Goal 1: Create a Sustainability Plan, which includes a Climate Action component, to meet the 25% green house gas (GHG) emission reduction goal by 2020, with the long term goal of achieving a greater percentage decrease by 2050.	12/31/10	In-progress	The Task Force's original thought was to develop an overall Sustainability Plan for the City during this Work Plan term. However, it was decided that it was best to complete the Climate Action Plan (CAP) so that it could be a companion document to the 2030 General Plan Update. The City Council approved proceeding with the development of the CAP and conceptually approved the actions proposed to be implemented during Phase 1 (2010-2012). The Administrative draft of CAP is nearing completion and is anticipated to be completed by 8/11.
Goal 2: Complete Development of Sustainability Element and Indicators for 2030 General Plan Update	9 - 12 months	July-2009	The Task Force worked with the General Plan Team to complete the sustainability element of the 2030 General Plan Update and began a process to identify some draft sustainability indicators that could be used to annually assess the implementation of the General Plan. Now that the General Plan has Update has been approved, the Task Force will work with Planning Department to finalize the indicators during its 2011-2012 Work Plan.
Goal 3: Develop and implement a public education and outreach program on greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction measures and other sustainability issues. Examples include: 1. Sustainability Section on City Website 2. "Sustainability in Landscaping"/Vector Control Education 3. Workshops 4. Possible Mayor's Green Business Recognition	No date set	On-going	Task Force developed an Education/Outreach Ad-Hoc Committee that has set up booths at the Thursday Night Market and at other local events, and held workshops to inform the public on GHG emissions and the City's sustainability programs. Staff and theTask Force are also in the process of establishing a sustainability website. An Ad-Hoc Committee was also formed to develop a Green and Sustainable Business rating/recognition program. The City chose not to pursue a Landscape/Vector control education program.

Duration of the update	On-going	Although the CAP is not yet complete, the Task Force obtained a \$400,000 Innovators Pilot Grant from PG&E to provide energy audits, install energy efficient measures, and to provide energy efficiency information to 100 single-family homeowners. Another Ad-Hoc Committees was formed to implement this grant. The Task Force has also formed a Committee to look at possibly developing an Climate Change Adaptation plan or strategy.
Goal 5: Assist and advise Council on working with local agencies to comply with local, state, and federal regulations related to climate change and sustainability, such as SB 375.		On-going	BCAG is still in the process of developing a Sustainable Communities Strategy as required by SB 375. The Task Force has also established an Ad-Hoc Committee to review this Strategy and other programs and policies related to transportation and climate action.

Established by City Council action to assist in the implementation of the U.S. Conference of Mayor's Climate Protection Agreement. Council also adopted a green house gas emission reduction target of a 25% reduction from 2005 emission levels by 2020. The Task Force will assist the City in meeting this goal, as well as assist the City in complying with the Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 (AB32) and Senate Bill 375.


