Applicant (Maria Cox) requested a reservation for the picnic area on the north side of the 5-Mile Recreation Area for a wedding. The event required BPPC consideration as the reservation is in an area not designated for exclusive use (reservation area). **Recommendation**: *Approve permit with conditions*.

## 2.3. Approve Pumpkin Head Contest at City Plaza (10/14/16)

Applicant (Jon Graham, Results Radio) requested a permit to hold the annual Pumpkin Head Contest in City Plaza. This is the 20<sup>th</sup> year for this event, the fourth in City Plaza. The event required BPPC consideration as the reservation is for more than 10 hours in length. **Recommendation:** *Approve permit with conditions.*

### 2.4. Permit for Mountain Bike Race in Middle and Upper Bidwell Park

This item was pulled by P&NRM Efseaff for the following corrections and additional conditions:

- The correct date of the race is 9/24/16.
- Add 'start and finish areas for all races must be approved by Park staff.'
- Add 'must obtain permission from the Golf Course."
- Due to the fire in Upper Park, add 'must check in with Park staff and have contingency route in case trails are closed for repair from the fire.'

Romain offered that Chico Velo does trail work before and after each race.

Commissioner Rood clarified that most of the riders don't reach the more sensitive, far-out areas. She pointed out that the race has been going for 40 years, not 4 years, as stated in the staff report. There have been about 200 riders for 40 years.

## 4.1. Consideration of an Agreement with the Chico Equestrian Association for Use of the Chico Equestrian Arena in Middle Bidwell Park

The BPPC considered a 5-year agreement with the Chico Equestrian Association to continue to operate the Chico Equestrian Arena in Middle Bidwell Park. The new agreement incorporates new City Council directives and policies concerning City leases and agreements. The new policy requires Council approval of any leases or agreements with terms of five years or more. **Recommendation:** Recommend that authorization to executive an agreement utilizing the new City policies.

Efseaff pulled this item from the agenda in order to discuss recent requests for changes with the Chico Equestrian Association. This item will return at a later meeting.

## 4.2. Review and Accept the 2015 Monitoring Report for the Peregrine Point Disc Golf Course

Efseaff provided a review of 2015 monitoring data and provided several recommendations for the course and monitoring approach based on the past 5 years of monitoring. Staff will incorporate the recommendations into a revised 5 year Monitoring Plan that the BPPC will consider for adoption at a future meeting. **Recommendation:** Review and accept the 2015 Monitoring Report

Efseaff reported that the course was built in 2010 and this is the fifth year of the monitoring report. There is an operating agreement between the City of Chico and Outdoor Recreation Advocacy, Inc. (ORAI) which governs the disc golf course development, operation, and mitigation measures. There were 77 mitigation and monitoring measures that were required as part of the development of the site. Although some completed measures are subject to continued inspection, only a subset of the biological measures remain as the focus of the Monitoring Report. Those include Butte County Checkerbloom, Bidwell's knotweed, and the Oak Woodland.

A challenge for the ORAI is that a lot of the monitoring falls outside of the course. In addition to the use by the disc golfers, there are bike trails that run through the area as well as other foot traffic which has resulted in fragmentation of the Checkerbloom and knotweed. These areas are showing a lot of bare ground as a result.

Recommendations for knotweed are to concentrate on reducing the area of bare ground and foot traffic and to reduce the footprint, do a more infrequent monitoring on that plant species but more frequent monitoring on the erosion which may involve moving the holes and clearly marking the out of bounds areas.

The Outsiders have recommended putting in some split-rail fence. A good trail system including signs is really needed out there.

The course alignment has been successful minimizing impacts to the Checkerbloom.

Efseaff reviewed the comparisons of Blue Oaks on and off the course. The on-course (priority) trees consistently showed small but significant differences in comparison to off-course (reference) trees. ORAI will be replanting trees to replace any that have died, and the City will be documenting previously planted oaks.

The oak monitoring will remain the same except that the list of sampled oaks will be refined depending on evidence of impacts from disc golf.

Efseaff stated that if we scaled back on the monitoring, more time could be spent on other things such as fencing and concentrating on the area within the course.

## **Public Comment**

Phil Brock (ORAI) answered questions posed by the Commission. He reported that the relationship between the City is at an all-time high; that membership is still slow; that fundraising was low due to the rain; they have sold about 50 memberships at \$20 each this year; and that because this is a higher ranked course, there are quite a few out of towners.

Woody Elliott stressed the need for tree protectors, hole signage, out of bounds areas/fencing improvements, alternate hole placements, establishment of rails and fairway paths, wood chips and straw bales.

Ann Elliott noticed the rocks on the course are becoming more exposed due to the use and soil erosion

## 6.1. Parks and Street Trees Division Report – Dan Efseaff, Park and Natural Resource Manager

Efseaff reported the following:

• A "fire danger" sign was erected in Bidwell Park to bring more awareness to those visiting the park. It will be updated on a regular basis (probably weekly).

- The final Annie B's matching fundraiser is in process. A link can be found on the City's website.
- Adjustments are being made at Comanche Creek the trail section between Valine Lane and Wrex Ct. will be completed in the fall/early winter, which will complete the loop trail.
- The lifeguard program with CARD is winding down. There have been some challenges in staffing the last couple of weekends. After Labor Day weekend, the pool will close for repairs and prepped for the winter.
- Very busy summer for the rangers. The Jr. Ranger program will kick off at the Bidwell Bash celebration.
- Provided a link to a Municipal Tree Care report which shows how other communities are handling their tree challenges.
- The next Natural Resources Committee meeting will focus on trails. In particular, Upper Park Road from a policy standpoint on use and time.
- Information is being collected for dog and leash law feedback from the Commission.
- Creeks Cleanup Day (September 17<sup>th</sup>) will be coordinated by Butte Environmental Council for the next two years.
- October 15th is scheduled to be Chico Makes A Difference Day.

### Romain reported the following

- Focus of the Bidwell Park Birthday Bash this year will be to polish up Caper Acres and update the community on the Caper Acres renovation.
- Jr. Ranger program will be launched.
- Volunteer program worked with international students.
- Annie B's donation card was highlighted.
- Volunteer partner groups will be coming before the Commission periodically with updates.

Traulsen asked about the status of the Urban Forester.

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Efseaff stated that a recruiting would be coming forth soon.

Traulsen asked about Animal Control violations and the high volume of warnings vs. the low amount of actual citations of dog violations.

Reddemann recommended a leash law awareness campaign.

#### **REPORT IN BRIEF:**

The City is working with the Chico Equestrian Association to develop a new agreement that incorporates recently passed policies to govern agreements to all City-owned property. Staff seeks an extension on the current agreement, in order to complete the agreement that incorporates these policies. *Recommendation:* Approval of extension until December 31, 2016.

## Background:

In January 2001, the BPPC approved a lease with the Chico Equestrian Association for a term of five-years with two five-year extensions. The lease provides for Association use and provides for general public use free of charge. The last extension will expire on 2/1/2016. Located near the Wildwood and Manzanita Avenues traffic circle, the facility provides horseback riders access to Bidwell Park. On 2/29/16, the BPPC passed a month to month agreement (with an end date of June 2016); however, additional issues need to be resolved with the CEA.

### Discussion:

Recently (10/6/15), the City adopted an Administrative Procedure and Policy Manual (AP&P 11-66). The policy applies to all City-owned property and defines the requirements for any City lease agreement. The City has developed a new lease template based on this policy. The new term of the agreement will coincide with the beginning of the new long term agreement. Staff recommends approval of a short term agreement to carry forth the terms of the agreement adopted in 2001, until the issues are resolved and a long-term agreement can be considered. No Council action is required as the extension will not be greater than 5 years. A copy of the short term agreement is attached. Some minor changes may be added during review from the City Attorney's office (Attachment A).

## AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO

# LEASE AGREEMENT EQUESTRIAN ARENA AND EVENT CENTER- BIDWELL PARK (City of Chico/Chico Equestrian Association)

THIS AMENDMENT NO. 2 is made and executed on October 24, 2016, by and between the City of Chico, a municipal corporation of the State of California ("City"), and the Chico Equestrian Association, a California non-profit corporation ("Lessee").

**WHEREAS**, Lessee entered into a lease agreement with the City of Chico entitled "Lease Agreement Equestrian Arena and Event Center – Bidwell Park" dated February 1, 2001 (Lease Agreement); and

**WHEREAS**, the Lease Agreement terminated on January 31, 2016 and the City entered into Amendment No. 1 to the Lease Agreement which extended the lease termination date until June 30, 2016;

**WHEREAS**, the City is near completion of a revised lease agreement that implements new requirements specified in the City's Administrative Procedure and Policy 11-66;

**WHEREAS**, the City benefits by the Lessee maintaining facilities that would otherwise be the responsibility of the City and the public benefits by recreational activity that would not otherwise be provided by the City;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the foregoing, and the existing requirements provided in the Lease Agreement dated January 31, 2001, both parties agree to the following:

**Section 1.** The City and Lessee agree to extend the term of the agreement on a month-to-month basis that terminates by either a thirty (30) day notice or December 31, 2016 whichever occurs first. At the termination of this extension, the Lessee is to cease all activity and to remove any property as required by the Lease Agreement.

**Section 2.** Except as expressly amended herein, all other provisions of the Lease Agreement and Amendment No. 1 to the Lease Agreement shall remain in full force and effect for the term of this amendment.

**IN WITNESS WHEREOF**, the Parties hereto have caused this Amendment No. 2 to the Lease Agreement (dated February 1, 2001) to be executed by their respective officers as of the date first set forth above.





Conclusions: Staff does not recommend removal. Because the tree is not dead, dying or poses a dangerous or defective condition upon public property, the BPPC may consider the removal for the convenience of the property owner (CMC 14.40.170). If the BPPC approves the request, staff recommends the following conditions: 1. The tree will be removed at the landowner expense utilizing an approved tree service according to City standards, and a planting location will be prepared. 2. The landowner plants an approved street tree to City specifications for planning within one (1) year. If not planted, the landowner will pay an in-lieu fee for tree planting and the City will complete the planting at an appropriate location.

## 1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Stoller called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

**Attendees**: Commissioners present: Marissa Stoller and Mary Brentwood. Commissioners absent: Janine Rood. Staff present: Erik Gustafson, Dan Efseaff and Shane Romain. Public: Thad Walker, Abbie Jones, Sam Lowthorp, Doug Laurie, Michael Evans, Lauren Paper, Jaclyn Soller and David Meichtry.

### 2. REGULAR AGENDA

## 2.1. Trails Plan Priorities for Bidwell Park: Upper Park Road

This item continues public input in updating Bidwell Park's Trail Plan as recommended under the Bidwell Park Master Management Plan (BPMMP). The Natural Resources Committee (NRC) will consider the uses of the gravel portion of Upper Park Road to asses if the current policies and approaches are adequate. A companion effort is underway to assess the condition of the road and provide remedies and costs; however, this effort concentrates on the policies related to the road. Staff recommends that the NRC follow the process used for trails priorities, and provide input on 1) Problems, 2) Attributes and 3) Priorities, Remedies, and Specific Actions. This input will influence the development of a policy that will return to the NRC and will be incorporated into the Trails Plan.

Upper Park Road was brought to the forefront with the closure of the road due to storm damage in 2012. The NRC is seeking early public input and collecting information to bring back to the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission (BPPC). Views about the problems and attributes of Upper Park Rd. is being gathered to help identify priorities, remedies and specific actions. Capital project dollars are available for an initial study of the road that will help determine long term, sustainable and maintainable road design options.

Discussion topics that were exchanged between the committee, staff and the public included cost and where funding for the road is going to come from, accessible transportation options, parking, gate placement and gate schedules with a variety of views expressed. Chair Stoller requested any final thoughts and Mr. Walker expressed the view that the road should be a graded experience, as you move further into the park, it should become more rugged and he would like to see human powered options on the road past a certain point. He hopes that the process yields a road to trails approach with emergency and service vehicle access and better flow of water off the road.

Chair Stoller moved to adjourn but was reminded about business from the floor by Commissioner Brentwood.

## 3. BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Mr. Laurie spoke on a previously agenized item on business from the floor. He expressed that he "Just wants the road repaired and restored so the public has access 365 days a year."

## 4. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

## **NARRATIVE**

## 1. Updates

a. <u>Fires</u> – This August in the Park will be remembered as the month of fire with five fires breaking out between Bidwell Park and specialty parks. Three small fires in Teichert Ponds were reported during the month and found in close proximity to homeless camps. Upper Park had two fires on consecutive days. The largest, the Santos fire consumed 88 acres and was fought from the ground and air. The fire burned for three days and crews remained in the area for a week. Fire lines cut by dozers caused significant damage to the park. There is much rehabilitation to be done prior to the rainy season. Cal Fire indicates only 8 ½ acres lie within its domain and so the cost distribution remains to be seen. The current closure on the south side includes the Guardian Trail between Bloody Pin and 10 Mile House Road; the Pine Trail, and periodic closures of 10 Mile House Road. The Annie Bidwell Trail remains open. Closures are likely to remain in effect thru the rainy season. Signs have been posted at trailheads about closures and rangers patrol the area daily to encourage all to practice good stewardship.

#### 2. Administrative and Visitor Services

- a. Office Move the Department of Public Works will be moving the Parks and Street Trees Division office back to 965 Fir in October.
- b. <u>Urban Forest Manager</u> The City is recruiting for the position (<a href="https://www.governmentjobs.com/careers/chico/jobs/1536188/urban-forest-manager">https://www.governmentjobs.com/careers/chico/jobs/1536188/urban-forest-manager</a>). The recruitment for the full time positions will close October 13, 2016.

## 3. Planning/Monitoring

a. <u>Bridge Repairs</u> – Parks has been concerned about the condition of the Ceres (Lindo Channel) and Marsh (Little Chico Creek) Bridges. As the costs of a comprehensive repair exceeded the Parks materials budget, we reached out to Public Works Engineering to look at better solutions than replacing the timbers. As a result, the City is looking at replacing the decking with lightweight concrete, which is our standard for any new pedestrian bridge structures. This product obviously provides a smoother surface to travel on, requires much less ongoing maintenance and has a longer life expectancy than the timber decking. The City will be looking at funding sources to make the repairs and we are hopeful that we will be able to initiate comprehensive repairs in 2017. In the meantime, Parks staff will continue to make repairs on the worst sections.

## 4. Maintenance Program

Staff continues daily cleaning and safety inspections of all recreation areas including: grounds, playgrounds, picnic sites, roads and paths, coupled with daily cleaning and re-supplying of all open park restrooms. Maintenance and repair of park fixtures, daily opening of gates, posting reservations, unauthorized camp clean up and the constant removal of graffiti from all park infrastructure.

- a. <u>Lower Park</u>: Staffs focus has been mostly on the day to day maintenance with a bit of vandalism repair thrown in, staff repaired and reinforced the electrical outlet cages around the One Mile area as they have received multiple blows from vandals. Crews worked on the ever present down trees to clear the worst of the debris around the Lower Park.
- b. <u>Middle Park:</u> Staff have started the repair and painting to the Five Mile buildings They have run into a fair amount of rot in the redwood beams since our last service to these buildings, most likely they will have to come down and or replaced the next time this complex is serviced, if they are removed it will majorly change the look of the complex but not affect the structural integrity. The new Fire Danger sign is up and in use. Staff set the

- sign just after the bridge on Wildwood Way and right before you turn into Upper Park. Crews also reset the gate post as it had suffered an impact from an unknown source.
- c. <u>Upper Park</u>: The split rail fence has been extended by two sections at the East end of Lot E to help remove users confusion as to which way they should go to get to the desired trails.
- d. <u>Greenway Parks</u>: Ceres Street Bridge has received more patches to the rapidly deteriorating deck in hopes that funding will soon be approved for deck replacement. Staff installed the now completed interruptive panels along the two sections of trail.
- e. <u>Upcoming projects:</u> The completion of the Five Mile buildings revamp, Comanche creek trail; Valeen to Wrex, Tiechert ponds trail, Peregrine point disc golf alternative hole placement, More patches to the Sycamore pool floor and walls, Completion of the One Mile reservation area tables, Start to install the replacement PAR course equipment along exiting course

## 5. Ranger and Lifeguard Programs

- a. <u>Lifeguard Program</u>– The official swim season came to a close on Labor Day. The cool but comfortable weekend kept many out of the pool but still enjoying the park. This swim season marks the second summer of the contracted quards thru CARD. Staff will meet with CARD shortly to debrief and work to improve the annual program.
- b. Ranger Program—The month of August and its summer heat kept rangers busy educating patrons on the danger of heat illness and having enough water along for individuals and pets. The traditional start of the college school year brings swarms of new park users and veteran students on weekends to the swimming holes in Upper Park. Rangers are seeing less alcohol in the areas and attribute that to a consistent presence in the area on peak days and word of mouth related to enforcement actions in swimming holes.
- c. <u>Significant Incidents</u> Rangers responded to three medical aid calls in August requiring transport. The first, was a technical rescue involving a helicopter in the Salmon Hole area; the second a difficulty breathing call at Monkey face and a third was a minor fall with an ankle injury.

## 6. Natural Resource Management

a. <u>Trails Planning</u> – Staff will be working on plans to implement trail work at Tiechert Ponds (made possible with funds from the Tiechert Ponds Foundation), Comanche Creek, and Monkey Face. The Santos Fire and suppression efforts in Upper Park will result in extensive work to return the trails to use and improve the alignments to minimize park damage.

## 7. Outreach and Education

- a. <u>Bidwell Bash Cancelled</u> This year's Bidwell Bash was intended as a celebration of Bidwell Park's 111<sup>th</sup> Birthday, clean-up of Caper Acres, and kick off the Junior Ranger program. This year's effort was cancelled. The kickoff, clean-up and other efforts will be reschedule for other dates. Parks will evaluate the ability to conduct future fund raising events with current staffing and workloads, and consider another event intern to help with those efforts.
- b. <u>School year kickoff</u> Rangers took advantage of the opportunity to meet students and parents coming into Chico for the new school year by giving small tours of some areas, providing maps, and fielding questions about the park. The three weekends from CSU classes starting to Labor Day had the park filed with families enjoying the bountiful recreational offerings of the area. Rangers happily report the three weekends required little enforcement and enjoyed seeing patrons participating in activities in a safe and sane manner.

#### 8. Street Trees

- a. <u>Contracts</u> The City is completing processing of the following contracts: black walnut and tree removal contracts, emergency services.
- b. <u>Hourly help</u> City staff is concentrating on school zone and high traffic corridors and will continue to utilize additional hourly help for the next few weeks. Work this month included priority work along East 8<sup>th</sup> Street, Pine and Cypress, Memorial Way (near Chico Junior high).
- c. <u>Service Requests</u> Staff closed a remarkable number of service requests in August (149), over 5 a day. As of 9/22/16, the Division has received over 857 new requests in 2016.
- d. <u>Planting</u> staff is gearing up for a full planting season and will be placing door hangers at priority planting areas. Homeowners willing to water the trees will receive priority.

## 9. Landscapes

a. <u>Depot Park</u> – City crews completed some vegetation work and clean-up at Depot Park. The area has been impacted by homeless issues. Rangers have added extra patrols of this area to allow the landscape contractor to complete work during scheduled mornings.

## 10. Volunteer and Donor Program

- a. <u>Annies Bs</u>– There is still time to donate during the Community Fund Drive! Please go to; http://nvcf.org/fund/bidwell-park-chico-parks-division-2/
- b. <u>Chico Kiwanis</u>— Staff provided a presentation to the Chico Kiwanis about the Caper Acres renovation project. Kiwanis donated \$250.00 toward the effort.

## 11. Upcoming Issues/Miscellaneous

- a. <u>BPPC Tour</u> To provide a good understanding of City resources, City Staff will provide an orientation tour with Commissioners of the new improvements of facilities at Comanche Creek and Teichert Ponds. The schedule will depend on the completion of trail work on the site, which looks to be in November or December.
- b. <a href="Humboldt/Little Chico Creek Corridor">Humboldt/Little Chico Creek Corridor</a> A rehabilitation project of the Humboldt Avenue Corridor between Orient and Cypress is under way. Chico Police and the Parks Division are working collaboratively to abate crime, drug activity, vandalism and destruction of the natural resources in this riparian area. The majority of illegal encampments in the city are covered in overgrown brush and trees, providing a hidden sanctuary for criminals to conduct activity without detection. The bridges and dense overgrowth on both sides of the creek at this location provide shelter from the weather and concealment for criminals who reside there. The combined effort between departments includes:
  - Removing illegal campsites with cleanup crews from Butte County ACS combined with Target Team/Ranger enforcement of applicable laws and CMC regulations
  - Removing invasive plant species and trimming existing plants and trees
  - Landscaping areas in an effort to make them less inviting for illegal camping
  - Zero tolerance enforcement of applicable law and CMC regulations to all violators.
  - Engagement of neighbors to encourage a sense of pride in the area which can serve to signal to offenders that continuing criminal activity there is unacceptable.

Vegetation removal of small invasives is anticipated to begin in early October with ACS crews. Larger invasives and site line clearing will occur in mid to late October with Cal Fire Salt Creek crews.






Figure 2 Comanche Creek pedestal complete
