless or unsafe manner so as to endanger the safety and well-being, or interfere with the use and enjoyment of park or playground facilities by other users.

SUBJECT: CONSIDERATION OF A PERMIT APPLICATION PROCESS FOR A COFFEE VENDOR AT

SYCAMORE POOL AREA IN LOWER BIDWELL PARK

REPORT IN BRIEF:

At its 4/25/22 meeting, the Bidwell Park & Playground Commission (BPPC) approved using the City's current Vend Peddle Hawk permit process to solicit a vendor to sell coffee and other items in the Sycamore Pool area in Lower Bidwell Park. The Commission will review the proposed permit application, criteria, and approval process.

Meeting Date: 9/26/22

Recommendation: Park & Natural Resources Manager recommends that the BPPC approve the permit application and the proposed vendor selection criteria or provide other direction.

FISCAL IMPACT: None at this time

BACKGROUND:

Chico Municipal Code Section 14.60 provides for the issuance of permits to allow the sale of food, beverages and cut flowers only on City sidewalks and streets. The City's Engineering Division currently administers these permits, which is called a vend, peddle, hawk permit program. The Code also provides for a permit to be issued in Bidwell Park if approved by the BPPC. The requirements to obtain a vending permit for City streets and sidewalks include:

At the 4/25/22 meeting, the BPPC approved using the vend peddle hawk permit process to be tailored slightly for the Park Division needs, and directed Staff to develop a draft permit application (Exhibit A) and process that included the following:

- 1. Vending hours to be from 6:30 to 10:30 a.m. or 11 am to not compete with the One Mile concessionaire hours.
- 2. Only one vendor or permit be allowed at any given time for a term of one year, with renewals possible.
- 3. The initial application fee be waived for 90 days to allow the new vendor to generate funds to pay the fee.
- 4. Sample criteria be developed for use by the BPPC when choosing a vendor.

DISCUSSION:

In order to qualify as prospective vendor Staff is proposing that the BPPC review, and interview permit applicants based on the following criteria:

- 1. Vendor has adequate staff and equipment to provide the services.
- 2. The menu and products to be sold.
- 3. Vendor has an Environmental Health Permit and a City Business License.
- 4. Vendor can provide comprehensive general liability insurance listing the City as an additional insured.
- 5. Vendor's business references

SUBJECT: Parks Division Report

NARRATIVE

1. Updates

- a. <u>Upper Park Road Sediment Reduction Project</u> Construction is nearing completion with Judd Buick Construction, working on finishing the armor fills and the road treatments. It is anticipated that they will start applying the final base rock on the road soon.
- b. <u>Traffic Safety Analysis</u> The City's consultant, Headway Transportation, has started its Phase I field review and analysis of the traffic and bicycle, pedestrian, and vehicle safety interactions in Lower Park. Phase II will be the evaluation of Upper Park after the road construction is complete.
- c. <u>CSU, Chico College Corps Project</u> The CSU, Chico Big Chico Creek Ecological Reserve reached out to Staff about a potential project that would involve using a graduate student to develop a program to use College Corp members to conduct invasive plant removal and other vegetation management projects in accordance with the City's Vegetative Fuels Management Plan. This potentially could provide 8,000-10,000 hours of free labor over the next year for these activities.

2. Maintenance Program

Staff provides on a need and time basis the cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads, and paths, coupled with the weekend cleaning and re-supplying of all open park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations and the removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

- a. <u>Lower Park: Routine Maintenance.</u> Worked with Right of Way crews to repave the bike path around Sycamore Field and behind Caper Acres. Continued to address and remove many downed limbs throughout the park and across trails. Continued with mowing lawns and repairing split rail throughout the park. Continue to have to open gates as a result of the rangers being out. Replaced the compressor at the One-Mile Dam
- b. <u>Middle Park:</u> Completed the installation of a new valve and irrigation repairs at Five Mile. Working on installing a variable frequency drive on the Five Mile well to better regulate the water level and to help prevent the well from shutting off.
- c. <u>Upper Park</u> Installed the new swimming hole sign at Alligator Hole.
- d. Green way Parks: Assisted with the encampment cleanup of Little Chico Creek between Hwy 99 and Bruce.
- e. <u>Upcoming projects:</u> Install new drinking fountain with a water fill station and doggy fountain at Lot E. Continue to work on installing the new swimming hole signs. Order and install a bear proof trash container at Alligator Hole.

3. Volunteer and Donor Program

a. <u>Make a Difference Day</u> – Saturday, October 22nd, 9 am to noon. volunteers will meet at the Chico Creek Nature Center, 1968 E. 8th street. Additional parking is located at Cedar Grove, 1890 E. 8th street. The focus will be the removal of the fencing from around the old deer pens.

- b. <u>CSU, Chico Community Action Volunteers in Education (CAVE)</u>– CAVE's Adopt a Park program is back in session. 5 student volunteers work on various projects in Lower Bidwell Park for 3 hours every Friday through early December.

SUBJECT: Tree Division Report

NARRATIVE

1. Updates

- a. Recruitment Vance Moody started employment as an hourly maintenance aide. Interviews are scheduled for a new Maintenance Worker position in Tree Division.
- b. <u>Service requests</u> In the June-July period 250 calls for tree service were received, of which 55% were related to cracked, hanging, or fallen limbs.

2. Planning/Monitoring

a. Damage Reports No damage reports were sent to Risk management in August.

3. Planning and Building Development

- a. <u>Landscape reviews</u> in the City TRAKIT permitting system included mitigation requirements for tree removal, root pruning requirements, PG&E removal requests and tree preservation measures during construction.
- b. <u>Engineering:</u> UFM collaborated with Public Works Engineering to provide input on preservation of street trees during various construction projects.

4. Miscellaneous

- a. <u>Free shade trees</u> Public Works continues to accept citizen requests for new shade trees ahead of the next fall community tree planting. Residents wishing to receive a new shade tree should submit a request to Butte Environmental Council by visiting https://www.becnet.org/urbanforest
- b. <u>Trees for babies:</u> The partnership with Enloe Medical Foundation is up and running. In the first month there are 30 signups to receive a tree to celebrate the birth of a new baby.
- c. <u>Cal Water's lawn-to-garden program</u>: UFM met with several residents wishing to sign up to the rebate program to remove turf in the adjacent park strip. Guidance was provided on how to preserve existing city street trees, including how to remove turf without damaging roots, and how to ensure adequate irrigation is provided. It is the intent of staff to schedule time to refine the list of approved plants provided to applicants by Cal water. The list contains over 3000 species, and many are not suitable in the ROW in Chico.
- d. <u>Cohasset road improvements:</u> UFM met with Public Works Landscape staff to assist in enhancing the landscape plans for the entryway to the airport at Airpark Boulevard.

5. Maintenance

- a. <u>Tree Maintenance</u> WCA will shortly start work on removals in various locations around the city. 99 Trees have been identified as requiring removal. Trees are either dead, dying or cannot be effectively pruned to improve health. Stumps will also be removed to prepare for replanting later in the year. The contractor is currently doing reconnaissance on each site to determine equipment requirements and traffic planning needs.
- b. <u>Tree watering:</u> Tree mortality of recently planted trees has been kept to a minimum over the summer. Despite the extreme drought conditions facing Butte County, the tree establishment methods deployed by Public Works and collaborating partners has ensured water efficiency is maintained with minimal plant stress during the critical 3-year establishment phase.

6. Outreach, Training and Education

- a. <u>Media:</u> UFM gave an interview with Action News Now. Limb breakage and mitigation strategies was the topic of discussion.
- b. <u>Urban Tree Diversity 4:</u> UFM attended an online international conference. The conference covered strategies to diversify the urban tree canopy to increase resilience in the face of climate change and other threats.
- c. <u>Pesticide training:</u> UFM attended various pesticide trainings hosted by Pesticide Applicators Professional Association (PAPA).
- d. Webinar: UFM attended online webinar "Connecting the Dots: Urban Trees, Human Health & Climate Change."
- e. <u>Outreach Planning:</u> UFM met with the contracted Public Information Officer to brainstorm strategies to promote Public Works efforts to maintain Chicos tree canopy and how to publicize the various services provided by Tree Division.

8. Upcoming Issues

- a. A removal list of dead and dying trees has been sent to the tree contractor, West Coast Arborists. 99 trees locations throughout the City are scheduled to be removed. Locations will be prepared for replanting.
- b. Various contractual work order lists are currently being compiled. Lists include removal and pruning in Bidwell park, grid pruning in selected neighborhoods and corridor pruning on main arterial roads.
- c. Staff continue to monitor the urban canopy for tree mortality. It is anticipated that the rate of tree loss experienced in the summer months will reduce as we move into fall/winter.
- d. Tentative plans are being made for a community tree planting event in December. The event will be hosted by Butte Environmental Council.
- e. Professional Service Agreements (PSA) are currently being compiled with various entities to start implementing the second cycle of community tree planting grant funds over the next three years.
