RECOMMENDATION

Continue discussion of CMC 16.68 and consider changes to fee structure, regulatory requirements and other considerations to improve the Heritage Tree program

BACKGROUND

Twenty-four cities from across the US that have some form of voluntary heritage tree program were studied. The purpose of the study was to analyze how other cities administer, regulate and promote their respective heritage tree programs. The study also aimed to garner ideas for how to improve Chico's heritage tree program. The study revealed that there are a wide range of approaches used in running a heritage tree program. The discussion and tables below highlight pertinent points relating to the various programs.

DISCUSSION

All cities studied require that the property owner gives consent to the tree being listed as a heritage tree. None of the cities studied charge a fee for a heritage tree nomination.

Sandpoint states that all trees must be accessible to the public or be easily visible from public roads. Monmouth states that before any other consideration, the tree must be healthy. It must also be easily visible from public roads. Coronado states that tree must not only be healthy but must be able to reach mature size and form, taking into account location and structure of the tree.

Vancouver, Aurora, Benicia and Monmouth also consider groves of trees.

Tuclatin has language in its Heritage tree ordinance that state that the program is not intended to interfere with use of the property. It also states that no tree that may need to be removed as part of road, sewer or water improvements shall be entered into the program.

The city of Sandpoint states that its program "is more honorary than regulatory."

the City of Coronado states that the program "is not intended to be a means to obstruct development of public or private property."

City of Woodinville states that the program is solely for recognition, and does not attach additional preservation or retention requirements to the tree or to the property.

City of Monmouth offers an incentive of up to a 10% variance to subdivision applications to assist in the retention of one of more heritage trees.

The City of Coronado offers many incentives to residents who successfully nominate heritage trees. Incentives include tree advice from a ISA certified arborist on staff, a free tree inspection every four years as well as a report to the property owner. The city will provide deed services to owners who wish to have their tree listed as a

"protected" heritage tree. Owners are compensated \$300 for every year that the tree is maintained in a protected status.

Cities of Glenview, Sonoma and San Mateo states that all parties can be subject to a penalty, including contractors for working on a heritage tree without a permit.

Glenview calculates the corresponding big tree registry points as outlines in protocols by the American Forest Foundation.

Administration of the Heritage Tree Program.

Review periods of new nominations.

Some cities such as city of Coronado have a continuous review period whereby nominations are considered at regular public hearings, such as tree committee meetings. In Coronado all property owners within 75' are formally contacted. In Menlo Park all owners within 100' are contacted.

Some cities only review nominations at certain times of the year. Vancouver considers applications every six months in April and October. Tualatin considers applications annually, with a maximum of five trees per year. Aurora considers applications once per year in the fall. Selected trees are recognized during Arbor Day celebrations.

Santa Monica only considers public trees and caps the number of nominations to five per year. Applications are accepted January to end of August. The review period is between September and December.

Glenview accepts nominations up to July 4 every year.

Sonoma has a waiting period of six months before a nomination for dedication will be considered.

In Madison Parks Each year up to 5 nominated trees are selected. Heritage Trees are announced during the Arbor Week celebration and posted on the website

Recording on property deeds.

In Vancouver the tree is recorded on deeds and is binding to all successors to the property.

City of Sandpoint gives new owners the opportunity but not the obligation to continue the program.

Tigard has a "significant" tree classification for trees that do not meet requirement of heritage status or if the owner does not want to voluntarily enter into regulatory protection. The city prepares the necessary paperwork to record the designation on the property deeds.

Residents of Coronado can choose to have protection added to property deeds but there is no obligation.

Permitting to do tree work on heritage trees:

Many cities allow tree work without the need for a permit. Menlo Park permits routine pruning that does not remove more than 25% of live foliage.

Benefits to participation:

City of Puyallup negotiates favorable rates from local tree companies for maintenance work on heritage trees and also provides free tree advice. The city also pays for all voluntary covenants.

City of Benicia provides a resolution of appreciation to participants. Depending on funding the city provides funding for arborist consultations and tree maintenance assistance.

Subject to city funding availability, Tigard offers incentives to residents who nominates a Heritage tree. Incentives include a free plaque, free tree services and permanent financial support for ongoing tree protection. The city also prepares deed papers for residents who wish to record Heritage tree status against property. It is noted however that the City currently only has four trees in the program.

San Luis Obispo provides an estimate of the worth of the tree and is provided to the property owner. The city also protects and maintain all designated heritage trees. Heritage trees are pruned according to a schedule developed and approved by the public works director. All interim maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner.

Design of nomination forms

City of Encinitas asks for a copy of the grant deed to check property ownership.

Camden provides the option of the owner to maintain confidentiality.

San Luis Obispo provides a property owner agreement with the application form and also the option to not be listed in the self guided tour map.

Tigard, Benicia, Vancouver and Glenview provide easy check boxes to quickly list which characteristics of the tree make it eligible for nomination.

Camben collects feedback on nominee demographics and also how the nominee heard about the program.

San Luis Obispo provides an app showing tree locations, photos and information.

Most cities provide space for explanations as to why the tree should be nominated.

VOLUNTARY HERITAGE TREE PROGRAM

Section:

16.68.010 Voluntary Heritage Tree Program.


16.68.010 Voluntary Heritage Tree Program.

- A. The purpose and intent of the Voluntary Heritage Tree Program is to identify, promote public awareness of, maintain, and protect designated trees within the City of Chico. This program acknowledges that Heritage Trees, whether located on public or private property, are distinct and unique living resources of the City of Chico.
- B. Any person may submit an application on a form supplied by the director and accompanied by the required fee, to designate a tree as a Heritage Tree. If an application is filed by a person other than the owner of the property on which the tree is located, then the application shall include the written and signed consent of the property owner and the property owner shall have the opportunity to be fully involved in the designation process. Applications shall be evaluated by the urban forest manager and forwarded to the Bidwell Park and Playground Commission for review and recommendation to the City Council. The City Council may designate a tree as a Heritage Tree if it meets any of the following criteria:
 - 1. Any native Oak (*Quercus*) species or Sycamore (*Platanus*) species, having a diameter at breast height of thirty-six (36) inches or greater when a single trunk, or a cumulative diameter of thirty-six (36) inches or greater when a multi-trunk, and with good health and structure; or
 - 2. The tree is an outstanding specimen of a desirable species of good health and quality structure; or
 - 3. The tree is of historical interest; or
 - 4. The tree is an unusual species, is of distinctive form, is a part of a significant grove or is otherwise unique.
- C. Once a tree is designated as a Heritage Tree, a Notice of Heritage Tree Designation shall be recorded against the property on which the tree is located. Heritage Trees located on public property are exempt from the recording requirement.
- D. Heritage trees may only be removed pursuant to Chapter 16.66 of this code. (Ord. 2402)

CHICO'S HERITAGE TREE PROGRAM

In March of 2010, after two years of sub-committee meetings and review, the Chico City Council approved several revisions in the Municipal Code relating to trees. This revision included setting up a Voluntary Heritage Tree Program (CMC Section 16.68.010) to recognize significant trees growing in Chico. On November 2, the City Council approved the first 6 Heritage trees. Three of those trees are located in Chico's Parks and Open Space. Another is a City street tree, and the final one was a private tree in a new development across from the Nature Center. Subsequently, 2 trees were nominated by CARD and approved for Heritage Tree Status on 12/21/10. the first private tree, a valley oak located on East 8th St, was nominated and approved in April, 2012. A street tree was nominated by its adjacent homeowner in January, 2013. These trees are described below. The City's program is active and seeking new Heritage Tree Applications.


A 67" valley oak (*Quercus lobata*) tree in Annie's Glen was nominated because of its prominent location next to the bike path near the entrance from Orient and E 2nd Street. The tree has a history of old flood damage at its base, where an old injury can be seen. Floods deposit soil over the original grade of the root collar, and sometimes, this soil can create a crown rot injury. The tree's root collar has been exposed, however, and the tree pruned to improve its safety and longevity.





This **53"** diameter Blue Oak (Quercus douglasii) is clearly seen by looking east from Baroni Neighborhood Park, and is located in the open space preserve in the Hillview Terrace Subdivision.. Blue oaks are found in the more upland areas of Chico, where the water table drops below 30' in depth. They therefore rely on an extensive root system to gather water for the long summer months, rather then the deep sinker roots of the valley oak. This makes them slower growing and more sensitive to construction that encroaches upon their canopy and root zone.


A mid-west species that was likely planted by the Bidwell's in Children's Playground, this **52" Sweetgum** (*Liquidambar styraciffua*) is one of the largest in California – rivaling one in Sacramento that is considered the largest at 54". Our tree is an excellent specimen, with little to no limb breakage and is found at the north end of the Park. It is usually in full fall color for most of November and December.





The city's largest Heritage Tree is a 78" Valley oak located near the corner of Eaton and Cohasset and a 66" oak on Heritage Oak Drive. This tree grows on the bank of Sycamore Creek. At some point in time in the distant past, the soil was raised over the root collar of the tree, probably in the building of the levy and Eaton Road, to the south of the tree. Volunteers have cared for the tree over the years by installing large logs around the outside of the drip line to keep vehicles out from under the canopy, pruning and cabling the tree, and removing the excess soil over the root collar. Called the Eaton Oak, it is an incredible specimen that is a joy to stand under. One limb has grown to the ground and is helping to support the massive structure.


A tree that the City can be proud of preserving is found on Heritage Oak Drive. This 67" valley oak was recognized by the developer and care was taken to keep house foundations at the outer edge of the canopy. The street was carefully constructed around the tree as well. Not long after the tree was preserved, it broke a large limb growing to the north, so now the tree's canopy is pruned on a regular basis to reduce the weight on the long horizontal limbs so they don't break. An area at the base of the tree is mulched on a regular basis, and was made part of the street's right of way for the tree.




A 70" Bastogne or Paradox walnut (*Juglans hindsi iX regia*) located at the new Park Forest Subdivision is a seedling hybrid between the English and the native black walnut. Fairly common in the Chico area, this tree was planted in 1900 as a pollinator for a small family owned walnut orchard. Property developers of Park Forest LLC set aside the area around the tree to protect it and feature the tree as a center piece of their Park Forest project on East 8th Street across from the Nature Center. The built a large ring around the dripline to protect it during construction. To date no significant damage has occurred from construction.


Two additional trees – located in the CARD Community Park off 20th Street were nominated for the program. On the south side of the park, at the end of Cleveland Street, a lovely 62" valley oak provides shade and beauty for a small picnic area. The tree existed long before the park was built, and has been pruned and cabled over the years.






A California black walnut *(Juglans hindsii)*, of the type that John Bidwell planted around Chico, covers another picnic area north of the oak. It sits near the children's playground in the 20th Street Community Park. These trees are known for their exceedingly beautiful wood that is also quite valuable. The nuts are excellent eating, although cracking the nut is so difficult that they are no longer produced in California. They remain an agricultural necessity, though, and are used for root stock on most walnuts because they are resistant to the oak root fungus disease common to California soils.







Blue atlas cedars are planted throughout California, but rarely does one attain the size and grace of the tree located on the side of 1641 Mulberry. This tree has grown to over 50" in diameter, despite having been struck by lightening at some point in the past. The injury can still be seen on the central trunk, which is one reason why the two side branches have become dominant. This cedar is a City street tree.

Santa Monica's Heritage Tree Program recognizes outstanding trees throughout the city. The goal of the program is to educate citizens and raise community awareness about tree diversity and the city's rich history by focusing on a limited number of designated Heritage Trees.

Heritage Trees are healthy, exceptional representatives of tree species located on public property throughout Santa Monica. The Heritage Tree Program is implemented and overseen by the urban forestry section of the Public Landscape Division with input from the Heritage Tree Subcommittee of the Urban Forest Task Force. The City's urban forestry staff will inspect and approve nominated trees prior to further review by the Heritage Tree Subcommittee. Selected park tree nominations will also be presented to the Recreation & Parks Commission. Final approval will be granted by the Urban Forest Task Force.

Heritage Trees are not subject to additional regulatory or legal restrictions and are not governed by the Landmarks Ordinance. Heritage Trees will be maintained by the urban forestry section of the city's Public Landscape Division at the standards and specifications outlined in the Urban Forest Master Plan. Trees that are removed because they have reached the end of their life expectancy will be archived.

The Heritage Tree Program is an annual program based upon the calendar year. Nomination forms will be accepted year round. The review period will take place from September 1st to December 31st. Nominations received after August 31st will not be considered until the following year's review period. No more than five trees will be designated as a Heritage Tree in a calendar year.

Agreement of the Property Owner and The City of Vancouver to Designate A Heritage Tree

In exchange for the City's designation of the subject tree as a Heritage Tree, the Property Owner agrees to protect, maintain and care for the Heritage Tree located on his or her property. This agreement shall run with the land and bind all successors, heirs and assigns to this property. Property Owner agrees to abide by conditions set forth in the City of Vancouver Code, Section 20.770.120, particularly:

- A. "When development is proposed for property which contains a Heritage Tree, the property owner must have a tree preservation plan prepared by a qualified arborist demonstrating how the Heritage Tree will be protected and preserved."
- B. "No person may cut or remove a Heritage Tree without obtaining approval from the Urban Forestry Commission following the set criteria."
- C. "The limb structure or crown of a Heritage Tree may be pruned in any one year period without obtaining approval from the Urban Forestry Commission, provided that at least 80 percent of the existing tree crown remains undisturbed."
- D. "Any person who wishes to prune a Heritage Tree in excess of 20 percent of the existing crown shall obtain approval from the Urban Forestry Commission subject to [various] conditions."

- 1) **Statement of purpose**: The goal of the Arlington Heritage Tree Program is to identify trees which are especially significant in establishing the character of our community, and to <u>encourage</u> preservation of these and other trees.
- 2) **Nominating criteria**: Citizens are encouraged to nominate a tree (or trees) as a heritage tree based on criteria which may include age, size, beauty, history, shade, uniqueness, etc. All nominated trees must be healthy, and must be within the city limits of Arlington. The tree may be on private or public property. If on private property, the owner must agree to the heritage tree designation before it can be awarded.
- 3) Nomination process: Forms may be obtained at City Hall or printed from the City website. Return form to City Hall, Recreation, 238 N. Olympic.
- 4) Selection process: The Tree Board and the City Natural Resource Coordinator will review nominations every six months. If a tree is determined to be a heritage tree, a plaque will be installed near the tree (with the owner's permission if on private property), and the following will be notified: a) the person nominating the tree, b) the Mayor and City Council, c) the local newspaper, d) the Planning Commission. If the tree is not chosen, the person nominating the tree will be notified of this decision.



RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the committee provide input on staffs proposed grant application.

BACKGROUND

The grants are part of California Climate Investments, a statewide program that puts billions of cap-and-trade dollars to work reducing greenhouse gas emissions, strengthening the economy and improving public health and the environment — particularly in disadvantaged communities.

For local governments (cities, counties, districts). Improving long-term management of urban forests to reduce GHG emissions and improve urban forest performance over time. Projects may involve the establishment or updating of a jurisdiction-wide tree inventory, urban forest mapping and analysis, and/or long-term management plan. May include policy integration and ordinance development.

Amount of funding available per application: \$150,000 - \$1,500,000. Funding requires 25% match which can be from in-kind sources

Concept proposal submission date is February 26 2018, 3pm.

The purpose of this grant type is to fund the development and implementation of urban forest management activities to reduce GHG emissions and to be carried out by a local government jurisdiction to optimize the multiple benefits of its urban forest. Such activities will be comprehensive, long term, include the entire jurisdiction, take an ecosystem management approach and may include an inventory, analysis, training and/or educational component. A tree planting component is required during the grant performance period. Any management plan funded by this grant type must include the setting of a tree canopy cover goal for the jurisdiction. No other practices may be funded by this grant program.

UFM believes the City of Chico is a strong candidate for a GHGRF grant.

It is anticipated that funding will be sought for a comprehensive street tree inventory and long-term management plan. These databases and documents will guide urban forest policy and goals for the next forty to fifty years.

Of particular note from the grant application guidelines.:

The project must show that the community where the project will occur was, and will continue to be, authentically engaged about the project.

Projects shall include an education and outreach component. Not more than 20% of grant funds may be used for this education and outreach component. The education and outreach component as part of the overall project can be shown as project match dollars by the applicant.

Fiscal impact:

Match funding in-kind for education component and volunteer support for tree planting should result in zero or minimal fiscal impact.
